

Majesty's Coast Guard Service, capable of being received together with the pay of Commissioned Boatman or Boatman:

"And whereas we consider it desirable that Coast Guard ratings of higher grades shall also be eligible for the rating and pay of Station Signalmen:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to authorize the payment to Station Signalmen of an allowance at the rate of 2d. a day capable of being received together with the pay of Chief Petty Officer, Petty Officer, Leading Boatman or Boatman:

"We further beg leave to recommend that such allowance shall be payable only to Station Signalmen when actually employed at or detailed for a War Signal Station, but shall not be payable concurrently with any special allowance for duty at a Wireless Telegraph Station:

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it is provided that, in case it appear to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in such city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the

parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: Provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the incumbent and the vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish of West Walton, in the county of Norfolk; the parish of Upavon, in the county of Wilts; and the parish of Saint Issey, in the county of Cornwall, respectively, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have made representations to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in the civil parishes of West Walton, Upavon, and Saint Issey, aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued in the said parishes as hereinafter directed:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 7th day of November last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 13th day of December last, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new burial grounds shall be opened in the said civil parishes save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued as follows, viz:—

WEST WALTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Saint Mary, in the parish of West Walton, in the county of Norfolk; and, after the 31st of December, 1910, in the churchyard with the following exceptions, that is to say:—

In the said churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place within the period of fourteen years prior to the date of this Order, the burial may be allowed of the bodies of Jane Smith, Elizabeth Hudson, George Stanton Webb, Martha Webb, Mary Johnson, Joseph Herbert, Elizabeth Pratt, Sophia Ann Humphrey, F. Green, Mary Cross and Sarah Elizabeth Cross, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

UPAVON.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of St. Mary, in the parish of Upavon, in the county of Wilts; and in the churchyard attached thereto with the following exceptions, that is to say:—

(a) In the vaults or walled graves now existing in the said churchyard, and belonging or reputed to belong to the Rawdon, Pearce and Potter families, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vaults or graves be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.
