**ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.**

(DATED 10TH SEPTEMBER 1907.)

**WARWICKSHIRE (GOOSEBERRY MILDEW)
ORDER OF 1907.**

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Application of the Order.

1. This Order shall apply to the administrative county of Warwick and the county boroughs of Birmingham and Coventry and the boroughs of Royal Leamington Spa and Warwick.

Definitions.

2. In this Order—

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries:

“The Local Authority” means as regards any District described in the first column of the schedule hereto, the council mentioned in the second column of that schedule:

“Disease” means the disease affecting gooseberry and currant bushes which is known as *Sphaerotheca mors-uvae* or American gooseberry mildew; and “diseased” means affected with disease:

“Bush” includes a cutting, seedling, or other plant.

Notification of Disease.

3.—(1.) The occupier of any premises on which there is a bush which is diseased or suspected of being diseased shall forthwith notify the fact to the clerk to the Local Authority, or to some person authorised by the Local Authority to receive such notices, and where practicable a specimen showing the disease or suspected disease shall accompany the notice.

(2.) If any person knowingly fail to give a notice required by this Order to be given by him he shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

Measures for Prevention of the Spread of Disease.

4.—(1.) The Local Authority on receiving in any manner notice of the existence or supposed existence of disease shall take such steps as may be necessary to determine whether the disease exists, and the area covered by diseased bushes, or by bushes to which the disease is likely to spread, and shall cause a notice to be served on the occupier of any land within that area requiring him to adopt such measures for prevention of the spread of the disease as are authorised by this Article.

(2.) A notice under this Article shall require—

(i.) the immediate spraying of all diseased bushes which have not shed their leaves and of all bushes in contact with such diseased bushes with a solution of liver of sulphur (containing not less than 1 oz. of liver of sulphur to two gallons of water) or with
