A PROCLAMATION.

W Hereas Their Majesties by Their Royal Proclamation of the Ninth of this instant March, were Graciously Pleas'd to Promise and Declare, That whosoever should Discover any Person who had been Guilty of Making or Forging any of the False and Counterfeit Warrants and Passes in the said Proclamation mentioned, or of Dispersing or Using the same, so as such Person might be Contented by due Course of Law, should Have and Receive, as a Reward for such Good Service, immediately upon the Conviction of any such Offender, the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds: Now Their Most Excellent Majesties, with the Advice of Their Privy Council, have Thought fit, and Do, by this Their Proclamation, further Promise and Declare, That if any Person who hath been Guilty of Making, Forging, Dispersing or Using the said False and Counterfeit Passes, shall, before the First Day of May next ensuing, Render himself to Their Majesties Principal Secretary of State, or to any of Their Majesties Judges or Justices of Peace, and make a Discovery of his Accomplishes, so as they or any of them may be Apprehended, such Person so making Discovery, shall forthwith have Their Majesties Most Gracious Pardon for his said Offence, and shall also Receive the Reward mentioned in the said former Proclamation.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Sixteenth day of March, 1692. In the Fifth Year of Our Reign.

Venice, Febr. 27. The Doge Morosini has declared that he will Embark for the Levant within Six Weeks at farthest; and in the mean time the Men of War and Gallies that are to attend him thither, are fitting out here with all the diligence possible. The Popes Gallies and those of Malta will be ready to Sail about the same time, with a considerable number of Land Forces. From the Morea we have an account, That the Captain General Mocenigo had taken a review of the Venetian Troops in those Parts; and that he continued with great Application to dispose all Things a-

gainst the Doges arrival for the opening of the Campaign. On the other side, the Turks make all the Efforts they are able for the carrying on the War this next Summer, and they give out that the Grand Visier will be early in the Field.

Warsaw, Febr. 17. The Diet at Gredno having sat 6 Weeks (the Term appointed by the Antient Laws of the Kingdom for its continuance) without coming to any Resolution upon the Matters before them, it was propos'd, that by the general Consent of the States their Session should be prolonged for a Week or Fortnight, according to what had been heretofore practis'd in the like Occasions, in order to the finishing the Affairs they had in Hand, for the Defence and Good of the Kingdom; To which all the Deputies agreed, except two, who oppos'd it; but it being believed that they would at last Conform themselves to the Opinion of the rest, the Diet proceed'd to Deliberate upon other Matters: In the mean time the two Deputies before mentioned left the Assembly, and went immediately out of Town, which was no sooner known, but it gave a stop to the Debate, which was resum'd about prolonging the time of their Sitting: However in hopes of their return, the King, with the Senate, and the other Deputies, continued the Session till Midnight, but fruitlessly; for the said two Deputies not appearing again, the Diet, was, contrary to all Expectation, Dissolved the 11th instant in the Morning. The Monday before the Emperors Ambassador had a private Audience of the King and the Queen; and was in a day or two to have had a publick one, with the Ceremonies that are always observed during the sitting of the Diet, but the same was prevented by its sudden breaking up; yet to satisfie the Ambassador, who earnestly press'd it, a publick Audience was granted him of the King and the Senate, and 14 Senators are appointed to enter into Conference with him upon the Points of his Commission. We have an account from the Frontiers, that the New Fort, which was built the last Summer within a Mile of Caminiec, and garisoned by the Poles, does very much annoy that place, having reduced it to a great want of Provisions, and especially

pecially of Wood; inſomuch, that the Turks have been forced to pull down ſeveral Houſes to make uſe of the Wood for Fuel; They tell us likewiſe that ſome of our Troops took lately a Hundred Wagons that were going to the Relief of *Caminiec*, having firſt routed the Turks that Guarded them; and that another Convoy of 500 Wagons, which was coming from *Moldavia*, hearing of their Miſfortune durſt not venture on, but returned with all the haſt they could towards *Faſſi*. Our Parties have alſo ſeized upon divers of the Country People, who endeavoured privately to carry Proviſions to the Garriſon of *Caminiec*, and have made ſeveral Incurſions into the Enemies Territories, and taken conſiderable Booties of Slaves and Cattle.

Vienna, March 4. Our Preparations for the next Campaign are in ſuch forwardneſs, that the Imperial Troops will begin to march into the Field before the end of the next month. General *Heuſler*, Commiſſary-General of the Emperors Armies, being perfectly recovered of his late illneſs, will ſet out very ſhortly for *Hungary*, to take an account of the Magazines that are provided there and on the Frontiers of *Transilvania*; The Duke *de Croÿ* is gone to his Government of *Carelſtadt* in *Croatia*, and is expected here again ſome time the next month; The Emperor has not yet declared who ſhall Command his Army in *Hungary*, but there is a diſcourſe at Court that Count *Erneſt de Staremberg*, Preſident of the Council of War, is deſigned for that Employment. We hear from *Peter Waradin*, that they continue ſtill to work on the Fortifications of that place, which they hope to have finiſhed in a ſhort time.

Hamburg, March 14. 'Tis confirmed by the laſt Letters from *Ratisbonne*, That the King of *Sweden*, has by his Miniſter at the Diet, declared himſelf in Favour of the Ninth Eleſtorate; And from *Dresden*, That a Treaty is concluded between the Emperor and the Eleſtor of *Saxony*; in purſuance of which his Eleſtorial Highneſs has reſolved to ſend a Body of 12000 Men, to aſſiſt this Summer with the Forces of the other Confederate Princes on the *Upper Rhine*.

Falmouth, March 16. On Saturday laſt came in here the *Henry and William of London* bound for the *West Indies*, being ſeperated from the reſt of her Company, who we hear are put into *Torbay*. This day came in the *Spaniſh Alliance*, Captain *Hutchins* Commander, with the Mail from the *Groyne*.

Plymouth, March 14. Yesterday Sailed from hence Their Majesties Ship *The Prince of Orange*, with ſeveral Veffels under her Convoy bound to the Eaſtward.

Newcaſtle, March 14. Yesterday and this Morning Sailed out of this Harbour about 200 Sail of laden Colliers, under Convoy of the *Sweepſtakes*.

Wormouth, March 17. Yesterday paſſed through our Road about 150 laden Colliers, under Convoy of the *Sweepſtakes*.

Chatham, March 15. This day was Launched at Their Majesties Yard here, a new Ship of 50 Guns, called the *Rockſtarr*.
