## SCHEDULE.

*Premises to which this Order applies.*

(1.) The premises known as the Pit Heap Piggeries and all the Allotment Gardens adjoining them, situate within the borough of Wallsend.

(2.) All premises situate within that part of the borough of Wallsend which is bounded on the east by West-street, on the north by part of the North road, on the west by the borough boundary, and on the south by the Main Road to Newcastle.

(3.) All premises situate within that part of the borough of Wallsend which is bounded on the north by the Main Road to North Shields, on the south by the North Eastern Railway which runs from Newcastle to Tynemouth, on the east by Limekiln-road, and on the west by Glover's-row.

## No. 1078.—ENGLAND, WEST COAST—FISH-GUARD HARBOUR APPROACH.

*Strumble Head—Date of Establishment of Permanent Light and Fog Signal.*

With reference to Notices to Mariners Nos. 351 and 940 of 1906:—

The Trinity House, London, has given notice, dated 2nd August, 1907, that on or about 20th January, 1908, a white group flashing light, showing groups of four flashes in quick succession every fifteen seconds, thus:—flash, three-tenths of a second; eclipse, two seconds; flash, three-tenths of a second; eclipse, two seconds; flash, three-tenths of a second; eclipse, two seconds; flash, three-tenths of a second; eclipse, two seconds; flash, three-tenths of a second; eclipse, seven and eight-tenths seconds, elevated 148 feet above high water, and visible in clear weather seaward from a distance of 18 miles, will be established in a white cylindrical tower, 55 feet high, now being erected on the summit of Ynys Oneu, off Strumble Head, the light power being 400,000 candles; the light will be obscured over

the land from the bearing of N. 52° E., through north, to N. 82° W.

On the same date a fog explosive, which during thick or foggy weather will give two reports in quick succession every ten minutes, will be established at the lighthouse.

Approximate position, lat. 52° 1½' N., long. 5° 4¼' W.

When the above named light and fog-signal are established, the present provisional light and fog-signal on Strumble Head will be discontinued.

## No. 1079.—FRANCE, WEST COAST.

*Gironde River—Wreck-Buoy in Southern Approach Withdrawn.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 229 of 1907:—

The French Government has given further notice, dated 27th July, 1907, that the green buoy marking the wreck of the steamship which sank to the south-westward of Banc des Olives, in the southern approach to the Gironde River, in approximately lat. 45° 28' 45" N., long. 1° 13' 50" W., has been withdrawn.

## No. 1080.—MEDITERRANEAN—CORSIKA.

*Port Ajaccio Citadel Light—Character Altered.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 484 of 1907:—

The French Government has given further notice, dated 26th July, 1907, that on the 5th of August the character of the Citadel Light, Port of Ajaccio, would be altered from white fixed to a white group flashing light showing groups of two flashes every ten seconds, thus:—flash, seven-tenths of a second; eclipse, two and one-tenth seconds; flash, seven-tenths of a second; eclipse, six and five-tenth seconds, the light power being 30,000 candles, in other respects it will be as before. The provisional light would be discontinued on the same date.

Approximate position, lat. 41° 55' N., long. 8° 44½' E.
