NORFOLK (SWINE-FEVER) (MOVEMENT FROM MARKETS) ORDER OF 1907.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Extent of Application of Order.

1. This Order applies to the Area described in the Schedule hereto, hereinafter referred to as "the Scheduled Area."

Regulation of Movement of Swine from Markets and Saleyards.

2.—(1.) The movement of swine from any market or saleyard (not being in a Swine-Fever Infected Area) in the Scheduled Area, shall be subject to the following provisions of this Order.

(2.) If the market or saleyard is specially authorised by the Local Authority under the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1903, or under the Swine-Fever (Movement from Ireland) Order of 1904, the movement of the swine exposed at the market or saleyard
