MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1894.

Notice is hereby given, in accordance with the provisions of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that, after the expiration of forty days from the date hereof, it is proposed to submit to His Majesty in Council, in pursuance of the abovementioned Act, the drafts of two Orders in Council approving certain Rules for the Navigation of the Rivers Humber and Trent, and that copies of the proposed draft Orders in Council can be obtained by any public body, within forty days of the date of this notice, at the Privy Council Office, Whitehall.
