WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy-seven, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the first day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for making provision in part for the competent maintenance of the spiritual person officiating in the church of Saint David, Paddington, in the suburbs of the city of London and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas the Reverend Thomas Smith, clerk in Holy Orders, being a native of the Principality of Wales, has been licensed by the Bishop of the said diocese to officiate in the said church of Saint David, Paddington, which said church was duly consecrated on the nineteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, for the performance of Divine Service according to the rites and ceremonies of the Church of England in the Welsh language, and it appears to us to be expedient that further provision should forthwith be made for the more competent maintenance of the said Thomas Smith or other the spiritual person who shall for the time being be licensed by the Bishop of the diocese to officiate in the Welsh language in the said church of Saint David, Paddington.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that out of the moneys mentioned in the twelfth section of the said Act there shall be paid by us to the said Thomas Smith or to any one other spiritual person being a native of the Principality of Wales who may be licensed by the Bishop of the diocese for the time being to officiate in the said church of Saint David, Paddington, in the Welsh language, an annual sum of fifty pounds by equal quarterly payments on the first day of February, the first day of May, the first day of August, and the first day of November in every year, the same sum to commence and be payable as from the first day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, such payment to be in addition to the annual sum of fifty pounds which is payable to the same person under an Order of His late Majesty in Council dated the first day of March in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven. "And we further recommend and propose

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order

and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

say: --"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninetyfour, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John, Meads, in the county of Sussex and in the diocese of Chichester.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the fifth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy and published in the London Gazette upon the eleventh day of the same month, a consolidated chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Meads, in the parish of Eastbourne, in the said county and diocese, and the consolidated chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Meads.'

"And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint John, Meads, has, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirtysecond and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Meads, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.
