such a manner as to render it impossible that they should have been in contact with infected objects.

2. As regards transit:

The Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch, dated November 7th, from His Majesty's Minister at Christiania, enclosing the following translation of a Circular issued by the Norwegian Government, dated

November 3rd, relating to places infected with cholera. This Circular supersedes the Circular dated October 4th last (published in the London Gazette of October 11th).

The kingdom of Hungary, the province of Naples in Italy, and the towns of Constantinople in Turkey, Trapezunt in Asia Minor, and Tripolis in North Africa are to be regarded as infected with cholera until further notice.

Under former Notices the following are still regarded as infected with cholera:—Apulia in Italy and European Russia, with the excep-

tion of the government of Archangel.

Vessels with cholera patients on board calling at ports in Nordland, Tromso, and the Finmarken Prefectures, or using the inner channels between Honningsvaag and Lodingen, should be sent by pilots to the provisional cholera Lazaret at Tromso. But vessels arriving at Hammerfest, Vardo, or Vadso with single cases of cholera on board may expect that until further notice that the patients will be received for treatment ashore under the further directions of the local Board of Health.

In other cases of vessels with cholera patients on board and bound to Norwegian ports, the vessels should be sent by the pilots to the Quarantine Station on Odderoen, near Christiansand.

Those destined for Sea of Marmora ports will be subject only to medical inspection and disinfection,
