WHEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself, or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial, or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted) to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or

"modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Norman Dumenil John, Lord Bishop of Newcastle, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the twenty-seventh August, one thousand nine hundred and nine, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, as follows:—

"We, the Right Reverend Norman Dumenil John, by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Newcastle, do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of an Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 106, hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. There is in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle the vicarage of Eglington, the parish whereof contains, according to the last census, a population of one thousand two hundred and sixty-four.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Eglington is at present seven hundred and ten pounds.

"The patronage of the said vicarage is vested in the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Newcastle and the Reverend Abraham Gooderham is the present vicar thereof.

"2. There is in the same county and diocese the rectory of Ingram the parish whereof contains according to the last census a population of one hundred and fifty seven.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Ingram is three hundred and thirty-five pounds.

"The patronage of the said rectory is vested in the Reverend James Allgood and the Reverend Roland Frederick Allgood is the present rector thereof.

"3. It appears to us that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 106, and of another Act passed in the second and third years of the same reign chapter 49 the following alteration in the contents and boundaries of the above mentioned parishes may advantageously be made namely:—

"The separation of portions of the parish of Eglington known as the townships or civil parishes of Brandon and Branton and more particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed from that parish and the annexation of the same to the parish of Ingram.

"Such alteration as aforesaid is in our opinion desirable owing to the fact that such portions of the parish of Eglington are nearer to the parish church of the parish to which it is proposed to annex the same than to the parish church of Eglington to which such portions now belong and such alteration will be for the convenience of the inhabitants thereof.

"Pursuant to the directions contained in the said twenty-sixth section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament we the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing such portions of the said parish of Eglington above referred to and the mode in which it appears to us that the
