### Foreign Office, November 7, 1911.

With reference to the Notices published in the London Gazette of the 17th and 24th ultimo, His Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople has received a Note from the Imperial Ottoman Government, dated the 1st inst., to the following effect:—

"With reference to its Note of the 12th October, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs has the honour to inform His Britannic Majesty's Embassy that the Imperial Government haveresolved only to consider as contraband of war cannons, guns, carbines, revolvers, pistols, sabres, and other fire or side arms of all kinds, munitions of war, military equipment of all kinds, and generally everything which, without manipulation, can be put to immediate use in connexion with naval or military armament."

In a telegram dated the 3rd instant, His Majesty's Ambassador further reports that the Ottoman Government have decided to confiscate vessels transporting contraband goods, if such goods by weight, value, bulk or freight form more than half the cargo.

#### Whitehall, November 3, 1911.

His Majesty the King has been pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to Mr. Llewellyn Williams.
