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*Pendennis, July 27.*

**H**ere are lately come into this Port, five Dutch ships laden with Salt, two others bound for *Middle-bourg*, and two French ships with the same lading; also one other Merchant ship from *Bourdeaux* with Wines and Brandy.

*Plymouth, July 28.* Yesterday and this day put into this Port 16 or 18 Sail of ships, whereof five from the *Streights* laden from *Gallipoli*, *Venice*, *Zante* and *Malaga*. Two Spanish men of War from *Coruana* laden with Soldiers and bound for *Flanders*, two French Merchants, several Coasters, and two Hollanders.

*Legorn, July 23.* A Barke lately arriving here from *Sardinia*, informs us, that the Marquis *d'Alili*, a principal person amongst the Nobility of *Callari* in that Island, having been sent into *Spain* on the behalle of the peoples to complain of some new Taxes imposed upon them, contrary to the practise of former times, was upon his return unhappily murder'd; which upon the exclamation of his son, being by the populacy imputed to the Vice-Roy, they presently tumultuously got together, seising on some of the Forts, with the Gallies; and what other Vessels they found in their Ports, and besieged the Vice-Roy in his palaces, who for his own justification, accused *Principe Ludoviso*, a Roman Prince, and General of the Gallies, of the fact; whom he presently secured, and upon promise to bring him to a speedy Tryal, appeas'd the multitude, who otherwise would have proceeded to farther violence upon his own person.

From *Parma* we are told, that the young Prince of that name was lately baptized with much Ceremony, where assisted his Eminency the Cardinal *d'Este*, supplying the place of Godfather on the behall of His Most Christian Majesty.

Three Genoese Gallies are lately put to sea to secure their Trade upon the coasts of *Corfica* against the Corsairs of *Barbary*, which are said to be busie in those seas, and two others are set out by the same Republick in pursuit of two Barks of *Baccellona* and *Majorca*, which notwithstanding the peace between the two Crowns of *Spain* and *France*, lie writing the passage of such French Merchant ships as they can find going out or coming in.

From *Smirna* we are informed, that 10 men of War belonging to *Algiers*, were riding about the Isle of *Rhodes*, to whom were also come up about 16 others from *Tunis*, expecting Orders from the Captain Bassa.

*Genova, July 25.* This last week arrived here *Signora Donna Mancis* widow to the late deceased Governour of *Milan*, accompanied by several persons of the greatest quality from *Milan*, and attended with a Train of near 200 other persons; she alighted at the Prince *Doria's* Palace, where she has been since entertained with much State and Magnificency, and complemented by several Gentlemen sent to her from the Senate; yesterday she embarked for *Spain* under the conduct of the Duke of *Doria* with a Squadron of seven Gallies belonging to this Republick.

On Wednesday last arrived here two Gallies of the *Sivillian* Squadron, with a lading of *Silk*, part of which they unladed on the Way at *Legorn*, and are putting off the rest of it here with all the speed they are able, being obliged to a nimble return, to joyn with the rest of that Squadron, and to pass with the Neapolitan Squadron into the *Levanse* for the assistance of the Venetians; with these Gallies arrived *Monseigneur Raymundi*, the Bishop of *Valencia*, in-

tending to take the first opportunity of passing into *Spain* to take possession of his new Bishoprick.

The French Gallies in their return from *Legorn* put in for some time in the Port *Calvi* in the Isle of *Corfica*, and received their Orders from His Most Christian Majesty, to return into their Ports; in obedience whereunto, they departed thence the 15th instant, and as we find by other advices, are since arrived at *Thoulon*, and their Squadron of men of War at *Marseilles*, some of the number having reached *Algier*, where they took in several French which were lately redeemed from their slavery.

From *Milan* we are advised, that the Marquis *de los Balbases* had reformed several of the old Troops of Horse, and Companies of Foot, and two Companies of that German Regiment which came last into these parts; and that for the ease of the Countrey, whose complaints have been loud, by reason of their late payments and quartering, he has taken taken off those Soldiers which were least serviceable to the Army, with the allowances given to reformed Officers.

A Courier from *France* passing by this place, gives out, that he carries with him dispatches from His Most Christian Majesty to the Pope, offering his Gallies, which His Holiness may dispose of in what service soever he shall think to employ them.

*Madrid, July 25.* The 20th instant, His Excellency the Earl of *Sandwich*, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great Britain* having taken leave of their Majesties, departed hence in order to his return into *England*.

The Baron *de Basseville* is going hence Ambassadoer into *Portugal*, from whence is suddenly expected here; the Comte *de Miranda* in the same qualification from the Prince Regent.

Letters of the 5 instant from *Cadix* inform us, that the Fleet for *New Spain* departed the 13th instant out of *St. Lucars*, though with much danger and difficulty; two of them having stuck upon the Barre, where after two hours stay they were fortunately got off again; several others of them struck against the Ground, but got all of them to sea with a fair wind.

*Danzig, July 28.* The affairs of *Poland* have at present but an ill aspect, and presage great troubles, by reason of the several pretenders to the succession. The King continues his resolution of resigning as formerly, and the great Convention of Estates is intended to begin the 27th of the next month; at the Land-day at *Cierk* near *Warsaw*; they seemed not dissatisfied with His Majesties resolution of retirement; but the Convention in *Great Poland* have resolved to petition His Majesty to continue for some longer time his Kingly Office, but upon such conditions as favour not much of Complement.

The fair offers which are said to proceed from the Czar of *Muscovy*, to persuade the Election of the young Prince his Son to the Crown of *Poland*, are now vanished, and seem to have been only feigned by his faction in *Poland* for the advantage of that Interest which is now in its declination.

*Bruges, August 7.* Twelve Regiments of Horse and Foot consisting of about 5000 men, all of them Germans, are ordered to meet at the place assigned for their Rendezvous near *Loosin*, where they are for some time to continue; the whole Brigade commanded by the Marquis *de Baden*; and this day the Commissaries are departed hence to be present at their Muster; the Marquis *de Castel Rodrigo* intends likewise thither, and from thence to other places in *Flanders* and
