A PROCLAMATION,

For Altering some of the Times Appointed for Holding the next Assizes.

WILLIAM R.

THis Majesty's Considering that by reason of the present great Snow the Highways in divers Parts of this Kingdom are Obstructed, and the Pass Ge therein required so Difficult and Dangerous, that Persons concerned to give their Attendance at the next Assizes, cannot in many Places with Convenience and Safety, and in some not possibly Travel and Repair to the said Assizes at the Times now Appointed for Holding the same; And having Commanded Their Judges for the respective Circuits to Appoint other more Convenient Times where it should be found Necessary; And in Obedience therunto, the Judges having found it Necessary to make Alterations in Four of the Circuits; And having Appointed the Times and Places for Holding the said Assizes in those Circuits in manner following, Viz.

But do not find it necessary to make any Alteration concerning the Norfolk Circuit, or the Oxford Circuit, in regard that the several Assizes in both those Circuits may be conveniently Holden at the Times before Appointed. And since Their Majesties Graciously Approving, have there fore thought fit, by the advice of Their Privy Council to

Issue this Their Proclamation, hereby Declaring Their Royal Pleasure, That all Their Loving Subjects be Discharged from Attendance at the Assizes, Sessions of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery for the several Counties and Parts in the said Home Circuit, Western Circuit, Midland Circuit, and Northern Circuit, at any other Times than as herein before is particularly mentioned. And all and singular Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Constables, Headboroughs, and all other Their Majesties Officers, Ministers and Subjects whatsoever, whom it may concern, are required to take Notice hereof, and Obedience themselves accordingly.

Provided always, and That Their Majesties are hereby Graciously pleased to Direct and Command, That no more or further Fees or Charges shall be paid by any of Their Subjects for or by reason of the Altering, Amending, Renewing or Sealing any Writs or Records of Natibus, or other Process or Records on this Occasion.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the Second Day of March 1692. In the Fifth Year of Our Reign.

Vienna, Febr. 21. The Envoy residing at this Court from the King of Sweden has given the Emperor such Assurances, that his Master will take no part with the Princes that have protested against the New Electorate; but on the contrary, that he will contribute all his Endeavours for maintaining a perfect Union and Harmony among the Princes of the Empire, which is so necessary at this time that they are engaged in a double War against the Turks and the French. They write from Hungary, that the Turks were drawing some Troops together towards *Grula* and *Jeno*, with a design as 'twas believed to supply them with Provisions, but that on the other side General *Veterani*, who commands the Emperors Forces in *Transylvania*, had a very vigilant Eye upon all their Motions, and would endeavour to hinder their putting any Relief into those places, which it's thought he will attack as soon as the Weather is proper for it. The Recruits that are raising in the Hereditary Countreys are almost compleat. The Advices from *Turkey* say, that divers French Officers and Ingeniers are arrived there to serve in the Ottoman Army this next Campaign.

Cologne, March 3. The French have quitted the Castle of *Heimbac* near *Bickerac*, which not long ago they made a shew of fortifying to interrupt the passage of the *Rhine* on that side. Eight of their Regiments quartered near the *Nosle* have received orders to march, and it's said, that part of them are designed to *Piedmont*, and the rest to *Flanders*. At *Metz* the French have laden several Vessels with Powder, Bombs, and Carcasses, but tis not known whether they are bound.

Paris, March 2. The Troops of the Household are on their march towards *Chantilly*; The French King goes thither on the 5th of this Month, to take a Review of them; and will stay there till the 15th, when the Count will return to *Versailles*, and the said Troops to their Quarters. By the last Letters from *Toulon* we have an account, that the Count *d'Estree* was arrived there, and that he had taken up all the Seamen and Fishermen that could be found along the Coast of *Provence*, to serve on board the Squadron which he is to command. The Letters from *Malta* confirm, that a great Earthquake happened in that Island on the 11th of *January* last, which threw down several Churches and Houses, and destroyed a great number of the Inhabitants.

Brussels, March 4. 'Tis confirmed, that the Marquis *de Boufflers*, who has been lately at the French Court, is returned to *Mons*; where on the 2d Instant arrived several Vessels laden with Straw and Forage, and divers others are shortly expected. And they say that 15 Regiments will in few days be drawn together in that Neighbourhood. They write from *Tournay*, that a Train of 20 Pieces of Cannon, of 24 Pounders, will be ready to march thence on the 2th Instant towards *Gravel*. The Enemy continue likewise their Preparations on the *Muse*, and some advices say, that their Troops are to assemble on the 15th Instant in order to some Enterprise on that side. The French have published an Order by which all the young Men of the Town of *Hall*, and other places of the Pro-

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vince of *Haynault*, who have not yet been forced into the Service, or who have not Ranf med themselves by a Sum of Money, to repair within so many days to *Mons*, in order to be listed in the Regiment that's raising by the Count de *Buffs*; on default whereof all the Goors and Estate of the Parents of those who shall not appear according to this Order, are to be Confiscated, and they themselves banished out of the French Territories, which has occasioned a great Consternation among those Miserable People.

Hague, March 6. Our last Letters from *Flanders* say, that the Marquis de *Boufflers* had ordered the French Troops that are quartered nearest to *Charleroy* to be ready to march in 6 days. The States have received advice, that the Goos *Brandenburgers* who are to enter into their Service, are ready to move according to the Orders that shall be sent them. They write from *Drifden*, that all matters are fully adjusted between the Emperor and the Elector of *Saxony*, and that his Electoral Highness has resolved to lend his Forces to the *Rhine*, to act there in Conjunction with those of the other Confederates this next Campaign.

Hague, March 10. The Letters from *Flanders* of the 8th Instant, say, that the Marquis de *Boufflers* had sent Orders to the Governors of the French Frontier places, to have their Garrisons in a readiness to march upon the first notice, but the Frosts we have had these 8 days, and the great Snow that has fallen these two last, makes it at present impracticable for them to attempt any thing. The same Letters tell us, that the Prince Royal of *Denmark* was arrived at *Gene*, where he was received with all the Marks of Honour and Respect. They write from *Paris* of the 6th, that the French King went the day before to *Chauntilly*, and that he will stay there till the 19th. That the Marquis de *Nismont* returned to *Brest* on the 21th of the last Month with the Ships under his Command; and that the Marquis de *Chastellawen* would go out in few days with 10 Men of War. The Letters from *Turin* of the 24th past tell us, that the Duke of *Savoy* had had several Fits of a violent Ague, which were accompanied with such good symptms as gave great hopes of the speedy re-establishment of his Health. The last Letters from *Germany* left all things quiet on that side. On Saturday last the Pentinaty *Hainflus* went to *Breda* to meet and confer with the Earl of *Ashbone*, and Monsieur *Dyckvelt*, who came thither from *Brussels*. Several Persons have been lately apprehended in this Province by Order of the States of *Holland*.

Weymouth, Febr. 27. On Saturday last was brought in here a French Dogger of about 70 Tuns laden with Tobacco and Sugar, which was lately taken on the Coast of *France* by an Offend Privateer of 4 Guns; Who at the same time took another Vessel laden with Wine and Brandy. This day came in the *Norborough* Frigate with a Prize.

Plymouth, Febr. 28. Yesterday sailed from hence a Swedish Man of War, with several Merchant Ships under his Convoy, bound to *Lisbon*; and in company with them two Genoese Ships, and one bound to *Legborne*. This Evening 10 or 12 Sail are turning in from the Eastward, but what or whence they are we cannot yet learn.

Portsmouth, March 1. This morning sailed from *Spithead* to the Westward a Squadron of Men of War under the Command of Rear-Admiral *Aylmer*.

Whitehall, March 2. This afternoon his Excellency Don *Emanuel Coloma*, Marquis de *Cansles*, &c. Ambassador in Ordinary from the King of *Spain*, had his Publick Audience of Their Majesties in the Banqueting-House; To which he was conducted from his House in *Great-Queenstreet* by the Earl of *Northampton*, Sir *Charles Cotterell* Master of the Ceremonies, and Six Gentlemen of the Privy-Chamber, in the King's Coach, followed by his Excellency's own, and a great number of other Coaches with Six Horses apiece; At the Gate of *Whitehall* the Lord Viscount *Filliers*, Knight Marshal, received his Excellency, and accompanied him to the Council Chamber; The Guards were drawn up in the Court, and the Officers saluted his Excellency. After a short stay in the Council-Chamber, his Excellency was conducted to the Banqueting-House; On the Great Stairs he was received by the Earl of *Manchester*, Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard, and at the Door of the Banqueting-House by the Earl of *Dorset*, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesties Household; and the Lord Marquis of *Winchester* Lord Chamberlain to the Queen; The Gentlemen Pensioners made a Lane to the Throne, where Their Majesties were seated; and all other Ceremonies were observed that are usual on the like Occasions. The Audience being over, his Excellency was Re-conducted to his House in the same manner he came; and at night his Excellency made a splendid Entertainment.

London, March 4. On Thursday last the Common Hall Assembled to Elect a Citizen to serve in Parliament for this City, in the room of Sir *William Turner*, deceased, and a Poll being taken, Sir *John Fleet*, the present Lord

Mayor, had the Majority of Votes, and was returned accordingly.

His Majesty having Ordered a Number of Seamen from the Kingdom of Scotland to Serve in Their Majesties Fleet, has been pleas'd to Direct, That no Scotch Seamen shall be Press'd out of any Scotch Ships.
