

desire that the patronage of the said two benefices of Weston-upon-Trent and Berkswich (otherwise Baswich) may be re-arranged by way of exchange in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative value of the said two benefices and of the patronage thereof respectively, and we do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council that the circumstances and present values of the said two benefices are as set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the said Augustus, Bishop of Lichfield, acting as such Bishop (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and affixed thereto his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said William Ralph Inge (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the undivided moiety of the advowson or

perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Weston-upon-Trent and the church thereof now vested in the said Augustus, Bishop of Lichfield, in right of his See, shall be assigned and transferred to and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said William Ralph Inge, his heirs and assigns for ever, and that in exchange for the same the undivided moiety of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Berkswich (otherwise Baswich) and the church thereof now vested in the said William Ralph Inge shall in like manner and upon and from the same date be assigned and transferred to and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said Augustus, Bishop of Lichfield, and his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.
