be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Paul, York, which is described in the schedule hercunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Barnabas, York, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Barnabas, York.'

And with the like consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Barnabas, York, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism ,or for the

registration thereof. "We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The district chapelry of Saint Barnabas, York, being : — All that part of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint Paul, York, in the county of York and in the diocese of York, which is bounded upon part of the south-east by the parish of All Saints, North Street, upon the north-east partly by the parish of Saint Wilfrid, partly by the parish of Saint Olave, Marygate, partly by a detached portion of the parish of Saint Michael-le-Belfrey, and partly by the new parish of Saint Philip and Saint James, Clifton, upon the north-west by the last mentioned new parish, upon the west by the parish of Acomb, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-west and upon the remaining part of the south-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Acomb from the said new parish of Saint Paul, York, at or near the centre of the bridge which carries Landing Lane across the goods and mineral line of the North Eastern Railway, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of threequarters of a mile or thereabouts to its junction with the loop line of the same railway which connects it with the York and Scarborough branch line of such railway, and extending thence first eastward, then north-eastward, and then northward along the middle of the said loop line of railway, for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such line of railway across Leeman Road, and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of Leeman Road for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul, York, from the said parish of All Saints, North Street."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

The KING's Most Excellent Majcsty in Council. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commis-

sioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four; and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme or representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of February, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:---

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninetyfour, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury, in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the seventeenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and published in the London Gazette on the nineteenth day of the same month, a consolidated chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate at Wood Green, in the parish of Wednesbury, in the said county of Stafford and in the said diocese of Lichfield, and the said consolidated chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury.'

Wood Green, Wednesbury.' "And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury, has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.
