Comberg, Septemb. 4.

THE Forces of this Crown, and those of *Lithuania*, are now encamped near *Wisnowiec*; The Artillery is marched from hence to joyn them; and the King, who continues his Resolution of making the Campaign in Person, is going to put himself at the Head of the Army, being accompanied by the Prince his Son. The Tartars are drawing together in the Country of *Budzick*, to oppose our Forces, and particularly to hinder their entrance into *Moldavia*, which is thought to be the design in Hand. The Envoy from the Cham of *Tartary* is sent home again with this Answer, That the King of *Poland* will not enter upon any Negotiation or Treaty of Peace without the Concurrence of the Emperor and the Republick of *Venice*, his Allies. The *Muscovites* continue very quiet, and seem to have no intention of attempting any thing against the Tartars this Campaign.

From the Imperial Camp near Peter Waradin, Sept. 11. On the 5th instant the Army marched to *Nestin*, and the 6th to *Bommonster*; where we rested the 7th. That day two Battalions making 1000 Men, with some dismounted Troopers and Dragoons were detached to serve on Board the Barks and Gallies Commanded by the *Marquis de Fleury*. The 8th we marched to *Geroviz*, and came on the 9th to this place, having by reason of the difficulties of the ways been obliged to separate, and to march in several small Bodies. We are now encamped in an advantageous Post, having a broad Ditch before us, several Hills on our Right, and the *Danube* on our Left and behind us; Orders are given to lay a Bridge over the *Danube*, as well for the conveyency of Foraging on the other side the

River, as for maintaining a Communication with General *Veterani*, who according to our last advice was encamped with the Forces from *Transilvania* within 3 Leagues of *Caransfebes*. On the 5th, seven Bassas with the Forces under their Command, passed the *Sava*, and posted themselves at *Semler*; On the 8th the *Vilier* followed with the rest of the Ottoman Army; and they are now very busie in Fortifying their Camp: We have no certain account of their strength; but understand they have lately received Reinforcements from *Bosnia* and other Parts: They have laid a Bridge over the *Danube* at *Belgrade*; where *Teckley* and *Bassa Hali* arrived some days ago with divers Barks laden with Provisions: A Body of 6000 Turks, under the Command of three Bassas are encamped near *Temeswar* to cover that place; into which they have lately put a great Convoy of Provisions. The Auxiliary Forces have all joyned us. 'Tis believed we shall continue here some days longer to get the best Information we can of the Posture and Design of the Enemy, and then advance towards them.

Hydelberg, Septemb. 23. A Body of French Troops have passed the *Rhine*, and lie at present in the Country of *Durlach*; whereupon two Regiments of Imperial Curassiers, one of Dragoons, and one of Hussars, are marched to joyn with the Troops that are posted at *Sintshheim*; and the Duke of *Wirtemberg* is following that way with another Detachment from the Confederate Camp, under the Command of the Margrave of *Bareith*, which is at present near *Eberstein*.

Mentz, Septemb. 24. On the 22d General *Thungen*, Governor of this City, marched from hence with a Detachment of this Garrison to joyn the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, who was then moving towards *Ebernburg*; Last Night they had their Quarters

Quarters at *Crenznae*, which they have begun to Fortifie, and this day two Regiments of Huslars Invested the Castle of *Ebernburg*. Yesterday and this day several pieces of Cannon for Battery and Mortars, with a considerable quantity of Ammunition, was sent from hence to the Confederate Camp, to be employed against that place. Some Deserters that are come hither from the French Army, say, That the Marechal de *Lorge* intends to pass the *Rhine* at *Philipsburg*, to give Our Forces a Diversion. The Margrave of *Baireith* continues encamped near *Eberstein* to observe him, and has already sent a Detachment over the *Rhine* to joyn the Imperial Troops that are posted on the other side, to secure the Country against the Enemies Incurfions. The Bridge which the Confederates have now at *Cjtsheim*, is ordered to be removed towards the *Rhin-gau*, where several Thousand Men of the Elector of *Trier's* Forces will pass it in order to joyn the Landgrave of *Hesse*. Our Elector is very dangerously Sick.

Cologne, Septemb. 26. They write from *Suiffersland* of the 17th instant, That Corn began to be scarce in the Catholick Cantons, and yet more in the Country of the Grifons, since the Prohibition which had been Published by order of the King of *Spain*, to supply them out of the *Milaneze*; That thereupon a General Assembly of the Grifons had been held at *Coer*, the Capital City of that Country; That the Spanish Ambassador having repaired thither, had acquainted them that their many Contraventions of the Treaties they have with the House of *Austria*, had induced the King his Master to take this Resolution of stopping all Commerce with them, and suspending the Payment of their Pensions; and at the same time had offered to restore Things upon their former Foot, on Condition they did recal their Troops out of the French Service: and that they were considering what Answer to return to this Proposal.

Falmouth, Septemb. 22. On Tuesday last Sir *John Ashby*, Admiral of the Blue, passed by this Port with the Squadron of Men of War under his Command to the Westward. On Wednesday came in the *Joseph*, *John Whitting* Commander, from *Bristol*.

Plimouth, Septemb. 25. The 21st instant came in here the *Indefatigable*, *George Stevens* Master, from *London*; and the day following the *St. Andrew*, the *Queen Mary*, and the *Sulima*, all three from *Rotterdam*, with another Vessel from *Dore*. On the 23d sailed from hence Their Majesties hired Ship the *Prince of Orange*, with several Merchant Ships under her Convey bound for *Wales* and *Ireland*. The same day came in five Dutch Privateers;

four of which Sailed again the 24th to the Westward. This day arrived here the *Thomas and Francis*, and the *Rebecca*, both of *London*, and from *Amsterdam*, the first bound for *Lisbon*, and the other for *Cadiz*.

Whitehall, Sept. 28. Sir *John Macklaine* Chief of the *Macklaines*, and Proprietor of the Island of *Mull*, in the West-Highlands in *Scotland*, having submitted himself to Their Majesties Government, and delivered up his Castles to be Garrisoned by Their Majesties Forces, in Testimony of his Sincerity is come hither, and has had the Honour to Kiss the Queens Hand, and is going to *Holland* to throw himself at His Majesties Feet: This Island of *Mull* having been the last Place in the Highlands that held out against Their Majesties.

The Mail from *Holland* of Friday last is not yet come in.
