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Rome, October 25.

HE Pope is very intent upon his Defign of making Civita Vecchia a Free Port: He has given Orders to hasten the Aqueducts and other publick Buildings that are making there at his Charge, and deligns, when they are finished, to go huntelf and tee them. A Bull is published here against Selling the Places of Clerks of the Chamber; and 'tis faid that the Pope intends to make feveral other Reforms

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Milan, Ottober 29. Our Governor, the Marquis de Leganez, continues still at Turin, to alfift at the Conferences that are held there about fetling the Winter-quarters. 'I'is faid, That an Agreement is made with the Great Duke of Tissing, and the Republick of Genous, for exempting their Territories from Quarters. From the Blockade of Cazal we have Advice, That the Marquis de Pianezza, who commands the Troops employed in that Service, had fent a Detchment to burn a wooden Bridge over the Po, to cut off the Communication which the Enemy has by means thereof with the Country on the other fide of the River; but they did not effect their Defign, by reason the French, upon Notice of it, had reinforced the Troops appointed for the Guard of the Bridge; fince which, the Marquis de Pianezza has caused several Fireworks to be prepared. in order to a tecond Attempt. The Suiffers are very uneafte at the late Prohibition against Supplying them with Corn out of this State: but have however not yet complied with the Terms upon which 'tis offered to be taken off. In the mean time, all amicable means have been made use of to accommodate this matter, and 'ris said that there is at present a Negotiation on foot for this purpole.

Warfaw, October 1. The King of Poland is still at Pomerzan, being recovered of his late Indisposition. The Troops are marching to their Winter-quarters, except 4000 Men, who are to be posted near Caminice, to observe that Garison during the Winter. The Turks and Tartars continue the Siege of Smocke on the Neister: The Place is very well defended, and the Encmy have lost a great many Men before it; but yet tis feared it will fall into their hands, unless it be speedily relieved; which the Castellan

of Chelm, who is drawing the Cossacks together about Nemirow, is faid not to be yet strong enough to attempt.

Vienna, Nov. 1. Prince Lewis of Baden was expected yesterday at Raab, in his return hither. The Imperial Army is leparated, and the Troops going into their Winter-quarters, except those commanded by General Veterali and General Truchses, who, it's believed, will attack Giula and 7000, before they betake themselves to their Quarters. The Emperor has resolved to make confiderable Levies for augmenting his Forces against Spring,

Dublin, Novemb. 3.
