Then the Emperor himfelf made a short Speech to the Stares upon the principal points of the Proposition; And the Count de Traun answered in General and Submiffive Terms, referring the Confideration of Particulars to the Affembly, and concluded with Wishing all Success to the Emperor's Arms, and Prosperity to his Reign.

Hydelberg, Jan. 24. The new Fortifications that are making here are almost finished; and we have now in this City a Garison of above 4000 Men. The Enemy are at present very quiet in the Palatinate; They have lately sent considerable quantities of Provisions and Ammunition, taken out of their Magazine at Strasbourg, to

Cologne, Fan. 27. The Count d'Autel General of the Elector Palatines Troops, and the Count d'Arcke Envoy from the Elector of Bavaria, arrived here two days ago to affift at the Conference that's held in this City, to provide for the security of the Rhine.
