

Presents authorize and appoint you, the said Sir Frederick Pollock (Chairman); Sir Evan Vincent Evans; Charles Harding Firth; Montague Rhodes James; Frederic George Kenyon; Sidney Lee; Henry Owen; Henry Richard Tedder; and William Llewellyn Williams, to be Our Commissioners for the purposes of the said enquiry.

And for the better enabling you to carry out the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these Presents authorize you to call in the aid and co-operation of the custodians of public records and of local records of a public nature, inviting them to assist you in furthering the objects of the Commission; and to invite the possessors of such papers as you may deem it desirable to inspect to produce them before you.

And We do further give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to and examine all such books, documents, registers and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject, and to enquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever:

And We do by these Presents authorize and empower you, or any of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem it expedient so to inspect for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid:

And We do by these Presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you, Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment:

And We do further ordain that you, or any three or more of you, have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time if you shall judge it expedient so to do:

And Our further will and pleasure is that you do, with as little delay as possible, report to Us, under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any three or more of you, your opinion upon the matters herein submitted for your consideration.

And for the purpose of aiding you in your enquiries We hereby appoint Our trusty and well-beloved Hubert Hall, Esquire, of the Public Record Office, Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries, to be Secretary to this Our Commission.

WHEREAS by the Statutes made by the University of London Commissioners it is provided that four members of the Senate of the University shall be appointed by His Majesty in Council and that every casual vacancy in the Senate by death, resignation, or otherwise, shall be filled by the body by which the member causing the vacancy was appointed, but that the person appointed to fill any casual vacancy shall hold office only so long as the member in whose place he is appointed would have done if he had not vacated his office:

And whereas His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh was pleased by His Order in Council of the twelfth March, one thousand nine hundred and three, to appoint Sir Francis Mowatt, G.C.B., I.S.O., to be a member of the said Senate:

And whereas the said Sir Francis Mowatt was by Order in Council of the first March, one thousand nine hundred and seven, re-appointed a member of the said Senate in accordance with the said Statutes, and his term of office would in the ordinary course expire on the second Tuesday in May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven:

And whereas the said Sir Francis Mowatt has tendered his resignation as a member of the said Senate and it is necessary to appoint another person as a member in his place:

Now therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to appoint Professor Arthur Schuster, F.R.S., to be a member of the Senate of the University of London, in place of the said Sir Francis Mowatt resigned, for the unexpired residue of the term of office of the said Sir Francis Mowatt.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two) chapter twenty-six, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-eighth day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (session two), chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain additional alterations and improvements at the episcopal house of residence belonging to the See of Norwich, which is known as the Palace, Norwich.
