The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of three Despatches, dated the 6th, 8th, and 11th December respectively, from His Majesty's Representative on the Constantinople Board of Health, stating that the following decisions were taken at meetings of the Board held on the above dates:—

- (1.) To impose a medical visit on arrivals from Ineboli and Durazzo.
- (2.) To suppress the medical visit in force on arrivals from Rostov-on-Don, Port Said, Bizerta, Tunis, Beja, Zoungouldak, and Cozlou.
- (3.) Arrivals from Malta to undergo 24 hours' observation and disinfection.
- (4.) Arrivals from Jeddah to undergo five days' quarantine, including voyage, and disinfection.
- (5.) To suppress the measures in force against St. Jean d'Acra, Caiffa, Braila, and Kaitif.

The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch, dated the 15th December, from His Majesty's Consul at Christiania, transmitting the following translation of a Circular relating to places infected with cholera and plague, dated the 13th December, issued by the Norwegian Government, and superseding the Circular of the 27th October, published in the London Gazette of the 3rd November last:—

The following are to be regarded as infected with cholera until further notice:—The Italian Province of Syracuse, the Towns of Braila, in Roumania, Salonica, in Turkey, and the Island of Malta.

The Italian Provinces of Naples, Caserta, Salerno, Genoa, Catanzaro, Chieti, and Venice, the towns of Smyrna and Samsoun, in Turkey-in-Asia, and the Government of Astrachan, in Russia, are struck off the list of places infected with cholera.

Manilla is regarded as free of plague.
