

fixed by the Standing Joint Committee, and in addition a special allowance to be fixed by the Standing Joint Committee not less than 5s. for every day on which he performs police duty. The special day allowance may be fixed so as to vary according as his services are required for the prevention or suppression of rioting or other serious disturbance of the peace, or for less exacting duties.

4. He shall, after enrolment, be subject to the instructions of the Superintendent of the Division in which he is resident or such other officer as the Chief Constable may direct, and shall notify to him any change of residence. If the Standing Joint Committee or the Chief Constable so directs, his appointment and the payment of the retaining fee may be conditional on his residing at a specified place or within a specified area.

5. When called out for active duty or for parade he may be supplied with the uniform and accoutrements usually issued to other constables, and shall in any case wear an armlet or other badge to show that he belongs to the Constabulary.

6. If he is in receipt of a pension under the Police Act, 1890, the pension shall not be suspended in whole or in part under section 13 of the Act upon his appointment as a member of the Police Reserve.

7. All reasonable expenses incurred by him when called out for parade or for police duty shall be repaid to him on the same scale as to other members of the force.

8. Nothing in these rules shall prevent a constable appointed as hereinbefore mentioned from engaging in any employment for hire or gain except when he is called out for active duty.
