**T**His day several reports were brought to Town that some insurrection was intended about *Borrowsome*, which occasion'd the meeting of the Council, and several Companies to draw into Arms; but upon a strict enquiry, the report was found to have been raised only on a misapprehension of some persons, upon the sight of several Gentlemen and other persons which were passing to a Wedding, the Countrey every where remaining quiet and peaceable.

*Plymouth, Aug. 7.* On Wednesday last came in the *Eagle-Ketch*, having in her way for *Newfoundland* been severely handled by storm, in which she spent her main Mast, and with some difficulty put back again to rest.

*Rome, July 28.* On Sunday Morning last Cardinal *Pio* had an Extraordinary Audience from the Pope, whom he acquainted with the News of the Marriage agreed on and concluded between the Prince *Gilberto Pio* his Brother, and a Daughter of the Marquis *de Castel Rodrigo*, Governour of the Spanish Netherlands.

The Complaints of the Jesuits against the General of their Order *Padre Oliva*, has according to the Popes Order been taken into Consideration of the Congregation of the Cardinals; who upon enquiry into the whole matter, have declared in favour of the said General, to the no small dissatisfaction of that Order.

On Monday last, it being one of the days set apart by the Pope for Publick and General Audience, a Complaint was exhibited by a person of *Tivoli*, that whereas he had lived many years with his Mother with great content and satisfaction on both sides, upon an Estate of their own of 500 Dollars per annum; his Mother falling sick, was in her weakness so far prevailed on by a Jesuit her Confessor, that she had by Will given all the Estate away to that Order, not reserving any thing for the subsistence of him (her Son) the Pope extremely dissatisfied upon this Complaint, immediately sent for his own Confessor *Father Spinola* a Jesuit, and with severe language commanded him to find out the General, and in his Name to require him to write to the Superiour of their Order, at *Tivoli*, that the Estate be forthwith restored to the Petitioner.

The Pope, though much pressed by the King of Poland, has not yet resolved to send any Cardinal to assist at the Election of a new King.

The Spanish Ambassadour in a late Audience acquainted the Pope, that the Queen Regent of Spain had ordered 2000 foot to march from *Milan* into *Dalmatia*, and from thence to embark for *Candia*, to assist the Republick of *Venice* in the Defence of the place.

The Edict for the stricter observation of Holydayes, has so much offended the Tradesmen of this City, that on Monday at Night they in great numbers tumultuously assembled themselves about the House of the Vicar General; where they let fly their Tongues against him with much bitterness.

Since this, several of the Tradesmen have upon Complaints obtained leave to follow their Trades on those dayes, as they were formerly used to do.

We are in daily expectation of the arrival of an Ambassadour from *Portugal*, at whose appearance the Apostolick Court of Chancery will issue the Provisions for the filling up the Vacant Bishopricks, and other Ecclesiastical Offices in that Kingdom.

*Genova, Aug. 1.* On Sunday last arrived here the Car-

dinal *Viscanti*, from *Madrid*, having taken France in his way hither, attended from *Antibo* by a Brigantine and two armed Feluccas upon his arrival he was honourably attended to the Palace of Signior *Nicolo Doria*, where he was liberally entertained, till the Thursday following, when he departed from hence for *Milan*.

On Monday departed hence for Spain, the Widow to the late Governour of *Milan*, *Signora Donna Mancina*, on her way for Spain, having been complemented and treated here to her satisfaction, and attended from hence by the Squadron commanded by the Duke *de Tursi*, with whom embarked also the Archbishop of *Valenza*, to take possession of his Diocels.

The Sicilian Gallies having disposed of their Cargo, are returned to joyne with the Neopolitans, to assist the Venetians in their Wars.

From *Milan* we are told, that the Governour has taken a review of his forces, amounting to above Ten thousand Horse and Foot, which he has so ordered into Quarters, as to be as little burdensome as is possible to the people; but as yet he has no Orders for the disbanding them.

He has ordered 3 Companies of Spanish foot, and as many Italians, to march to *Finale*, to relieve and exchange that Garrison.

*Venice, Aug. 3.* On Saturday last arrived several Letters from the Levant, bearing Date the 1 of July, informing us of the death of our General *Bernardo Nani*; of the hurt he sometime since received in his head, in whose room our Admirall *Morosini* has till farther Order from the Senates employ'd the Proveditor *Catarin Cornaro*, who has been received with much satisfaction by the Soldiery in *Candia*.

They likewise confirm to us the report of the great dearth and scarcity in the Turkish Camp, which occasion'd their Soldiers daily to quit their stations, and that some numbers of them had fled into the Town, begging Pa sports and Conveyance into their own Countrey; all those desertors of the Army agreeing in their account of the Vissers Army, and that he has now much above 24 thousand men before the Town, and of these many sick and wounded, and unfit for service, but that the Visser encouraged them with the hopes of the speedy arrival of their Fleet from *Milo* with strong recruits, and large supplies of all sorts of provisions.

They farther tell us, that our Admirall *Morosini*, is with a part of the Fleet lying between the waters of *Suda* and *Canea*, and that the Captains *Lorenzo Cornaro*, *Leonardo Moro*, and *Molino*, with three other squadrons, are cruising upon other parts of that Kingdom with express Orders to engage the Captain *Bassia*, if he make any attempt to put in any succours; and in the mean while several Christian Privateers, whereof there are ten able ships in one Company, are cruising upon the *Archipelago*, and the waters near *Mores*, giving chace to all Turkish vessels that appear at sea, and have made many considerable prizes.

The Turks continue their Leaguer with much obstinacy, and have spent many shots upon the Forts of *Sabioneras*, *Bethlem* and *Panigra*; upon intelligence given by a fugitive Greek to the Visser, that the Venetians were ill provided in the Forts to make resistance, he order'd a sudden and lusty Assault to be made upon them; but contrary to his expectation, the Turks found the Defendants in such readines to receive them, that they were forced, after the loss of some hundreds of their men, to quit their design, our men sallying out upon them in their retreat, and pursuing them with much slaughter into their own lines; which
