N Tuesday last came in the Alice and Francis from London, from whence having taken in her lading of Tinne, intending for Smirna, on Satur 'ay the fet sail with a fair wind; ince which are put in here three French thips with Salt for the Grande Partie, bound for Rosen ; four Vessels from Wales, one Dover Vessel from St. Martins with Salt and Brandy, two or three others with the fame lading belonging to the place.

to this place, and one fhip from the Cavaries. Rome, July 7. The Pope has not been a little pleafed of late with the fuccels of his foveral Negotiations with Forreign Princes for the fuccors and affiftance of the Republick of Venice against the Outoman Forces, and particularly, that the Spanish Ambassadour on Thursday last in an Extraordinary Audience delivered him a Letter from the Queen Regent of spain, by which he acquainted him that upon the defires of His Holinels she had given Orders to the Viceroy of Maples to fend away the two Squadrons of Naples and sicily, to joyn with thole others of His Holinels and the Knights of Maltha ; that the had likewife commanded him to alsign the fum of 50 thouland Dollers to be preferrly paid for the advancement of that Service, and had given command that the forces which were there raifed for the defence of Milan, should be sent into Candia, sor the defence of that place. The Abbot Aynoldi also acquainted the Pope, that the great Duke of Tuscany had given Order to the Officers of a Regiment of foot entertained by him in Dalmatia, to pathe from thence into Candia, having taken order for recruits to compleat the faid Regiment.

Yesterday the Duke de Chaulnes, Ambassadour from His Most Christian Majesty had an Audience from the Pope, wherein he declared the King His Massers intentions of recalling him from that Emploiment, and accordingly took his leave, and is now beginning his formal Vists to the Colledge, in order to his departure, and 'tis faid the Duke de Viexville is expected to be fent hither under the same Character.

The Pope continues more and more to gain the affections of the people, and for this end has thought fit fo far to oblige them, as to allow two dayes in every week for publick acceffe, without any diffinction of perfons.

The businels of *Caftro* ftill occasions matter of discourse and trouble to the Court. On the 28th. past the Duke of *Parma's* Minister made a Solemn Offer of the Moneys which the Duke his Master was obliged to have formerly paid for the Dis-incameration of one half of that Dutchy, which being refuted, several Protestations were passed on each fide, and the faid Minister left his Money behind him as formally depositoric.

An Ambassadour is fuddenly expected here from Portugal, for whole Reception the late Cardinal Farnefe's Palace is furnishing and preparing, but as yet no Nuncio is nominated to be fere into that Kingdome.

Warfaw, July 14. The Interest of the young Prince of Mofcory is much advanced here, his Offers feeming very advantageous to this Kingdome, and his friends daily affuting us of much faithfulnefs in the execution of them, of which they promife full affurances shall be given even before the Election. 'Tis faid His Majefty is not at all reloved to lead a Monaslick life after his retirement from the Crown, and is much prefied by divers perfons, who were formerly of a contrary judgment, to alter his Refolution of quitting the Government, at least till he shall be affured of a firm fertlement of a yearly Revenue to his fatisfaftion ; but His Majefly ftill continues fixed to his declared Resolution.

The Nobility of the Palatinats have already met together, to prepare matters against the more General Assembly, and have dispatch away a Courrier to the Archbishop of Gnesse, defiring him to give them a true account of what he knows of any matters relating to the Duke of Neuburg, in reference to the future Election; telling him that they intend to meet again the 15th instant near Nechowitz in their Arms, and from thence to march for Warsaw, as soon as the lesser Assembles shall be ended.

From Ukrania we are advifed that the Molcovites Army is divided into three Bodies, and marches with great fuccels, having retaken all thole places which the Great Duke had former'y loft, even as far as the Dniper. That Radamanofki, who commands one part of the Army, had forced the Traytor Brachewiski to leave the Field, and to retire with his forces towards Human; that he held intelligence with Czierko, and had defign'd to joyn their forces, and turn them upon the Tartars; and that Major General Stackowiski, who commanded another part of the Army, wat marched sgainft Dorofensko, General of the Rebel Coffacks, whom be had obliged to r.ife the Siege of Biala Cierko, after a fharp Engagement, in which he killed above 5000 of his men, forcing him with the remainder of his forces to demand the affiftance of the Tartars.

Legorne, July 18. This week arrived feveral French Ships from Smirna, particularly the St Foseph of Marfeilles in 31 dayes from Smirna, and 6 f om Maltha, informs us, that they left behind them at Smirna 5. French Ships, one Ship of Meffina, and one English Merchant Ship ; and that the Dutch Convoy were also there, and might in 15 or 20 dayes depart thence, intending to this place ; their Convoy of two men of War being returned to them from Conftantinople, where they had landed their Agent ; they farther lay, that the Turkish Fleet, confisting of 54 Gallies, and between 25 and 30 Men of Warr belonging to Barbary, were part of them in the Port of Scio, and the reft at Khodes, intending to take the first fair opportunity to fuccour their Army in the Isle of Candia ; that about 40 dayes fince 34 of the Turkish Gallies and 10 Men of War, had met with Cavalies della Scala, and Captain Georgio Maria, two famous Privateers, who though with that valt diladvantage, bravely defended themfelves for a day and one night, but were at laft over power d, the Cavalier taken , and the Captain killed : That the Venetian Armata was cruifing about Ganea very firong and couragious, attending the motion of the Turks, and that Captain Cardi with a Ship of Maltha in his Company, had taken 2 F ench Barks laden with provifions for Canea, and Captain Pietro Franceschi another Prife of confiderable value, bound for the fame place, and abott 40 Slaves.

The St. Mark of Marfeilles, arriving in 34 days from Smirna, tells us that they lett at Mile 8 Christian Privateers; viz:4 Ships of Maltha, with the Captains Angeli, France [chi, Cardi, and Martino, but gives us no other advice, but only that the Venetian Armata was riding about Candia and Canes, earneftly expecting the appearance of the Turks, and that the Popes Gallis with the Squadron of Maltha were fafely arrived at Candia.

From Algier we find that a late difference is happened between that place and the Garrison of Tangier, occasioned by a Boat armed out from this latter place, to secure some Vessels with Provisions, which were coming in for the use of that Garrison, who discovering a Briganine at lea, which way fuppoled to belong to *Tithuan* or *Sally*, after fome fmall skirmith the proved to be an *Algerine*. In the mean while two-*Algier* men of Warr patting by, examining more the Complaints of the Turks, then the miltake which cauled them, feiled the people which were in the Boat, and carried them fnto *Algier*, where they yet remain fecured till a right underftanding be again fectled between them.

Bruffells, July 27. After leveral confultations about the fubfidies and proportions to be charged on the leveral Provinces under the Spanish Jurifdiction, the States of Flande s having fatisfaction given them in fome difficulties arising in the debue, by the addrefles of the Sieur d'Erenbaut Prefilent of the Council-thete, they came to a ref lution of furnishing their proportion for the payment of 2000 men after the rate formerly allowed for the pay of each fouldier.

The States of Brabant allow likewife the fame proportion, befides the furn of 4z thousand Crowns, which this City has grante to the Marquils de Castel Rodrigo, to be caled from the trouble and burthen of quartering fouldiers.

On Tuesday last His Excelency took a view of two Spanish Regiments which were drawn up in the Park near this City, one of them being the Regiment of the Count de Monterey, which was found to ce slit of 1100 men, the other of Don Francisco Antonio Azurre of 1250 men. The next day arrived at Vorst a league diffaut from this place the Italian Regiment of Foot commande. by the Steur Caraffa, from the Garrison of Cambray.

The Prince D' Arembergue having on Tueidar haft his Oath administred to him for the Government of Burgua.iy, has fince received the Complements of all the great Perfors and Commanders about this Town, and on Thursday departed hence s to take possession of this new Charge, lying that night a Namur.

The Marquils de Callel Radrigatome few dayes fince lent out his Orders to the Officers of the Army to draw their forces to feveral places where he intended they should lie encamped for fome time. The places appointed for their Encampments were for one party near Valenciennes, a lecond between Ghent and Bruges, and a thi d near Lauvaine, but this refolution not pleating the States, the Orders are fince countermanded.

• Our late Letter's from Spain inform us that Don Juan had by a Letter of the 4th inftant, acquainted Her Majefly the Que:n Regent, that he was fully faitsfied with her Commands, and had already fent pert of his Baggage on Board, and intended to embark himfelf for Flanders by the 20th this moneth.

Hambourgh, July 28. Yesterday arrived here the Bischop of Besters f om his Emploiment as Ambassfadour Extraordinary from His Most Christian Majesty in the Polish Court, attended by a Train of about 50 perfons, and hath taken up his Lodging with Monsieur Bidelle the French Resident here. Here arrived also Monsieur Erilmans the Duke of Neubourgh's Envoy from Stockholms, after a Visit given by him to the Queen of Sweden and the French Ambassfadour, he intends to morrow to depart hence for Duffeldorp. Our Weighbouring forces continue ftill in their Quarters.

From the Rhine we are told that the Lorrainers fuce their return from Flanders having committed feveral diforders within the Palatinate, by taking away the best of their horles, and leifing on the Caffle of Hoheneck , in which they placed a Garrifon, His-Highnels the Elector Palatine has been obliged to draw together a Body of about 8000 men, with a furable Artillery, and has ordered all his Vaffals to make their appearance, to the end that he may take fuch a course as may best conduce to the peace and fecurity of his Dominions, and in the mean time has lent four T cops of .H rie and two of Dragoons to Luterne, a place upon the Frontiers of Wefiratia, adjoyning to the Lorrain Garrifons, the better to attend their motion, and prevent their incursions. Another party of his forces was ordered to Creatznach, but were refuled passage by some of the Elector of Mayence's people at the Caftle of Neu-Baumberg, who killed dne of his Officers ; whereupon the Elector Pa atine's forces immediately forced the place : which they afterwards razed and demoli.hed , fending the Garrison to Mayence,

From Denmark we are adviled that their fears are now over, and all things in a quiet pofture, the Court at Fred ricksburgh, but fuddenly expected at Copenhagen, and that a Regiment of Horfe formerly quarte ed in Holftein, was lately fent to Elfenor, to be quartered upon the Sea Coafts.

Brnges, July 29. Yesterday came in hither a confiderable Boly of Horse and Foot appointed by the Marquils de Castel Rodrigo to be quattered in Hutts round about this City. About 5000 French are within these few dayes come to Bergnes, where they are ordered into Quatters, which gives no small jealouse to the Neighbourhood.

The Plague is much decreased at Donay and other places of this Province.

Hague, July 31. The States have had many debates about the reformation of their Army, and 'tisfaid have at laft refolved to disband all fuch forces as have been raifed by them fince the year 1665, excepting onely one Regiment of Foot: intending ftill to keep up 431 Companies of Foot and 53 Troops of Houfe, in all amounting to fomewhat above 35000 men.

From Am/terdam we are informed of the fafe arrival at the Texel this last week of two ships from Ceylon , one from Batavia, two from Guiny, one from Cape Vert, belides divers they for other places i by fome of these we have adin have not had of late that fuccefs r, That the F which they promed themselves at Madagassar, having it feems over buiny engaged themfelves upon their arrival there, in a war between the N ig bouring Princes, in which they had loft a confiderable number of men ; that the reft being gro in high and imperious, would force the inhabitants to carry their Arms for them, who taking advantage of the opportunity, fell to heartily upon their new Lords, that they quickly deftroyed the greatest part of them, the remainder of them after many fufferings and hardships, retiring themselves in December last to Suratte, where not being in love with that place, they took the advantage of a French thip, and the 6th of April last arrived at the Cipe of Good Hope, waiting there for an opportunity of returning home.

Portsmouth, July 23. The Monmouth and Mary may this day go out for Spitthead, and two or three dayes hence the Soveraigne for the Thames. The reft of the fhips intended outwards are refitted, and may in few dayes be ready to fail.
