The route in going to Westminster Abbey was by—

The Mall, Admiralty Arch, Charing Cross, Whitehall, Parliament Street, Broad Sanctuary to the West entrance, Westminster Abbey.

The Peers, Dowager Peeresses, and Peeresses in their Robes of Estate, and others who had been invited by His Majesty's Command to be present at the Solemnity of the Coronation, were conducted to the places assigned to them in Westminster Abbey, previously to the arrival of Their Majesties: the Lords Spiritual on the North side of the Area or Sacrarium; the Lords Temporal in the South Transept; and the Peeresses in the North Transept.

The Great Officers of State, the Lords appointed to carry the Regalia all in their Robes of Estate, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, and the Bishops who supported Their Majesties, as well as those who carried the Bible, the Paten, and the Chalice, vested in Copes, assembled in the Vestibule at the West Door before half-past nine o'clock, where the Regalia, having been previously laid on the Table, were delivered by the Lord Chamberlain of the Household to the Lord High Constable, by him to the Lord Great Chamberlain, and by His Lordship to the Noblemen, by whom the same were borne in the following order, viz. :—

THE QUEEN'S REGALIA.

First, The Ivory Rod with the Dove, by the Earl of Durham, K.G.
Second, The Sceptre with the Cross, by the Marquess of Waterford, K.P.
Third, Her Majesty's Crown, by the Duke of Devonshire (P.C.).

THE KING'S REGALIA.

First, St. Edward's Staff, by the Duke of Roxburghe, K.T., M.V.O.
Second, The Golden Spurs, by the Earl of Loudoun and the Lord Grey de Ruthyn.
Third, The Sceptre with the Cross, by the Duke of Argyll, K.G., K.T., G.C.M.G., G.C.V.O. (P.C.), Hereditary Master of His Majesty's Household in Scotland.
