Genova, October 25.

This week arrived here a Vessel from the Eastward, the Master whereof informs us, That he met the Spanish Fleet on the 15th instant near the Island of *Corfica*, sailing with a fair Wind towards *Naples*. We are told, That Orders are come from the Emperor, to excuse this Republick and the Territories of the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, from furnishing Winter-quarters for the German Troops; in lieu of which, 'tis supposed they have given a Sum of Money.

Turin, Novemb. 1. His Royal Highness recovers every day. The Forces are now separated, and going to their Winter-quarters. Yesterday passed through this City Count *Palfi's* Regiment of Horse on their march towards *Mantua*, where they had their Quarters the last Winter. The Regiment of Foot of *Lorraine*, and *Baltazar's* Dragoons, are to be in Garison here; and 1800 Horse and 1000 Foot are to remain at *Vigon*, to bridle the Garison of *Pignorol*, and hinder their raising Contributions upon the Country thereabouts.

Venice, October 31. On Sunday last parted from hence a Convoy for the *Levant*. The Senate have resolved to make considerable Levies for Reinforcing their Army (which is much weakened by the Siege of *Canea*) against the next Campagne. We hear, That the Troops which block up *Cazal* have taken 2000 Dubloens, which the French were sending thither for the use of the Garison. The Venetian Fleet is at *Napoli di Romania*; and the Captain-Bassia with that of the Turks at *Scio*.

Lemberg in Poland, October 16. The Court continues still at *Pomorzian*, where the King has been very much indisposed for several days, but is better at present; and so soon as the state of his health will permit, he intends to remove from thence to *Jawarow*. In the mean time, he has caused Circular Letters to be sent out, for the summoning a General Dyet; which, according to the Alternative establish'd between this Kingdom and the Great Dutchy of *Lithuania*, will be held for this time at *Grodno*, and is to meet on the 31 of *December*: In order whereunto, the Provincial Dyets are already appointed to assemble in the several Palatinates, for the chusing and instructing the Deputies they are to send to the said General Dyet. The Letters from our Army of the 11th instant tell us, That the Intrenchments they have made between the two Rivers, about a mile and half from *Caminiec*, were finished; and that 4000 Men were to be detached, who are to be posted there during the Winter, to streighten the Garison of *Caminiec*, and hinder their IncurSIONS; and that the rest of the Forces were about separating and going into Winter-quarters. The Town of *Sorock* on the *Neister*, which the *Poles* possessed themselves of the last Year, is now Belieged by 6000 Turks, 3000 Tartars, and 2000 Moldayians, who have with them 22 Pieces of Cannon. There is in it a good Garison, commanded by a brave, experienc'd Officer, who make a very stout Defence, having repulsed the Enemy in several Assaults with the loss of many of their men, among whom is *Balucke* Bassia, and several other Com-

manders of principal Note among the Turks and Moldavians: And the Castellain *Chelinsky* is drawing the Coffers and other Troops together about *Nemirov*, in order to attempt the Relief of this place.

Vienna, Novemb. 1. The Imperial Army in Hungary is separated, and Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is expected here in few days. The Troops, as well Auxiliary as others, are to have their Winter-quarters as near the Frontiers as can be conveniently, that so they may take the Field the earlier the next year. Orders are given for providing great Magazines at *Peter Waradin*, *Sigeth*, *Esscke*, and other places. The Fortifications of *Peter Waradin* are continued with great diligence, and the Pope has caused 60000 Florins to be remitted hither towards carrying on of that Work: The Turks are putting great Garisons in all their Frontier places, and pretend to quarter 15000 Men along the *Save*: They seem to be in some apprehension for *Giula* and *Jeno*, and have lately sent thither a Supply of Provisions and Ammunition; certain it is, That General *Peterani* and General *Truchses* are marching that way with the Forces under their Command, and, according to all appearances, they intend to attack those places before they put their Troops into Quarters. My Lord *Paget* is preparing for his departure towards *Turkey*.

Mentz, Novemb. 5. Our Garison is reinforced to 6000 Men, the greatest part of which are of the Troops of the Landgrave of *Hesse*. At *Coblentz* there are 5000 Men in Garison. 'Tis said that of the French about 20000 are quartered near the *Moselle*.

Heydelberg, Novemb. 8. The Winter-quarters for the Confederate Forces are now settled and assigned to every Regiment. The Head-quarter is to be at *Estlingen*, and General Count *de Styrum* has his at *Cronstadt*. The Garison of this City is, for the ease of the Inhabitants, to consist but of five Battalions, and three Squadrons of Horse and Dragoons; but several others will be quartered in the Villages near it, who upon occasion may quickly march hither. We work still on the Fortifications of this place, and particularly are repairing the Wall near the Gate of *Spire*, being favoured therein by the mildness of the Weather. The French have reinforced the Garisons of *Landau* and *Philipsburg*, and the rest of their Troops are gone into their Winter-quarters.

Cologne, Nov. 11. The French have put 12 Regiments into *Trier*, and 9 into *Montroyal*, and strong Garisons into their other places on the *Moselle*. The Elector Palatine has made an Agreement with the Bishop of *Munster* for several Regiments of his Troops to cover the Country of *Juliers* this Winter; and the Elector of *Cologne* has treated for 6000 *Brandenburgers*, who are to have their Winter-

ter-quarters in this Diocese. Two Battalions of Brandenburgers arrived here yesterday, which has made up our Garrison to 3000 Men.

Paris, November 10. The Letters from Pignorel of the 2d instant confirm the Duke of Savoy's Recovery, and tell us that his Forces separated on the first instant, to go into Winter-quarters. They write from *Toulon*, That the Count d'Estree failed on the 27th of the last month from the Isles of *Hieres*, with the Squadron under his Command, directing his Course towards the Coasts of *Italy*. The Count d'Avoux and Monsieur de Bonrepos, who are going Ambassadors from hence to the Courts of *Denmark* and *Sweden*, were yesterday at *Versailles* to receive their Dispatches. The Duke Administrator of *Wurtemberg* had yesterday Audience of the French King, to which he was conducted by the Marechal de *Lorge*, and the Marquis de *Barbeseux*, Secretary of State.

Brussels, Novemb. 12. The Elector of *Bavaria* has put off his Journey to *Flanders* for some days longer. The Prince of *Hannover*, who made this last Campagne in *Flanders*, is returned home. We are to have here this Winter a Garrison of 10000 Men: The same Number will be quartered in the Villages between this place and *Villebroek*; and good Garrisons are likewise put into *Louvain*, *Malines*, *Lier*, *Diest*, *Herental*, *Aerschot*, and other small places, which upon occasion may draw together in 48 hours. The French Troops are in their Winter-quarters. 'Tis said that at *Nismes* they are providing Stables for 8000 Horses.

Hague, November 14. The States of *Holland* met yesterday. We hear from *Hannburgh*, That Monsieur *Hop* had passed that place in his Journey to *Denmark*, whither he is gone in the quality of Envoy Extraordinary from this State. The Heer *Van Heckeren* departed two days ago with the same Character to the Court of *Hannover*. Prince *Waldeck* continues very ill at *Dufflin* in *Germany*: We are told, That he has written to the States-General, to thank them for all the Honour and Favour they have shewed him, and to recommend to them his Family. The Baron de *Lilienroot*, Envoy Extraordinary from *Sweden*, had two or three days ago a long Conference with the Deputies of this State. The last Letters from *Turin* tell us, That the Duke of *Savoy* grew better daily; his Fever, which was a continued one, had quite left him, and the violence of his Quartan Ague was very much abated.

Falmouth, Novemb. 5. This day came in an Ostender of 300 Tuns; she came from *Ostend* about 10 days ago in company of 30 Sail more, under the Convoy of two Men of War, who passed by this Harbor on Tuesday last: This Ship was separated from them off of *Scilly*, and forced back again. A Portuguese Snip of 12 Guns was in great danger of being driven ashore about 2 or 3 Leagues to the Eastward of this Harbor; but the Wind abating, she is come safe in.

Hull, Novemb. 7. On Saturday last put in here the *Mary Ann* of *London*, Christopher *Lyel* Master, bound home from *Archangel*.

Southampton, Nov. 6. There is come into this Port the *Swallow* Privateer of *Guernsey*, of 30 Tuns, and carrying 4 Guns and 40 Men, Capt. *John Gupper* Commander; who cruising on the Coast of *France*, espy'd on the 28th of the last month a Vessel in the Haven of *Demonville*, under the Fort; upon which, the next day he stood in close with the shoar, and sent his Lieutenant and 18 Men with 2 Boats into the Haven, who, notwithstanding the fire the Enemy made from the said Fort both with great and small Shor, possessed themselves of the Vessel, cut the Cables with which she was moored, and at last towed her away, and carried her to *Guernsey*; she was called the *St. Francis* of *Dorp*, of 40 Tuns, bound with several sort of Merchandises from *St. Malo* to *Roan*.

Purifmouth, Novemb. 8. On the 6th instant arrived at *Spithead* the *Kempthorne*, bound home from the *East Indies*: She came last from *Ireland*, in Company of Their Majesties Ship the *Antelope*, from whom she was separated near the *Lands-end*.
