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Rome, Sept. 20.

**T**HE Cardinal de Fourbin had this week a long Audience of the Pope, about the Differences that are still depending with the Court of France; and took that occasion, in the Name of the French King, to recommend to him the Archbishop of Paris for a Cap at the next Promotion of Cardinals. The Marquis d'Arquin, Father to the Queen of Poland, is named to that Dignity by the King of Poland, and he has written to all the Cardinals, to give them Notice of it: But the Pope, upon the Applications that have been made to him of this kind, has plainly enough discovered that he intends to advance to the Cardinate those Persons he himself has pitch'd upon, before he makes a Promotion in favour of the Crowns. The Resolution continues of making Civita Vecchia a Free Port, and we are told that it will be established on the same Foot as is that of Ancona.

Madrid, Sept. 18. The New Council de Medios continues to meet thrice every week at the House of the President of Castille: The Decrees they have already published, about suspending the Payment of Pensions, and the obliging all Persons that have obtained any new Titles in Castille since 1680 to pay a certain Sum of Money into the Kings Treasury, will be strictly executed; and several others are now forming by them, to raise Moneys for carrying on the War. 'Tis said that they intend to retrench divers Expences in the Royal Household which are thought unnecessary, and to make other Reforms; from whence it's hoped great Advantages will in a short time result to this Monarchy. We hear from Cadix, That a Galleon is arrived there richly laden from the West-Indies. From Barcelona they write, That the Spanish Fleet under the Command of Don Pedro de Corbette came before that Port the 4th instant, where four Spanish Men of War that had been at Oran joyned them, and three more were expected from Cadix. 'Twas said that they had Orders to sail to the Coasts of Italy. The last Advices from Catalonia tell us, That the Spanish Army commanded by the Duke de Medina Sidonia had, about the end of the last month, quitted their Camp at Moulin, to observe the Enemy, who were retired farther into the French Territories, being very much weakened by the Detachments they had sent towards Dauphiné.

Several Regiments of Foot, now in Catalonia, are ordered to pass into the Milaneze.

Warsaw, Sept. 14. The last Letters from Lemberg inform us, That the King of Poland arrived the 7th instant at Pomorzane, about six miles from our Camp; where he intended to hold on the 12th a great Council of War, to take final Resolutions about the march of the Forces, and the Designs of the Campagne. The Tartars are at present very quiet on our Frontiers; They drew lately together, to the number of 7 or 8000, and expected a Body of 5000 Turks to joyn with them, in order to attack Sorocke on the Niefter; but the Peles having reinforced that Garrison, and supplied them with Provisions and Ammunition, the Enemy was thereby discouraged from pursuing their intended Enterprize, and retired towards Buczack; Whither their Troops that were detached for the Assistance of the Turks in Hungary are likewise returning. The Moscovites have not attempted any thing this Summer against the Tartars, as they gave out in the beginning of the Year they would, which confirms us in the belief that there is some Treaty in hand between them.

From the Imperial Camp near Perer Waradin, Sept. 16. We have fortified our Camp, and are now laying two Bridges over the Danube: It's said that so soon as they are finish'd, the Duke of Croj will be sent with part of the Army to joyn the Forces that lie on the other side that River, under the Command of General Veterani and General Truchses, in order to some Enterprize against Temeswaer, Giula, or Fena. Our Fleet of Barks and Gallies is posted near this place, and is of great use to us; and some of them have been almost as far as Belgrade, to get Intelligence of the Enemies Motions. The Grand Visier is still encamped with the Ottoman Army near Belgrade, consisting, as we are informed, only of 40000 Janizaries and Spahi's, besides Arnautes; of the latter great numbers are said to desert. About the beginning of this month 8000 Turks passed the Save, and posted themselves at Semlin, and began to repair the Works which the Enemy cast up the last Year for the Security of their Camp; but we hear now that they are retired from thence. Several Turkish Parties have likewise passed the Save, to make Incurfions into Sclavonia, in which they have had but little Success, meeting for the most part with such

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Opposition, as that they were forced to retire with loss. The *Turks* have laid two Bridges over the *Danube*: There are many French Officers in their Army.

*Plymouth, October 4.* Yesterday came into this Port from Cruising the *Russel* Galley, of 18 Guns and 8 Patereroes, *Andrew Elton* Commander; and the *Newport of Dover*, of 10 Guns and 6 Patereroes, *Joseph Phines* Commander.

*Cowes, in the Isle of Wight, Octob. 5.* Last night came hither one of the Sea-men of the Ship *Orange* of *London*, commanded in her Voyage outward for the *East-Indies* by *Capt. Udber*, who died there, and homeward by *Capt. Price*; who on the 18th of *May* last arrived at the *Cape of Good Hope* from *Bengal* and *Madras*; and found there 11 Dutch *East-India* Ships: About 8 days after, the said Ship *Orange* and two of the Dutch Ships were forced a-shoar, and lost by extremity of Weather; all the Men except three Dutch-men being saved, and some of the Goods. The remaining nine departed from the *Cape* on the 17th of *June*, on their Voyage home; and on the 2d of *September*, in 45 North Latitude, met six French Men of War, the Admiral of whom, with two others, engaged the Dutch Admiral: but, after a Fight of three hours, the French tack'd, and stood away before the Wind Westward, by which it's believed they were bound to the *West-Indies*. The Dutch Admiral was so disabled, that she sunk within three hours after, all the Men being lost, except 12, who came on board the Ship this Sea-man was in, being the Vice-Admiral, call'd the *Unicorn* of *Zealand*. The Weather at that time was so tempestuous, that though this and the other Ships were not far distant from her, yet they durst not put out their Boats to give her any Assistance. The rest of the Ships kept together three or four days, plying upon a Wind; after which, one of their Company was separated from them in a Fog; the other seven proceeded on their Voyage, and came to an Anchor on Thursday last upon the Coast of *Zealand*, four of them being bound for *Amsterdam*, one for *Rotterdam*, and one for *Zealand*; but on Saturday last the said Vice-Admiral was forced from her Anchors, and came yesterday to *Spithead*.

This day arriv'd here a small Vessel from *Newport*, whence she came yesterday morning, and brings Advice, That the English Forces that are ordered to return for *England* were then embarking at *Ostend*. A Dutch Buss outward bound in her Ballast is lost on the back of this Island, but the Men saved.

*Portsmouth, October 5.* Last Saturday in the Evening appeared in sight of this place about 60 Sail of Merchant-men, who are since come to *Spithead*, and prove to be part of the Dutch homeward-bound *St. Tubes* Fleet that failed from hence the last week, being forced back by the strong Eastwardly Winds. Yesterday came in the *Greenwich* Frigate from the Eastward.

*Deale, October 7.* Yesterday came into the *Downes* Vice-Admiral *Rooke*, with 10 Sail of Second-rate Ships from *Portsmouth*.

The Dutch Mail of Tuesday last is not yet come in.

Whereas a Report has been spread abroad, That there has lately hapned a second Earthquake at *Jamaica*, in which greatest part of the Island, and most of the Inhabitants, are said to have been destroyed: These are to give Notice, That, according to the freshest Advices from thence, there had hapned no Earthquake since that on the 7th of *June* last, and that the said Report is false and groundless.
