The following Addresses were presented to The King on Monday, the 25th October, on the occasion of His Majesty's visit to Norwich for the purpose of presenting colours to the units of the Territorial Force in Norfolk, and of laying the foundation stone of the new buildings to be added to the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital:-

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty:-May it please Your Majesty.

We, Your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the ancient city of Norwich and county of the same city, desire to offer Your Majesty a sincere welcome on the occasion of Your Majesty's first visit as King to this city. It is 238 years since a King of England has so favoured us.

It may interest Your Majesty, who has honoured the county of Norfolk by making it Your Majesty's home, to learn that it has been recently discovered that Your Majesty's Royal predecessors, King Henry III, King Edward I and King Edward II had a residence and park at Burgh by Ayshah, and frequently visited them for hunting and shooting.

We recall with the pleasantest recollection Your Majesty's several previous visits when Prince of Wales, and the interest Your Majesty has repeatedly shown in this city and its charitable institutions.
