Class) in the Civil Service or for Clerkships of the Second Division is held, a Boy Clerk who obtains from the Head of the Department in which he is serving leave of absence to attend such Examination may also, at the discretion of the Head of the Department, be allowed pay, at the usual rate, for the days during which he is attending the Examination.

16. Service Marks for each full period of three calendar months of actual approved service, subject to a maximum of twelve such periods will be allowed to Candidates attending Examinations for the following situations, viz.:—

Clerkships in the Second Division of the

Civil Service,

Second Class Clerkships (Lower Section) for Port Service in the Department of His Majesty's Customs,

Assistantships of Excise, Assistantships of Customs,

who are serving or have served as Boy Clerks; but the number of marks to be allowed for each period may be different at successive examinations.

17. In the promotions of permanent Civil Servants [Assistant Clerks (Abstractor Class) and others] under Clause 15 of the Order in Council of 29th November, 1898, not less than one and not more than two years' approved service as Boy Clerk or Boy Copyist may be allowed to reckon towards the six years' established service required by the said clause.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination of Candidates for registration as Temporary Boy Clerks will be held, under the foregoing Regulations, in London, Edinburgh, Dublin, Bristol, Liverpool, Southampton, Aberdeen, Glasgow, Belfast, and Cork, commencing on the 22nd September, 1908.

The number to be registered will depend partly on the requirements of the service, and partly on the number of Candidates who may show sufficient proficiency; but it is not likely to be less than 100, if so many shall be found competent: that is to say, 95 for service in London, Edinburgh, and provincial towns in England, Scotland, and Wales, and 5 for service in Dublin and provincial towns of Ireland exclusively.

No Candidate will be admitted to the Examination from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received, on or before the 27th August, an application, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary

at once.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES. (DATED 9TH JULY 1908.)

CHESHIRE (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1908. (No. 2.)

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Special Provision as to Movement to Markets, &c.

1.—(1.) Article 2 (Restriction on Movement of Swine in Scheduled Area) of the Cheshire (Swine-Fever) Order of 1908 (in this Order referred to as "the principal Order") shall not apply to the movement of swine from premises in the Scheduled Area to a market, fairground or saleyard in the Scheduled Area provided that the swine are accompanied by a Declaration in accordance with this Article.

(2.) In the case of movement to a specially authorised market or saleyard of swine marked as required by Article 5 of the principal Order, the Declaration shall be in the Form E set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908.

(3.) In the case of any other movement affected by this Article, the Declaration shall be in the Form B set forth in the said Schedule.

(4.) Every Declaration shall be signed by the owner of the swine or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose and shall be available only if made on the day of movement or the previous day.

(5.) The Declaration shall be delivered up in exchange for the licence for movement of the swine from the market, fairground or saleyard.

(6.) Swine, while being moved under this Order, shall so far as is practicable be kept separate from all other swine, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Declaration, and not elsewhere.

Short Title and Construction.

2. This Order may be cited as the CHESHIRE (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1908 (No. 2), and shall be read as part of the principal Order.
