### MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903.

#### BOROUGH OF CHATHAM.

Whereas by sub-section 1 of section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, it is enacted that within any limits or place referred to in regulations made by the Local Government Board with a view to the safety of the public, on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour;

And whereas the Council of the Borough of Chatham have made applications to the Local Government Board for regulations to be made in pursuance of the said sub-section putting the above-mentioned provisions of that sub-section in force within the limits comprising the following roads or parts of roads within the borough, that is to say:—

High Street;

New Road;

So much of Maidstone Road as extends from its junction with Railway Street to its junction with Pattens Lane;

Military Road; and

Railway Street;

And whereas notice of the said applications and of the time and manner in which objections should be made to any such regulation appeared in the London Gazette of the 5th day of July, 1910, and 4th day of November, 1910, in the "Chatham and Rochester News" of the 2nd day of July, 1910, and 5th day of November, 1910, and in the Chatham "Observer" of the 2nd day of July, 1910, and 5th day of November, 1910;

And whereas certain objections to the making of any regulations in pursuance of the said provisions have been received by the Local Government Board, and it is expedient that further inquiry should be made in the matter of the said application:
