The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the thirtieth day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called ‘the said benefice’) of North Willingham, in the county of Lincoln, and in the diocese of Lincoln.

“Whereas the late Henry Robert Boucherett, of North Willingham aforesaid, by his will, dated the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, gave and devised (inter alia) the said advowson, subject, as therein mentioned, to certain uses which have since determined, or failed to take effect, and ultimately (so far as material to these presents) to the use of each of the sons born during the testator's lifetime of Frederick St. John Newdigate Barne for the life of such son without impeachment of waste and after his decease to the use of his first and other sons successively in tail general.

“And whereas the said testator died on the eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

“And whereas Captain Miles Barne, of Sotterley Hall, Wangford, in the county of Suffolk, the eldest son of the said Frederick St. John Newdigate Barne, was born on the fifteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and Lieutenant Michael Barne, R.N., of Hill House, Belstead, near Ipswich, in the said county of Suffolk, the second son of the said Frederick St. John Newdigate Barne, was born on the fifteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

“And whereas the said advowson is, together with other hereditaments, subject, in priority to the limitations above mentioned, to a mortgage in fee simple in favour of Charles Henry Fehler Christie, of Ongar, in the county of Essex, Esquire, and Daniel Conner Lathbury, of No. 5, Sydney-place, in the county of London, Esquire.

“And whereas the said Miles Barne and Michael Barne are desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of North Willingham should be transferred to and be
