2. Candidates must be unmarried and without family.

3. No person who has been previously successful in an Examination for the situation of Assistant of Excise and has passed into actual employment in that capacity will be eligible to compete.

4. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

1. Handwriting.
2. Arithmetic.
3. English Composition and Spelling.
4. Geography (General).
5. English History from A.D. 1485.
6. Mathematics.
7. Elementary Chemistry.

No subjects are obligatory, but no Candidate will be regarded as qualified who fails to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners a competent amount of general proficiency.

5. Service marks for each full period of three calendar months of actual approved service, subject to a maximum of twelve of such periods, may be allowed to candidates attending an Examination who are serving or have served as Registered Boy Clerks or Boy Copyists.

6. A fee of £1 will be required from each Candidate attending the Examination.

7. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in such manner as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination for situations as Assistant of Customs and Excise under the Board of Customs and Excise will be held in London, Edinburgh, Dublin, Birmingham, Bristol, Cardiff, Hull, Leeds, Liverpool, Manchester, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Plymouth, Portsmouth, Swansea, Aberdeen, Dundee, Glasgow, Belfast, Cork, Limerick, and Londonderry, under the foregoing Regulations, commencing on the 13th April, 1910.

Not fewer than 75 Candidates will be appointed on the result of this Examination, if so many should be found qualified.

No person will be admitted to the Examination from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received on or before the 17th March, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

ORDER of the Local Government Board: Workhouse Regulations: Allowance of Tea, etc., to certain Male Paupers in the Workhouse.

KING'S NORTON UNION.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the King's Norton Union ;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by an Order dated the 24th day of July, 1847, addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the King's Norton Union (amongst others), and by another Order dated the 10th day

of October, 1900, the Poor Law Commissioners and We, the Local Government Board, respectively, made Rules and Regulations with regard to the government of the Workhouse of the King's Norton Union, and the diet of the inmates of the Workhouse ;

And whereas it is expedient that further provision should be made as hereinafter mentioned :

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, We hereby Order that from and after the date hereof, the following regulation shall be in force in the King's Norton Union :—

Notwithstanding anything contained in the Workhouse Regulation (Dietaries and Accounts) Order, 1900, the Guardians of that Union may, if they think fit, cause dry tea, cocoa or coffee with sugar and milk to be supplied to such of the male inmates of the Workhouse of the said Union, who are infirm through age or any other cause, as the Guardians may consider should be supplied with the same, the quantity to be allowed in each case, or in any class of cases, to be such as the said Guardians may by resolution prescribe.

MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903.

County of West Sussex.

Whereas by sub-section 1 of section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, it is enacted that within any limits or place referred to in regulations made by the Local Government Board with a view to the safety of the public, on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour :

Notice is hereby given that the County Council of West Sussex have made application to the Local Government Board for a regulation to be made in pursuance of the said sub-section, putting the above-mentioned provisions of that sub-section in force within the limits comprising so much of the main road from Petworth to Steyning, within the parish of Pulborough, as extends from the railway bridge near Pulborough Station to a point opposite the Red Lion Inn.

Notice is hereby further given, that objections to the making of any such regulations may be sent in writing to the Local Government Board, at their offices at Whitehall, London, on or before the ninth day of March, 1910.

A copy of any such objection should be sent at the same time by the objector to the County Council, addressed to the Clerk to the County Council of West Sussex, County Hall, Lewes.
