same meaning as that which the same terms have in the Spring Assizes Act, 1879.

19. This Order, unless earlier revoked, shall be in force during the continuance of the Spring Assizes, 1908.

Now therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by section 738 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and of all other powers in Him vested, is pleased to order that the said Order in Council of the second day of November, one thousand uine hundred and seven, shall be repealed, and the same is hereby repealed.
