All that area of land comprising the county of Fife.

The Gentlemen to continue the same Mourning. And on Sunday, the 7th May, 1911, the Court to go out of Mourning.

Orders for the Mourning to be worn by Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines for His late Most Gracious Majesty King Edward VII of blessed memory:—

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have received the commands of His Majesty The King to direct, on the present melancholy occasion of the death of His Most Gracious Majesty King Edward VII, that the Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines be required to wear a band of black crape round the left arm, when in uniform, as prescribed by the Regulations, and also when wearing the great coat.
