PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four; and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme or representation, bearing date the sixth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and the Act of the thirty-second and thirtythird years of Her said late Majesty, chapter

ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John, Barnsley, and of the new parish of Dodworth, both in the county of York and in the diocese of Wakefield.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order in Council of His late Majesty King William the Fourth bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one and published in the London Gazette on the ninth day of August in the same year a district parish was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint George, Barnsley, situate in the parish of Silkstone, in the said county of York and at that time in the diocese of York but now in the said diocese of Wakefield, and such district parish is now known as 'The District Parish of Saint George, Barnsley.'

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-third day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four and published in the London Gazette on the third day of the following month part of the said district parish of Saint George, Barnsley, was constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and such district was named 'The District of Saint John, Barnsley.'

" And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight and published in the London Gazette on the seventeenth day of the same month, part of the said parish of Silkstone was assigned as a chapelry district to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Dodworth, in the said parish of Silkstone, and the said chapelry district was named 'The Chapelry District of Dodworth.

"And whereas the said district of Saint John, Barnsley, and the said chapelry district of Dodworth have become new parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nine-teenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Barnsley, and of the said new parish of Dodworth should be altered in the manner

which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend George Rodney, Bishop of Wakefield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Barnsley, and of the said new parish of Dodworth, shall be altered so that (firstly) all those portions of the said new parish of Saint John, Barnsley, which are described in the First Schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured green shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be restored to and shall in future form part of the said district parish of Saint George, Barnsley; (secondly) all those portions of the said district parish of Saint George, Barnsley, which are described in the Second Schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured yellow shall be dissevered from such district parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint John, Barnsley; and (thirdly) all that portion of the said district parish of Saint George, Barnsley, which is described in the Third Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such district parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Dodworth.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending, and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish (sometime district) of Saint John, Barnsley, in the county of York and in the diocese of Wakefield, and to be restored to the district parish of Saint George, Barnsley, in the same county and diocese, being :—All those portions of the said new parish of Saint John, Barnsley, which lie to the north and the northwest of the middle of Agnes Road and to the north-west of the middle of Hawthorne Street.

"The SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said district parish of Saint George, Barnsley, and to be annexed to the said new parish of Saint John, Barnsley, being: -All those portions of the said district parish of Saint George, Barnsley, which lie to the south of the middle of Agnes Road.

"The THIRD SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said district parish of Saint George, Barnsley, and to be annexed to the new parish of Dodworth in the said county and diocese, being:

All that isolated portion of the said district parish of Saint George, Barnsley, which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon the north-east and upon the south-east by the Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Edward the Confessor, Barnsley, in the said county and diocese, and upon the south-west and upon the west by the said new parish of Dodworth."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation, and such patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Wakefield.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by Section 30 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, amended by Section 2 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1893, it is (amongst other things) provided that, if a majority of the whole Council of a Borough agree to petition, and the Council thereupon petition The King for the division of the Borough into Wards, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, from time to time, by Order in Council, to fix the number of Wards into which the Borough shall be divided, and that the Borough shall be divided into that number of Wards, and that where an Order in Council has been so made the Secretary of State shall appoint a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for determining the boundaries of the Wards and apportioning the

Councillors among them.

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, upon a petition in that behalf presented by the Council of the Borough of Aberavon, by Order in Council dated the 3rd day of October, 1911, to fix the number of Wards into which the said Borough should henceforth be divided, and to order and direct that the said number should

be six. And whereas the Right Honourable Reginald McKenna, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did by Warrant dated the 18th day of November, 1911, appoint Lawrence E. Jones, Esquire, to be a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for determining the boundaries of the Wards of the said Borough and apportioning the Councillors among them.

And whereas the said Commissioner has prepared the following Scheme, dated the 29th day of February, 1912, accordingly:—

BOROUGH OF ABERAVON.

ARTICLE I.

This Scheme shall, except so far as is otherwise herein expressly provided, or as there may be anything in the subject-matter or context inconsistent therewith, come into operation on the first day of November One thousand nine hundred and twelve.

ARTICLE II.

Subject as regards any future alteration of the boundaries of the Wards hereby determined to the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Acts 1882 and 1893, and any Act amending the same, the following provisions shall have effect:-

(1) The Wards shall be termed respectively the North Ward and the South Ward.

(2) The North Ward shall comprise so much of the Borough of Aberavon as lies to the north-east of the centre of the Great Western Railway between the south-eastern boundary of the said Borough at the River Avon and a point on the northern boundary of the Borough near Sarn-fan.

The South Ward shall comprise the re-

mainder of the Borough.

(3) Each of the said Wards shall comprise the portion of the Borough indicated by a separate colour and distinguished by the name of the Ward on the maps each marked "Map of the Wards of the Borough of Aberavon as fixed and determined 1912," one of which shall be sent herewith to the Secretary of State to be submitted by him to His Majesty in Council for approval, and the other shall be deposited by the Town Clerk of Aberavon at his office.

ARTICLE III.

Subject as regards any future alteration of Wards or re-apportionment of Councillors among the same to the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Acts 1882 and 1893, and any Act amending the same, the following provisions shall have effect:-

(1) The number of Councillors assigned to each Ward shall be six.

(2) The present Councillors and their successors in the office of Councillor shall be apportioned among the Wards as follows:

Now, therefore, His Majesty having taken the said Scheme of the said Commissioner into consideration, doth, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, approve thereof and order that the same be published in the London Gazette accordingly.

tion of the licensing of lightermen and watermen within the Port of London.

The Port of London Authority in exercise of the powers and authorities vested in them by the Port of London Act, 1908, and the Watermen's and Lightermen's Amendment Act, 1859, do make the following bye-laws, that is to say:—

- 1. Any person shall be deemed qualified for a lighterman's or for a waterman's licence or certificate who has for a period of at least two years been engaged in working on a craft or boat in the Port of London as defined by the Port of London Act, 1908, anything contained in sections 56 and 57 of the Watermen's and Lightermen's Amendment Act, 1859, or in the bye-laws of the Company of Watermen and Lightermen of the River Thames made thereunder, or in Part VI of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, to the contrary notwithstanding.
- 2. These bye-laws may be cited as "The Port of London (Licensing of Lightermen and Watermen) Bye-laws, 1912," and shall come into operation the day after the same are confirmed by the Board of Trade.
