THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS ACT,
1882.

SCHEME determining the Boundaries of the Wards of the borough of Richmond in the county of Surrey.

WHEREAS by an Order of the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council dated the eleventh day of February one thousand nine hundred and seven His Majesty in pursuance and exercise of the power vested in Him by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, and of every other power enabling Him in that behalf, did, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, fix the number of wards into which the said borough of Richmond should be thenceforth divided and did order and direct that the number of the said wards should be six:

And whereas the Right Honourable Herbert John Gladstone, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State did, in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament by warrant given under his hand and seal at Whitehall on the twenty-fifth day of February one thousand nine hundred and seven duly appoint me Edward Thornton Hill Lawes, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, to be a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of, and apportioning the Councillors among, the wards of the said borough of Richmond:

Now I the said Edward Thornton Hill Lawes in pursuance of the powers given to me by virtue of the said appointment under the said Act do hereby determine as hereinafter mentioned the boundaries of the said six wards into which the said borough is divided, which wards are hereinafter named and numbered as follows, that is to say:—

- No. 1. North Ward.
- No. 2. West Ward.
- No. 3. East Ward.
- No. 4. South Ward.
- No. 5. North Sheen Ward.
- No. 6. Kew Ward.

No. 1.—North Ward.

I do hereby determine that North Ward shall comprise so much of the borough of Richmond as is contained within a line commencing at a point on the municipal borough boundary in the River Thames at the bridge where the London and South Western Railway (Windsor Line) crosses the said river and running thence in a north-easterly direction along the centre of the said railway to a point opposite the corner of the Old Deer Park wall near Park-lane, thence to and along the said Deer Park wall as far as the private road leading to Kew Observatory, thence along the centre of such private road and Clarence-street in a south-easterly direction to the centre of Kew-road, thence in a north-easterly direction along the centre of Kew-road to the junction of Lower Mortlake-road, continuing thence along the centre of Lower Mortlake-road to the point where the same passes over the centre of the London and South Western Railway from Richmond to Kensington, thence along the centre of the said railway in a northerly direction past Kew Gardens Station to the point where the Kew parish boundary intersects the said railway, thence following the said Kew parish boundary in a south-westerly direction intersecting Mortlake-road to a point at the junction of Sandycombe-road, Station-road, Kew Gardens-road, and Broomfield-road, thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Broomfield-road to the centre of Kew-road, thence in a southerly direction along the centre
