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Madrid, March 6.

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H E Council of State continues to meet very frequently to confult about sending supplies of Money to Flanders, Milan, and Catalonia. The King has given the Command of the Spanish Galleys, which the Duke de Varaguas lately resigned, to the Marquis de Camarassa, Viceroy of Arragon, who was for-merly General of the Galleys of Naples; and the Bishop of Saragossa is appointed to govern that Kingdom in his absence. Several new raised Troops are marched towards Catalonia to reinforce our Army on that fide, which, as we are affured, will confift of 18000 Men. Signior Caccia, the Popes Nuncio, is arrived at Barcelana, and is expected here in few days. The two Troops of Horse, that are posted round this place, to hinder the coming in or going out of all Merchandises without paying the Duties that are laid upon them, do keep very strict watch, and have already seized feveral parcels of Goods on that account. Notice has been given, by order from the Court, to the Merchants of Seville and Cadiz, that the New-Spain Fleet shall depart in September next.

Warsaw, March 14. The King of Poland has fince his return hither from Grodno been present at several Councils of War, and has given orders to the Officers of his Troops, to make their Recruits, and the other necessary preparations for the Campagne. The Envoy of Tartary, who was lately fent to this Court to offer the Chain's Mediation for the concluding a seperate Peace between the Crown of Poland and the Turks, is going home again, finding that neither his Threats nor Promises have had any effect here; The Tartars who conducted the last Convoy to Caminiec, and afterwards made a great Ravage on the Frontiers of Podolia, are retired again towards Bud- Plimouth and the places adjacent. ziack, the greatest part of them being to march and Hopewell Privateers sail this day. with the Cham towards Hungary. The Advices

from Moldavia say, that the Hospodar, or Prince of that Country, was preparing for another attempt upon Sorocke on the Niester, and expected in order thereunto a Reinforcement of Turks and Tartars; for which reason the King of Poland has, on the other fide, given orders to supply that Garison with all things necessary for their Defence.

Edinburgh, March 30. The Parliament of this Kingdom is adjourned to the 18th of the next month, when it is to fit; and we understand that a Commission is coming hither for his Grace the Duke of Hamilton to be Their Majesties High Commissioner for this Session.

Plimouth, March 31. On the 29th Instant put into this Port the Fortune of Amsterdam, bound from Hamborough to Cadia. failed from hence to the Westward Their Majesties Ships the Affistance, Portsmouth Galley, and Germoone, and with them several Vessels bound about Land for Chester. This day likewise failed out of this Port for St. Malo the Elizabeth with about 300 French Prisoners.

Plimouth, April 2. Yesterday arrived here the Love of Flushing bound home from Spain. The same day came in from Cruising the Bridget Galley, Capt. Townesend Commander, and the William and Mary Capt. Ellis Commander, two English Privateers.

Weymouth, April 1. Yesterday the William and Mary, and Russel Galley went out to cruise. This morning about 16 Sail of Merchantmen were seen off of this place, plying to the Westward; and 3 Ships of this Port are gone out to join them. The Grafton and Hopewell are still in this Port, but will sail in a day or two.
