The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of the following Telegram, dated December 1, from His Majesty's Representative at Constantinople:—"Outbreak of cholera among pilgrims from Odessa in Sinope Lazaret. Medical inspection imposed on arrivals from

Sinope or Russian Black Sea Ports at Kavak and in case of cholera declared or suspected they will be repulsed to Theodosia. Disinfection and medical inspection imposed on arrivals from Russia by land at Tchataldja and they will be taken in special train or special carriages to Constantinople and taken on board. Two days' quarantine imposed on arrivals from Kustendje at Kavak. Article 10, paragraph 4, to be applied to pilgrims now at Sinope.
