

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Castle Hedingham, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Castle Hedingham.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Caroline Augusta Mitchell, being the person whose consent as patron is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the first and second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and six (in testimony of which consent she has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the persons to whom together with the said Caroline Augusta Mitchell it is hereinafter recommended and proposed that the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage shall be transferred, that is to say, with the consent of James Henry Alexander Majendie, of Castle Hedingham aforesaid, Esquire, Beatrice Cecilia Majendie, his wife, Frank Johnstone Mitchell, of Llanfrechfa Grange, Caerleon, in the county of Monmouth, Esquire, and Henry Wilmot Mitchell, of Ballynure Grange, Con, in the county of Wicklow, a Major in Your Majesty's Army, on the Retired List (in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyances or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Castle Hedingham shall be transferred to the said Caroline Augusta Mitchell, James Henry Alexander Majendie, Beatrice Cecilia Majendie, Frank Johnstone Mitchell, and Henry Wilmot Mitchell, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Caroline Augusta Mitchell, James Henry Alexander Majendie, Beatrice Cecilia Majendie, Frank Johnstone Mitchell, and Henry Wilmot Mitchell, their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Freckleton, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Freckleton is vested for an estate in fee simple free from incumbrances in the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Christ in Oxford of the foundation of King Henry the Eighth (hereinafter called the said Dean and Chapter).

"And whereas the said Dean and Chapter are desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Freckleton now vested in them as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Manchester.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, now Bishop of Manchester, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Freckleton which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say in the parish of Freckleton.
