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Rome, Novemb. 15.

THE Express which the Cardinal de *Fourbin* sent lately to *Paris*, returned hither on Tuesday last; and the next day the Cardinal had a long Audience of the Pope about the French Bishops, who still want their Bulls, but we do not yet hear what effect it had. The Pope has sent new Orders to hasten the publick Buildings that are making at *Civita Vecchia*, which he is very desirous to have finished by *Easter*, intending to go thither himself about that time. The last Letters from *Naples* tell us, That *Don Pedro de Corbete* Admiral of the Spanish Fleet was very ill, and for that reason had been brought ashore; and it was said that the Fleet would Sail from thence to *Palermo* towards the end of *January*.

Genova, Novemb. 15. This Republick has at last agreed to pay the Germans 50000 Crowns for Winter-quarters; and the Imperial Troops that were marching towards our Frontiers are thereupon retired. From *Florence* we have an account, That the Count de *Fuquer* was arrived at that Court from the Elector of *Bavaria* to Notify the Birth of the Electoral Prince his Son. By a Vessel come lately from *Toulon* we understand, That the Count d'*Estree* was still in that Port with the Squadron under his Command.

Zalkiew in Poland, Novemb. 8. The King returned hither the 6th instant with the whole Court from *Pemarsan*, and after a stay of about 3 Weeks in this Place, intends to go to *Grodno* in *Lithuania* to be present at the opening of the Diet, which is to meet there on the 30th of the next Month. The Armies of this Crown, and of the Great Dutchy of *Lithuania* are indeed separated, but the Troops are quartered so near the Frontiers that they may in a short time form themselves into a Body, in case there be need of it. By Letters of the 26th past from Colonel *Ripper*, Commandant of *Srocke*, we have the Confirmation of the great loss the Enemy suffered in the Siege of that Place, which they were forced to quit after three Weeks of open Trenches. Since which the Turks and Tartars have sent several Parties towards *Cominice*, with a design as its believed to put into the place a fresh Supply of Provisions and Ammunition; and

it is our care to prevent them; and the rather, for that the Fort we have lately built within two Leagues of *Cominice*, and Garrisoned with 4000 Men, does so inconvenience that Garrison by hindring them from drawing any Provisions, as they used to do, out of the Neighbouring Country, that they will hardly be able to subsist this Winter without being supplied by frequent Convoys from *Moldavia* and the Territories of the Tartars.

Vienna, Novemb. 26. The last Letters from *Upper Hungary* give an account, That the Imperial Troops, which had lain for some time under the Command of Major General Count de *Scellicke* about *Segedin* on the *Theyff*, were on their march towards *Transilvania*; and that General *Veterani*, understanding that the Turks who appeared lately in a considerable Body near *Temeswar*, were separated and gone into Quarters, had resolved to do the like with the Troops under his Command, and to that end was on his march with them to their old Quarters in *Transilvania*. The Fortifications of *Peter Waradin* are almost finished, and a strong Garrison is left in that place, which is now made our Frontier towards *Belgrade*. The Advices from thence confirm the Grand Visier's departure for *Adrianople*, after having assigned the Winter-quarters for the Ottoman Troops, of whom about 15000 are to be lodged near the *Danube* and the *Sava*.

Metz, Nov. 29. We have an account from *Trier* that divers Vessels laden with Ammunition passed the last Week from *Metz* to *Montroyal*; and that others were shortly expected there from *Straßburg*. The Confederate Forces are quartered in the Countries of *Fulda*, *Veteran*, *Rhingau*, &c. in such manner that they may quickly draw together; and the Officers are commanded to remain at their Quarters.

Hydelberg, Decemb. 2. We continue to work on our new Fortifications with all possible diligence, and hope to have perfected them in a short time. General *Hederslof* Commands the Troops in Garrison here, and omits nothing that may contribute to the security of this City. The States of the *Upper Rhine*, who assembled lately to settle the Winter-quarters are separated again. The Officers of the Imperial and Confederate Troops, quartered near the *Rhine*, are making their Recruits, which they must have compleat early in the Spring.
