

with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Englishcombe, now vested in him the said Lord Derwent as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved on behalf of His Majesty at the Council held under the authority of the said Commission:

Now, therefore, His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, being authorized thereto by His Majesty's said Commission, do hereby, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on His Majesty's behalf, ratify the said scheme, and do order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts, and do further direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Bath and Wells.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Commission, dated the 10th day of November, 1911, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, K.G., G.C.V.O., His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, G.C.V.O., the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Lord President of the Council, or any two of them, in His Majesty's absence from the

United Kingdom, to summon and hold on His Majesty's behalf His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His Majesty's approval of any matter or thing to which His Majesty's approval in Council is required:

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the second day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, Barnacre, situate within the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Thomas, Garstang, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester:

“Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Garstang, of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint John the Evangelist, Calder Vale, and of the parish of Saint Helen, Garstang, otherwise Church Town, both in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes and parish.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Garstang, of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Calder Vale, and of the said parish of Saint Helen, Garstang, otherwise Church Town, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, Barnacre, situate as aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester, as such Bishop, and also as the patron, in right of his See, of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Calder Vale, and with the consent of the Reverend John Wilson Pedder, Clerk in Holy Orders, Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Helen, Garstang, otherwise Church Town, as the patron (in right of his vicarage) of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Garstang; and also as the patron (in his private capacity) of the said vicarage of the parish of Saint Helen, Garstang, otherwise Church Town (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and
