Rome, August 30. The Cardinal de Fourbin had this week another Audience of the Pope, and pressed him very earnestly to grant his Bulls to the French Bishops who al-
listerd in the Assembly of 1682, and signed the Appeal to the future General Council, but with little effect, the Pope persisting hitherto in his Resolution not to yield this Point, wherein the Right and Authority of the Church of Rome are so much concerned: Nor have the French had as yet any better Success in their endeavours about forming a League for preserving, as they pretend, the quiet of Italy; the Ministers here being very sensible, that what they propose tends rather to disturb than secure the Peace of it.
The Cardinal d'Estree had on Thursday last a long Conference with Cardinal Spada, and among other Affairs recommended to him the Archbishop of Paris, as a person for whom the French King is very desirous to obtain a Cardinal's Cap at the next Promotion. By the last Courier from Madrid, the Dukes de Montesson and Maitellon, who are Successors of the King of Spain, received his Letters to accept the Offices conferred upon them by the Pope; the first being made General of the Church, and the second General of the Ecclesiastical Gallies. The said Cardinals are to meet next a Consistory will be held, wherein Don Alonso Odiscalchi, Nephew to Innocent XI. will be declared a Cardinal.

Lemberg, August 21. In the Council of War that was lately held at Jaszarow, where the Court of Poland still continues, it was resolv'd, That 6000 Men, most Horle, should be sent to attack the Tartars that lay encamped near Caminiec, and to destroy all the Corn and Forage-
ground that place. This Detachment was made accordingly; but the Tartars having notice of their approach, retir'd from thence, and dispersed themselves into small Parties, to make Incursions into our Frontier Provinces, where they burnt divers Villages, and carried away a considerable number of People: But the biggest of these Parties, which consisted of about 800 Men, was met by some of our Troops, commanded by the Starost of Caminiec, and entirely deccared by them; 700 of the Enemy being kill'd or taken, with most of their Horses, and 500 Christians released. The Report we had some time ago, That a Body of Turks and Tartars was marching to attack Sirocke on the Niester, is not confirm'd: but, on the contrary, we have Advice, That several thousand Zaporovian Cossaks, who are under the Protection of the Moscovites, are drawn together, with a design to make an Inroad into the Country of the Tartars. There have been several Consultations held at Jaszarow, upon the Proposals of Peace made by the Envoy from the Cham of Tartary: Many of the Senators were for hearkning to them; but the King joyning with the Bishop of Polesia, the great General of Lithuania, and others, who were of a contrary Opinion, it was resolv'd not to enter upon any Treaty of Peace without the consent of the Emperor and the Republick of Venice. After which, the General Officers were order'd to repair immediately to the Army, which lies at present at Komnichamy; and 'tis said that the King himself will be going thither the next week.

From the Imperial Army lying two Leagues beyond Valkowar, under the Command of Prince Lewis of Baden, Sept. 2. On the 22d of the last month Prince Lewis arriv'd in the Camp, which was then near Eszick, and was received by the Army in Battalia, and a treble Discharge of all the Artillery; The 23d one of the Barks that were fitted by the General's Order at Eszick, was finished and made ready to sail, carrying 8 pieces of Cannon, 40 Soldiers, and 30 Rowers; and the other 11 would be finish'd in 9 or 10 days. The 24th the Danish Auxiliary Troops joyn'd us. The 25th the Army march'd, as they did again the 27th, and encamp'd near Valkowar, where Prince Lewis received Advice that several thousand Radziens, who were assembled together in Servia, had defeated a Turkish Convoy, which was going with a great Treasure to the Ottoman Army; That the Grand Viceroy was very much troubled at the News of it, and had order'd a Body of Spahis to go in pursuit of them; upon which, a strong Detachment of Horse was sent from our Camp to protect the said Radziens in their retreat. The 29th we march'd to this place. The Auxiliary Forces of Lauenburg pass'd the Drave the same day, and are now within an hours march of our Camp. Yesterday we had Advice, That General Truchses was marching with 7000 Men to joyn General Veterani, who has pass'd the Iron-Gate, and advances towards Temejwaer, with a design, as it's believed, to attack that place. The

Radziens have brought their rich Booty into our Camp. To-morrow we march again towards Eszick and Peter Waradin. The Turks lie still on the other side of the Save, about Belgrade. 'Tis confirm'd that the 10000 Tartars who were coming to joyn the Ottoman Army, are returned home in great discontent.

Yarmouth, September 14. Yesterday came into our Road the St. Albans Prize, with a small French Privateer of 2 Guns and 35 Men, which she took the day before on this Coast.
