Eling, in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary, North Eling, is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from encumbrances in James Douglas Buckton, of Bruche Hall, Warrington, in the county of Lancaster, Esquire.

"And whereas the said James Douglas Buckton is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary, North Eling, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Francis James, now Bishop of

Liverpool, in right of his See.
"And whereas the Right Reverend Herbert Edward, now Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned in token that the said transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is

made necessary.

"And whereas the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, is willing to accept the said transfer, and in token of such willingness has executed this scheme as hereinafter

mentioned.

' And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Mary, North Eling, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the parish of Saint Mary, North

Eling.
"Now therefore with the consent of the said James Douglas Buckton (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Herbert Edward, Bishop of Winchester, (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Mary, North Eling, now vested in him the said James Douglas Buckton as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, and by his successors in the same bishoprck for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of

any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

## PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twentyfirst and twenty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, which Acts are known as "The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts," duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-third day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fiftyseven, which Acts are known as 'The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts,' have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the rectory and parish of Tankersley, in the county of York and diocese of York.

"Whereas the annual value of the benefice of Tankersley, that is to say of the rectory of the parish of Tankersley aforesaid (hereinafter called the said benefice), has been improved by means of certain leases of the minerals underlying portions of the glebe lands of the said benefice, which leases were granted under the authority of the said Acts by the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Tankersley.

"And whereas rents, royalties and other reservations by the said mineral leases reserved and made payable to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, have from time to time as the same have been received by us been invested in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Acts, and of such investments there remain standing in the name of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, first a sum of eight thousand and fifty-six pounds and ninepence, India three pounds per centum Stock; secondly a sum of eight thousand two hundred and thirty-seven pounds sixteen shil-
