Turin, Novemb. 15.

THE *Bavarian* Regiments, which were on their march towards *Germany*, are now countermanded: They make in all 3000 Men; part of them are to have their Winter-quarters in this City, and the rest not far from it. General *Casrara* will stay here all the Winter, and the Troops are so disposed of, that they may take the Field again early in the Spring. The Duke of *Schenberg* parted from hence this morning, on his Journey for *England*. The *Genoese* have at last agreed to pay the Contributions demanded by the German in lieu of Winter-Quarters; and thereupon the latter, who were moving towards the Frontiers of that Republick, are retired to a greater distance from them. The Garrison of *Vigon* took on the 7th instant several Wagons that were going with Provisions to *Pignerol*. His Royal Highness continues still on the ending hand.

Genoa, Novemb. 10. Two of the Great Duke of *Tuscany's* Gallies are expected here to lade and transport Silk into *France*, the Republick having deny'd that Privilege to the French Gallies, to avoid giving any offence to the Spaniards. 'Tis said likewise, That this Senate has agreed to pay the Germans 50000 Crowns, to be exacted from furnishing Winter-Quarters. We hear from *Naples*, That 8 Gallies are gone from thence with 800 Soldiers, to change the Garrison of *Port Leguona*.

Venice, Novemb. 14. The Letters from the *Morea* inform us, That the Turks had set down before the Castle of *Lepanto*, with a Body of 8 or 10000 Men, and opened Trenches against the Place; which might have been in great danger, had not extraordinary diligence been used in sending them Succors; upon whose arrival, the Enemy quitted that Enterprize, and retired, having lost above 400 Men in several Salleys the Garrison made upon them; wherein they likewise at the Turks from some of their Works. This day arrived here a Vessel from *Constantinople*, whence she came on the 10th of the last month; and brings an Account, That the News of the raising the Siege of *Canea* was received there with great joy; and that the French Ambassador at *Adrianople* had been to congratulate with the *Chimachan* thereupon; That the *Sultana* or the present Grand Signior was, on the 5th of *October*, delivered of two Sons, who are named *Ibrahim* and *Selim*, for which there had been publick rejoicing for five days together, by Illuminations, adorning the Shops, &c. The Grand Vicer was expected at *Adrianople* towards the end of this month.

Vienna, Novemb. 19. The last Advices from *Hungary* confirm, That the Imperial Armies in *Silavonia* and *Transylvania* are separated, and the Troops gone into their Winter-quarters. The *Ottoman* Army that lay about *Belgrade* is likewise brok up, and dispersed into Quarters; and the Grand Vicer him self is returned towards *Adrianople*; Monsieur *Heemskerke*, the Dutch Ambassador, being gone with him. The Count *de Truchses*, General of *Batalia*, is lately dead in *Upper Hungary*, where he commanded a separate Body of the Emperor's Force. His Imperial Majesty has declared General *Casrara*, who at present commands his Force in *Italy*, Vice-President of his Council of War. The new Levies and Recruits are making with great diligence in the Emperor's Hereditary Countries. The Electors of *Bavaria* has been ill for two or three days, but is very well again. My Lord *Paget*, Ambassador from Their Majesties of *Great Britain*, intends to set out from hence to morrow on his Journey towards *Turky*.

Frankfort, Nov. 26. We hear from *Alsace*, That the French Officers are very busie in all those parts, in making their Recruits; and that two new Regiments are raising,

which are to be maintained by the Country. The City of *Strasbourg*, besides what has been paid by the several Councillors and others to keep the Offices, has been forced to give the French King 100000 Crowns, to preserve their Constitution; and the same Sum they are to pay yearly during the War. They write from *Hydeberg*, That they work very hard on their new Fortifications, and hope to have finished them in a short time.

Cologne, Nov. 28. The French continue to provide Magazines, and to reinforce their Garrisons at *Trier* and other places on the *Rhine*; They do the like in *Alsace*. General *Flaminz* came by her yesterday, and will continue here a little time, to command the *Brandenburg* Troops quartered in this Diocese, in case there should be occasion of drawing them together. The States of this Archbishopsrick are now assembling at *Bon*.

Hamburg, Nov. 28. The Letters from *Copenhagen* tell us, That Monsieur *Hop*, Envoy Extraordinary from the States-General of the United Provinces, had on the 21st instant his first Audience of the King of *Denmark*; and that Monsieur *de Bonrepos*, the new French Ambassador, was shortly expected there. The Duke of *Hannover* is going to *Berlin*, to visit the Elector of *Prussia*; and great Preparations are making there for his Reception. They write from the Court of *Poland*, That *Te Deum* had been sung with much solemnity, for the raising the Siege of *Srocko* on the *Neister*.

Paris, Novemb. 28. The Letters from *Pignerol* of the 15th instant tell us, That the Duke of *Savoy* was returned to *Turin*; and that he had assisted at several Conferences about directing the Preparations for the next Campaign. The Troops under the Command of the Marquis *de Pianezza*, who block'd up *Cazal*, were separated and gone into Quarters in *Monterrat*. We are told from *Flanders*, That the French have put Garrisons into *Thuin* and *Chastelet*, which places they are fortifying; and that they design likewise to put a good Garrison into *Marchienne au Pont*. The Count *d'Esfree* was, by our last Advice, still at *Toulon*, with the Squadron under his Command. We hear from *Dunkirk*, That Captain *Jean de Barz* was come in there with about 20 Prizes, which he had taken out of the Dutch Eastland Fleet, together with a small Frigate that was one of their Convoys: About 15 or 16 of these Prizes are laden with Corn, and came from the *Baltick*. The Pope's Nuncio has had several Conferences with the Ministers here, to finish the Accommodation of the Differences that have so long depended between the two Courts.

Brussels, November 30. The Count *de Guisebr*, after having visited the new Fortifications that are making at *Chastelet*, on which are employed 3000 Soldiers and 3000 Peasants, is returned to *Namur*, where the Enemy make great Preparations of War; as they do likewise in their Frontier places in *Flanders*. They do all they can to hasten their Recruits, and pretend to have them complete by the first day of *January*. On the 24th instant three Men were taken, who were going with several Horses to *France*; since which two other persons have been secured here upon the same Account; and the Surintendant of the Forces is now employed in taking the Informations, in order to proceed against them with all severity. This week are come hither about 20 Soldiers, who have deserted the French Service.

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Hague, December 2. The States have received an Account, That Prince Waldeck died on the 19th of the last month at Dufflen in Germany, by whose Death are become vacant the Command of First Marechal de Camp General of the Forces of this State, and the Government of Maestricht; besides a Regiment of Horse, and another of Foot, whereof he was Colonel. The States General have, by their Placaets, published two days ago, forbid the going out of all Merchant Ships, except those designed to the East and West-Indies, and to Surinam; together with the Vessels employed in Fishing for Fresh Fish, and those Trading to England, Scotland, and Ireland, and to the Elbe, Weser, Ems, and on the Flemish Coasts. Monsieur Loutbe, Envoy from Denmark, is returned hither from Brussels, where he has been to solicit the Release of some Danish Ships that have been lately brought in by the Ostend Privateers. The States of Holland meet again on the 15th of this month. Our Fleet from Russia is all safely arrived in the Texell.

Kinsale, Nov. 10. On the 8th instant Their Majesties Ship the *Dorset*, Captain Carr Commander, brought into this Harbor a French Privateer of 24 Guns and 180 Men: He took her a week ago out of Cape-Clear, having two other Privateers in her Company, one of 40, the other of 30 Guns, who made all the Sail they could to get away; and this was taken without firing a Gun. Here is also in this Harbor one of the Prizes which the *St. Albans* took upon the Banks of Newfoundland, being a Vessel of about 120 Tuns.

Deal, Nov. 25. On the 23d instant sailed out of the Downs to the Westward 30 Sail of Merchant Ships, under Convoy of the *Wolwich*; and this morning the rest of the outward-bound fleet, being about 150 in number, set Sail, under the Convoy of the *Defiance*, *Warrington*, *Cambridge*, *Prince of Orange*, *Unity*, and *Hawk* Fire-ship.

Whitehall, Nov. 27. This day Don Andres Zenites d. Lugo, Gentleman of the Bed Chamber to his Electoral Highness of Bavaria, and his Envoy Extraordinary to Their Majesties to notice the Birth of the Electoral Prince his Son, had his Audience of the King and Queen, to which he was conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.
