All Birds protected on Sundays except within a certain Area.

VII. During that period of the year to which the protection afforded by the Wild Birds Protection Act of 1880, as extended, so far as certain birds are concerned, by Clause II of this Order, does not apply, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays is prohibited within the Administrative County of East Sussex, except in so much of the Poor Law Union of Cuckfield as is comprised in the parishes of Bolney and Twineham, which area is outlined in red on the map referred to in Clause IV of this Order.

Eggs.

All Eggs protected in certain Areas.

VIII. The taking or destroying of the Eggs of any species of Wild Birds is prohibited for a period of five years from the date of this Order within the undermentioned areas which are outlined in orange on the map referred to in Clause IV:—

(a.) An area bounded on the west by a line drawn due south from the eastern extremity of the sea wall at Seaford, on the east by a line drawn due south from the eastern extremity of the Coastguard Station at Meads, in the borough of Eastbourne, on the north by the front edge of the sea cliffs extending between those limits, and on the south by the sea.

(b.) An area bounded on the west by a line drawn due south from the western boundary of the parish of Rottingdean, on the east by a line drawn due south from the eastern extremity of the sea cliffs in the Urban District of Newhaven, on the north by the front edge of the sea cliffs extending between those limits, and on the south by the sea.

(c.) An area bounded on the west by a straight line drawn from the sea through the eastern extremity of the Meads Coastguard Station at Eastbourne to the western side of the main road running from Eastbourne to Hailsham at its junction with Church-street and High-street, Eastbourne, and by the western side of the main road via Willingdon and Polegate and Hailsham, to its junction with the Lewes and Battle main road at or near Upper Horsebridge; on the north by the northern side of the Lewes and Battle main road running from the said point at or near Upper Horsebridge through Gardner-street, and Boreham-street to Ninfield, by the north-eastern side of the main road leading from Ninfield to Bexhill through Sidley, and by the northern side of the main road from Bexhill to the boundary of the County Borough of Hastings at Bulverhythe; on the east by the western boundary of the Borough of Hastings; and on the south by the sea.

(d.) An area bounded on the west by the eastern boundary of the County Borough of

Hastings from the sea to the point at which the South Eastern and Chatham branch line of railway from Hastings to Ashford leaves the County Borough near Coghurst; on the west and north by the eastern and southern boundary of such branch line of railway leading through Rye to the Kent and Sussex County boundary; on the east by such County boundary, and on the south by the sea.

Certain Eggs protected throughout the Administrative County.

IX. The taking or destroying of the Eggs of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of East Sussex:—

Avocet, Common Bittern, Blue-throat, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Spotted Crane, Crossbill, Stone Curlew (Great Plover, Thick-knee), Goldfinch, Great Crested Grebe, Heron, Hobby, Hoopoe, Kestrel, Kingfisher, Common Kite, Wood Lark, Nightingale, Nightjar (Goat Sucker), Oriole, Owl (all species), Grey-necked Phalarope, Red-necked Phalarope, Water Pipit, Kentish Plover, Ringed Plover, Wood Sandpiper, Red-backed Shrike, Spoonbill, Common Tern, Bearded Tit, Dartford Warbler, Wheatear, Green Woodpecker, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, Golden-crested Wren, Wryneck.

Repeal of former Order.

X. The Order of the 17th day of February, 1909, is hereby repealed.

Institution for Mentally-Defective Boys.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice that he has issued a new Certificate under the provisions of the Children Act, 1908 (8 Edw. VII., cap. 67), for the premises at Birmingham known as Sandwell Hall, with a view to the reception therein of such mentally-defective boys, not exceeding 200 in number, as may be sent thereto from time to time in pursuance of the provisions of the Children Act or of the Elementary Education Act, 1876 (39 and 40 Vict., cap. 79).

The new Certificate, which takes the place of the temporary Certificate which was granted on the 28th December, 1907, and was renewed from time to time, came into operation on the 1st February, 1910.
