Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Bolton Road for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cross Street, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of Cross Street for a distance of ten chains and a half or thereabouts to its eastern end in the middle of the western end of the footbridge across the River Darwen, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said footbridge for a distance of five yards or thereabouts to its centre, and extending thence first south-eastward and then generally southward along the middle of the River Darwen for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries Grimshaw Street across the said river, and extending thence generally eastward along the middle of Grimshaw Street for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Sough Road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Sough Road for a distance of two chains and a quarter or thereabouts to its junction with Pole Lane, and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of Pole Lane for a distance of forty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Marsh House Lane upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Turncroft, from the said new parish of Saint James, Over Darwen."

And whereas the said representation has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and ten, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fiftyninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and new humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael and All Angels; situate at Bramhall, in the parish of Saint Thomas, in Stockport, in the county of Chester, and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels, situate at Bramhall, as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis John, Bishop of Chester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint Thomas, in Stockport, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels, situate at Bramhall, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels, Bramhall.'

And with the like consent of the said Francis John, Bishop of Chester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, bap-tisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels, situate at Bramhall, as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that, so long as the Reverend Henry Sewell, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Thomas, in Stockport, shall continue to be such rector or incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels, situate at Bramhall, as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Henry Sewell, and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for

the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels, Bramhall, being: All that isolated part of the parish of Saint Thomas, in Stockport, in the county of Chester and in the
