WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the sixth day of June, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late

Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Peter, South Wimbledon, situate within the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of All Saints, South Wimbledon, in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Southwark.

“ Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of All Saints, South Wimbledon, and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of the Holy Trinity, South Wimbledon, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes.

“ And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of All Saints, South Wimbledon, and of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, South Wimbledon, should

be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Peter, South Wimbledon, situate as aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Hubert Murray, Bishop of Southwark, as such Bishop and also as the patron, in right of his said bishoprick, of the vicarage of the said new parish of All Saints, South Wimbledon, and with the consent of the Reverend James Allen Bell, vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Wimbledon, in the said county and diocese, and as such vicar or Incumbent, the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, South Wimbledon (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of All Saints, South Wimbledon, and of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, South Wimbledon, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Peter, South Wimbledon, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Peter, South Wimbledon.’

“We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Peter, South Wimbledon, comprising:—All those contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of All Saints, South Wimbledon, and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of the Holy Trinity, South Wimbledon, both in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Southwark, which, taken together, are bounded upon all sides as follows, namely, upon the north-east partly by the new parish of Christ Church, Mitcham, partly by the parish of Tooting Graveney, partly by the new parish of Saint Mary, Summer’s Town, and partly by the new parish of Saint Andrew, Earlsfield, upon the north-west partly by the new parish of Saint Luke, Wimbledon, and partly by the parish of Wimbledon, and upon the south partly by the new parish of Saint Andrew, South Wimbledon, all in the said county and diocese, and partly by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Andrew, South Wimbledon, from the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, South Wimbledon, at the centre of the bridge which carries the roadway connecting Wimbledon Hill Road with the road called The Broadway across the Tooting, Merton and Wimbledon Branch Line of the London Brighton and South Coast Railway, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the said line

of railway (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, South Wimbledon, from the said new parish of All Saints, South Wimbledon, and also the River Wandle) for a distance of one mile and eight chains to the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints, South Wimbledon, from the said new parish of Christ Church, Mitcham.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Southwark.

WHEREAS by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that “Whereas in some instances, tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes,” it is, amongst other things, enacted, “That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district, parochial or extra parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect

to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section 6 of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things, enacted:

"That any such scheme, or modification, as aforesaid, may be drawn up according to the regulations and directions in the hereinbefore in part recited Act contained, subject to the consent in writing of the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected thereby, under his or their hands, notwithstanding the vacancy of such benefice or benefices; and that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council thereupon to make an Order for carrying such scheme or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect; and that such Order being registered in the registry of the diocese as directed by the hereinbefore in part recited Act shall come into operation, and shall be forthwith binding on all persons whatsoever, notwithstanding such vacancy or vacancies."

And whereas the Right Reverend George Wyndham, Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, hath made a representation to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, George Wyndham Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells do hereby represent to your Grace that there are in the County of Somerset and Diocese of Bath and Wells the Rectory and Parish Church of Hinton Saint George and the Rectory and Parish Church of Seavington Saint Michael with the Chapelry of Dinnington annexed.

"That the annual income of the said Benefice of Hinton Saint George is about One hundred and fifty pounds gross and according to the unrevised figures of the last census the population thereof was five hundred and two.

"That the annual income of the said Benefice of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington amounts to about Two hundred and eighty-seven pounds gross which includes One hundred and one pounds the present value of the Tithe Rent Charge issuing out of lands comprising the Chapelry or District of Dinnington commuted at One hundred and forty-two pounds and Thirty-five pounds Rent of the Glebe lands in the said Chapelry or District containing about Thirteen acres two roods and twenty perches.

"That according to the unrevised figures of the last census the population of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington was two hundred and forty-five the population of Dinnington being about One hundred and nineteen.

"That there is a legal House of Residence belonging to the said Benefice of Hinton Saint George but no House of Residence belonging to the said Benefice of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington.

"That the Chapelry of Dinnington contains according to the separate Tithe Commutation Map and Apportionment for that District Five hundred and fourteen acres and two roods and the boundaries are clearly defined on the said Tithe Map.

"That there is in the said Chapelry of Dinnington a Church or Chapel distant from the Parish Church of Seavington Saint Michael about One mile and three quarters in which Church or Chapel Divine Service is performed by the Incumbent of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington at considerable inconvenience owing to its distance.

"That Baptisms Marriages and Churchings have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized and performed in the Church or Chapel of Dinnington and Burials in the Burial Ground belonging thereto for the Parishioners of the Parish of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington residing in the neighbourhood of Dinnington Church.

"That the said Chapelry or District of Dinnington is an outlying portion of the said Parish of Seavington Saint Michael situate about one-eighth of a mile from the main portion thereof, and is contiguous to the said Parish of Hinton Saint George and the Church or Chapel of the said Chapelry is only three-quarters of a mile from the Church and Rectory of Hinton Saint George and it could be more easily visited by the Rector of Hinton Saint George than by the Rector of Seavington Saint Michael.

"That the Patronage of the said Rectory of Hinton Saint George and also of the said Rectory of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington is vested in the Earl Poulett.

"That the Benefice of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington is now void by the death of the Reverend Joseph Phelps Billing the last Incumbent thereof.

"That it appears to us that under the provisions of the Pluralities Act 1838 the said Chapelry of Dinnington may be advantageously separated from the said Rectory and Parish Church of Seavington Saint Michael and be united and annexed to the said Rectory and Parish Church of Hinton Saint George for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the said Act We have prepared the following Scheme which together with the consents thereto in writing of the Patron and Incumbent of the said Rectory of Hinton Saint George and the Patron of the said Rectory of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington We do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with such Scheme certify the same and such consents by your Report to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop of Bath and Wells and the

Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

“ SCHEME.

“ It is proposed that the said Church or Chapel of Dinnington with the district particularly delineated on the Tithe Map of Dinnington and described therein and in the Tithe Apportionment as being the Parish of Dinnington shall be separated from the said Rectory and Parish Church of Seavington Saint Michael and be united and annexed to the Parish of Hinton Saint George aforesaid for Ecclesiastical purposes and that the Parish formed by such union be henceforth called or known as the Parish of Hinton Saint George with Dinnington.

“ That the Patronage of the said Benefice of Hinton Saint George with Dinnington and also of the said Rectory of Seavington Saint Michael shall remain vested in the Earl Poulett.

“ That the Tithe Rent charge on the lands comprised in the said Chapelry or District of Dinnington so proposed to be united to the Rectory of Hinton St. George commuted at the sum of One hundred and forty-seven pounds as specified in the said Tithe Commutation Apportionment of Dinnington and the rents and profits of such of the Glebe Lands of the said Rectory and Parish Church of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington as are situate in the said Chapelry or District of Dinnington as specified in the said Tithe Commutation Apportionment of Dinnington shall be received by and belong to the Rector of the proposed Parish of Hinton Saint George with Dinnington.

“ That all fees and ecclesiastical dues and payments (if any) for Churchings Marriages Burials and Ecclesiastical Offices solemnized and performed within the said Chapelry or District of Dinnington shall belong to the Incumbent and Church Officers of the said Parish of Hinton Saint George with Dinnington.

“ That the charge of Six pounds fifteen shillings for First Fruits and the annual charge of thirteen shillings and sixpence for Tenths payable to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty by the Rector of Seavington St. Michael with Dinnington shall be apportioned as follows:—The said Rectory of Seavington Saint Michael to be charged with the payment of Three pounds ten shillings First Fruits and seven shillings yearly Tenths and the said Rectory of Hinton Saint George with Dinnington with the payment of Three pounds five shillings First Fruits and six shillings and sixpence yearly Tenths.

“ That the Rector of Seavington Saint Michael for the time being shall not hereafter be liable to repair or contribute to the repair of the Chancel of the said Church or Chapel of Dinnington but that such and the same liability as now attaches to him shall hereafter attach to the Rector of the said proposed Parish of Hinton Saint George with Dinnington for the time being who shall be entitled to receive all moneys (if any) set aside for such repair.

“ That the Owners and Occupiers of lands and hereditaments in the said Chapelry or district of Dinnington shall not hereafter be entitled to accommodation in the Parish Church of Seavington Saint Michael but shall be entitled in common with the Parishioners of Hinton Saint George to accommodation in the Church of Hinton Saint George as well as in the Church or Chapel of Dinnington.

“ CONSENTS.

“ I the Right Honourable William John Lydston Earl Poulett of Hinton Saint George in the County of Somerset being the Patron or person entitled to present to the Rectory of Hinton Saint George if the same were now vacant and to the Rectory of Seavington Saint Michael with Dinnington in the County of Somerset and Diocese of Bath and Wells and Your Grace's Province the same being now vacant do by this writing under my hand signify to Your Grace my consent to the Scheme above proposed and to every matter and thing therein contained.

“ Witness my hand this second day of February One thousand nine hundred and twelve.

“ POULETT.”

“ I the Reverend Robert Radclyffe Dolling Rector of the Parish and Parish Church of Hinton Saint George above-mentioned do hereby signify to Your Grace my consent to the scheme above proposed and to every matter and thing therein contained.

“ Witness my hand this twenty-ninth day of January One thousand nine hundred and twelve.

And whereas the said Scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said Scheme, hath certified the same and the Consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council by his Report dated the 20th day of February, 1912, and which said Report is in the words and figures following:—

“ We the undersigned Randall Thomas Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby represent to Your Majesty in Council—
“ That the Right Reverend George Wyndham Bishop of Bath and Wells has represented unto Us amongst other things—

“ That there is in the County of Somerset and his Diocese of Bath and Wells the Rectory of Seavington St. Michael with the Chapelry of Dinnington annexed the Parish whereof contains according to the unrevised figures of the last Census a population of Two hundred and forty-five.

“ That there is also in the same County and Diocese the Rectory of Hinton St. George the Parish whereof contains according to the unrevised figures of the last Census a population of Five hundred and two.

“ That the said Chapelry of Dinnington is an outlying portion of the said Parish of

Seavington St. Michael situate about one eighth of a mile from the main portion thereof and is contiguous to the said Parish of Hinton St. George and the Church or Chapel of the said Chapelry is only three quarters of a mile from the Church and Rectory of Hinton St. George.

“ That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said Chapelry of Dinnington may under the provisions of the Pluralities Act 1838 be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Seavington St. Michael and united to the said Parish of Hinton St. George for ecclesiastical purposes.

“ That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rentcharges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all persons interested which Scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of The Right Honourable William John Lydsbon Earl Poulett the Patron or person entitled to present to the Rectory of Hinton St. George (if the same were now vacant) and also to the Rectory of Seavington St. Michael with Dinnington (the same being now vacant) and of The Reverend Robert Radclyffe Dolling the Rector of the said Rectory of Hinton St. George, has been transmitted to Us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

“ The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the Consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

“ And We the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said Scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

WHEREAS by an Order made by the late King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, on the 19th March, 1908, His Majesty was pleased to order that, where any property belonging to or held for the benefit of a unit of Volunteers or Yeomanry mentioned in the first column of the Schedule to that Order was vested in or held by any Trustees other than the Commanding Officer of such unit, those Trustees should, until otherwise directed by Order in Council under section 29 of the Territorial and Reserve Forces Act, 1907, be appointed in regard to the property so vested in or held by them to be special Trustees, to the exclusion of the Association, and should continue to hold such property in trust for the corresponding unit of the Territorial Force in like manner in all respects as they previously held it for the unit of the Volunteers or Yeomanry, and the corresponding unit should, notwithstanding any trust, limitation, or condition affecting any such property, continue entitled to the benefit thereof in like manner as the unit was entitled thereto before it became a unit of the Territorial Force:

And whereas by virtue of the above-recited provisions of the said Order the Trustees named in the first column of the Schedule to this Order hold the property mentioned in the second column of this Schedule in trust for the unit of the Territorial Force mentioned in the third column of this Schedule under and in virtue of the deed the date and parties whereof are respectively specified in the fourth column of this Schedule, and it is expedient that such property should be transferred from those Trustees to the County Association mentioned in the fifth column of this Schedule:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of the Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that as from the date of this Order the said property shall be by virtue of this Order transferred from the said Trustees to and vested in the said County Association, and shall be held by the said Association for the benefit of the said unit of the Territorial Force in like manner in all respects as it was held by the said Trustees, or for such other purposes as the said Association with the consent of the said unit (to be ascertained in manner prescribed by regulations of the Army Council) shall direct.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 18th day of June, 1912, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we have decided to appoint a Flag Officer to command certain Destroyer and Submarine Flotillas in home waters with the title of 'Admiral of Patrols':

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction consolidated pay of £1,500 per annum being granted to this officer:

"We further beg leave to recommend that the Captain appointed on the staff of the Admiral of Patrols should receive consolidated pay of £800 per annum.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals."

His Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 17th day of June, 1912, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, and other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as

are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Orders in Council of His late Majesty bearing dates the 26th day of September, 1908, and 28th day of June, 1909, payment was sanctioned of an allowance of two shillings and sixpence a day to the Accountant Officer appointed for duty with the Captain (D) Commanding Torpedo Boat Destroyers of the Channel Fleet, and to those doing duty as Captain's Clerks in the Depot Ships for Nucleus Crew Torpedo Boat Destroyers and Torpedo Boats at the Home Ports:

"And whereas changes have taken place in the organisation of these vessels, and other Flotillas have been constituted in respect of which we are of opinion that a similar allowance should be paid:

CITY OF CARDIFF.

To Their Most Gracious Majesties the King and Queen.

We, your Majesties' dutiful and faithful subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the city of Cardiff in Council assembled, offer to your Majesties an enthusiastic and heartfelt welcome to the metropolis of the Principality of Wales.

Your Majesties' present visit to Cardiff is deeply interesting, and will be ever memorable as being the second instance in modern times of the presence amongst us of the reigning Monarch, the first Royal Visit in recent years having been made in the year 1907 by their Majesties King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra.

We appreciate to the full the warm concern which your Majesties have shown in the progress and well-being of the people of Wales,

and are proud of the close association between the Royal Family and our ancient and loyal city.

We shall ever remember that your Majesty's Illustrious Father, King Edward VII, was an Honorary Freeman of this city, and we take this opportunity of recording our high sense of the honour conferred on its citizens by your Majesty when Prince of Wales in permitting your name to be placed upon our Freeman's Roll.

As inhabitants of the Principality we shall ever cherish the recollection of the keen sympathy so readily displayed by your Majesties with the aspirations and national sentiments of the Welsh people when at the famous and historic Castle of Carnarvon, on the 13th day of July, 1911, His Royal Highness our beloved Prince was, in the presence of vast numbers of the people assembled from all parts of our country, presented by your Majesties to the Welsh nation and proclaimed Prince of Wales.

The memory of that solemn Investiture, linking together the remote past and the present life of our race will never fade from the minds of your Majesties' Welsh subjects.

Its effect has been to instil into the minds of the inhabitants of the Principality of Wales a fuller sense of their love to the Throne and persons of your Majesties and their much-beloved Prince.

Should your Majesties decide to establish a home in Wales for His Royal Highness, such a decision would be received with the utmost enthusiasm and delight.

The especial interest taken by your Majesty in the intellectual life of the Welsh people has been exemplified by your tenure of the office of Chancellor of the University of Wales—"Prifysgol Cymru."

This interest will be further illustrated by the ceremony of the laying of the foundation-stone of the National Museum of Wales, which your Majesty has graciously consented to perform to-morrow, the 26th day of June, 1912.

We gratefully welcome this further evidence of the constant desire of your Majesties for the advancement of the Welsh people in Arts, Education, and Culture.

We recognise the proof afforded by this ceremony, as well as by the incorporation of the Museum by a Charter granted on the 19th day of March, 1907, by His late Gracious Majesty King Edward VII, that the Principality of Wales has Royal support and approbation in its efforts to fulfil the highest aspirations of its people.

It is a great satisfaction to the Corporation of this city that the movement initiated by them extending over a period of more than twenty years for the establishment in Cardiff of a National Museum worthy of the Principality of Wales has, with the aid of Royal favour, at length attained complete fruition.

In this connection we recall with gratification your Majesty's visit to Cardiff as "Prince of Wales," on the 28th day of June, 1905, when your Majesty was graciously pleased to lay the foundation-stone of the new buildings for the University College of South Wales and Monmouthshire, since erected in Cathays Park. We value the token of your Majesties' continued goodwill towards this Institution for

University Education in the midst of the most thickly-populated district, as evidenced by your Majesties' contemplated visit to the College.

We earnestly pray that your Majesties may both live for many years in the enjoyment of health, happiness, and every blessing; witnessing, with the course of time, the increasing prosperity of your mighty Empire; ever working in the cause of peace and amity between the nations of the world, amongst whose rulers your Majesty holds so pre-eminent a position; and may you continue to possess the respect, esteem, affection and love of the people of this city and port, and of the Principality of Wales, in common with all of your loyal and devoted subjects throughout the whole of your Majesty's vast dominions.

The Humble Address of the Monmouthshire and South Wales Coal Owners' Association.

May it please Your Most Gracious Majesties—

The visit of Your Majesties to Cardiff, the leading Coal Shipping Port of the world, is extremely gratifying and affords great pleasure to the colliery proprietors of South Wales who desire to extend to Your Majesties a hearty welcome.

In the South Wales coal field over 600 coal mines are now in operation, giving employment to 220,000 workmen and practically maintaining a population of about one million.

Your Majesties are doubtless aware that the superior quality of South Wales steam coal has been recognised by the Admiralty in that it is exclusively used for the purposes of Your Majesty's Navy, and the colliery proprietors of the district feel a deep sense of pride and satisfaction in thus being able to contribute towards the defence of Your Majesty's Kingdom. Welsh coal also plays a very prominent part in supplying the requirements of the mercantile marine of all nations, besides being brought into use for the important iron and steel industries.

The steady growth of the coal production of South Wales during the past 60 years is shown by the following figures:—

This rapid growth has also produced important developments in other kindred industries, and as a consequence has brought great prosperity to the district.

Although the district, in common with other mining districts in the United Kingdom, has lately passed through a period of industrial disturbances, it is hoped that the operation of the Conciliation Board, composed of representatives of employers and workmen, under the independent chairmanship of the Right Hon. Viscount St. Aldwyn, will be productive of a more perfect spirit of co-operation, conciliation and good feeling among all the parties concerned, which will lead to the avoidance of disastrous strikes and their attendant deplorable consequences, and that a better understanding between the representatives of the proprietorial and working class interests may follow to their mutual advantage and for the benefit of the general community.

Mr. Frederick Lewis Davis presides over the employers' representatives on the Board, and until quite recently the Right Hon. William Abraham, M.P., P.C., has occupied a like position on behalf of the workmen's representa-

tives, and on his retirement Mr. William Brace, M.P., has been appointed his successor.

Mr. Abraham has rendered valuable services during the past 40 years, and the employers desire to extend to him their good wishes for a full enjoyment for many years of his well-earned retirement.

As the result of Royal Commissions appointed by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and His late Majesty King Edward VII, in which this association has been honoured by the appointment of the Right Hon. Lord Merthyr, K.C.V.O., Mr. Frederick Lewis Davis and others to serve as members, various Acts of Parliament for the amelioration of the condition of the miners, and the securing of greater safety for them in working, have received the Royal Assent. In this most commendable object Your Majesties are showing practical proof of Your desire to follow the noble example of Your illustrious predecessors.

It is the earnest hope of the colliery proprietors that by the careful observance of these wise regulations and a continuance of the exercise of skill and ability in the management of the mines the district may be spared by Providence from a repetition of the greater and more serious calamities which have unfortunately occurred in mining in past years, but from which, happily, the district has been immune in recent years, and that the general safety of the mines may be perfected in Your Majesties' beneficent reign. The colliery proprietors will at all times willingly co-operate with Your Majesties in so worthy an object.

Having been founded in the year 1864, the Association is now nearly approaching its fiftieth year of existence, and Your memorialists venture to say that the operations of the Association have largely contributed to the welfare of the district and have always been directed towards the preservation of a peaceful relationship with the workmen in the employ of its members.

It is the earnest hope of the colliery proprietors of South Wales that it may please Almighty God that Your Majesties may be spared for many years to come to continue a wise and beneficent rule over Your subjects, and with the assurances of the most loyal and dutiful allegiance to Your Majesties.

South Wales Institute of Engineers.

May it please Your Most Gracious Majesties—

The members of the South Wales Institute of Engineers desire on this occasion of your visit to the city of Cardiff to assure you of their loyalty and devotion. They are grateful for the solicitude you have both always evinced for

the welfare and progress of your subjects, and they trust you will long be spared to carry on the good work of your illustrious predecessors.

The Institute was founded in the year 1857 for the encouragement and advancement of engineering science and practice, and the prevention of accidents in mines, and in 1881 her august Majesty the late Queen Victoria was graciously pleased to invest it with a Royal Charter of Incorporation.

The buildings which constitute its home were erected in Park Place, Cardiff, in 1893, and were enlarged in 1907. They contain a lecture hall and other rooms in which the members meet at stated intervals on common ground to read and discuss papers upon matters relating to their profession. These papers are published, and their contents are thus conserved and disseminated for the general benefit.

The seven hundred members of the Institute include mining, civil, mechanical, metallurgical, marine, and electrical engineers, as well as many owners and managers of collieries and industrial works situate in South Wales and the surrounding districts.

The functions of mining engineers are to study the geological and physical features of the coalfield, to devise and select the most suitable appliances for sinking to, and working the seams of coal, and to direct and supervise the technical operations both on the surface and in the mine, with special regard to efficiency, economy and safety. They thus occupy an intermediate position between the mine-owner on the one hand and the workmen on the other, and hence are charged with important responsibilities towards both.

As instances of the predominant part played by the exigencies of mining in stimulating and fostering the inventive faculties of your subjects, we may be permitted to remind your Majesties that it is exactly two hundred years since Newcomen's archetypal steam engine was erected for the purpose of draining a coal mine near Dudley Castle; and that Trevethick's locomotive engine, the first that ever drew a train on rails, began in 1804—a little over one hundred years ago—to convey the produce of Penydarren mines and ironworks to the Merthyr Canal, which passes into the city of Cardiff within eyeshot of the spot whereon we are now assembled.

The members of the South Wales Institute of Engineers offer to your Majesties a hearty and loyal welcome to this part of your Dominions, and trust that you will long continue to cherish sunny memories of your present visit to the Principality.

NATIONAL MUSEUM OF WALES.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty:

May it please Your Majesty—

We, the President, the Court of Governors, the Council, and the Director of the National Museum of Wales, take the opportunity of Your Majesty's gracious presence among us for the purpose of laying the foundation stone of the aforesaid National Museum, to offer to Your Majesty the expression of our loyal devotion and heartfelt gratitude.

We recall that the Royal Charter by which this institution was called into being emanated

from Your Majesty's illustrious father, his late Majesty King Edward VII. of blessed memory, and furnishes a signal proof of his deep interest in the progress, intellectual, scientific, and æsthetic of his people. Your Majesty has worthily continued the good work thus begun by the grant only last year of a Supplemental Charter enlarging the powers and functions of the museum and thus increasing its capacity for useful public service.

Her warm sympathy with the higher aspirations of the people of this country has been manifested again and again, and we humbly thank Her for this renewed proof of Her interest in the objects for which this museum has been established.

On behalf of the Queen I thank you sincerely for the special words of welcome which you have addressed to Her. We shall both treasure the memories of this occasion, and recall with gratitude the warmth of your greetings and the earnestness of your good wishes.

On leaving the Museum Their Majesties visited the University College of South Wales and Monmouthshire, where the following Address was presented:—

An Address presented to Their Majesties the King and Queen by the President, Governors, Council, and Senate of the University College of South Wales and Monmouthshire, on the occasion of Their Majesties' visit to the College, June 26th, 1912.

May it please Your Majesty—

This very day, sixteen years ago, Your Majesty's Royal Father inaugurated at Aberystwyth that close connection between the Throne and the University to which national education in Wales has owed and owes so much.

Six years later Your Majesty did special honour to the sister College of North Wales by choosing the North as the scene of Your own installation.

Seven years ago this week Your Majesty laid the foundation-stone of the building of the University College of South Wales and Monmouthshire, to which with glad and loyal hearts we welcome Your Majesties to-day.

In the interval that has elapsed an important portion of the whole design has been completed, but other Faculties still await reunion here under one roof with their sister Faculties of Arts and Music.

The Research Laboratory which Your Majesty has to-day inspected is an earnest of what we trust the future has in store.

Throughout Your Majesty's Empire there has been of late years a vast growth of interest in higher education. Men are coming to realise that an ignorant people must necessarily be a backward people, and that only those nations who are eager in the race can prevail in the struggle for pre-eminence. Hence the relations between the Arts and Sciences on the one hand, and Trade expansion and Industrial prosperity on the other, are becoming more sympathetic and more intimate. Their interdependence is now being generally recognised. This is especially evident in our great manufacturing centres, where men who have prospered through the combination of capital and labour have come forward liberally to endow education in all its branches.

Much, however, remains still to be done to make this College worthy of the position which it aspires to fill, and it is our confident hope that, as time goes on, the leaders of Commerce and Industry in South Wales and Monmouthshire will identify themselves more and more intimately with the College, and, through it, with the educational development of this great and populous district, to the advancement of the community as a whole and to the realisation of those ideals which our Founders have bequeathed to us.

We trust that Your Majesty and Her Majesty the Queen, whom we are proud to claim as a Graduate of our University, may again visit us at no far distant time to witness the completion of the design, and to inaugurate a new era in the annals of an institution which we trust will prove worthy of Your protection.

We pray, as in duty bound, that Your Majesty's reign may be long and glorious.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

It gives Me great pleasure to have this opportunity of re-visiting the University College of South Wales and Monmouthshire, and of witnessing the great progress which has been made with the building of which I laid the foundation stone seven years ago.

I have watched with keen interest the gradual realisation of the scheme for the National University of Wales which owes its inception to the patriotism and public spirit of leaders of Welsh thought, and is rapidly being carried to final completion by the enthusiasm and whole-hearted support of all classes in the Principality. Last year it was My privilege to open the new University Buildings at Bangor, and to visit the oldest of the University Colleges at Aberystwyth, and what I saw then and see to-day assures Me that in no part of My dominions is the development of higher education prosecuted with greater energy and success than in Wales.

The Research Laboratory which I have inspected is an important and creditable addition to the University and should be an encouragement to further efforts in the cause you have at heart.

I echo your hope that those who hold the foremost place in the business activities of this great industrial centre will more and more realize that they can best advance the common

welfare by identifying themselves with the College and supporting it in its work.

I thank you on behalf of the Queen as well as Myself for your good wishes, and I shall rejoice with you when the design for the building of the College shall have been carried to completion.

In the afternoon their Majesties visited Caerphilly Castle, where the following Address was presented:—

JUSTICES OF MISKIN LOWER.

To Their Most Gracious Majesties King George V. and Queen Mary.

May it please Your Majesties—

We, your Majesties' liege and loyal subjects, the Stipendiary Magistrate and the Justices of the Peace for the Petty Sessional Division of Miskin Lower, beg respectfully to tender to Your Majesties a most cordial Cymric welcome on this Your Majesties' first visit to the division which constitutes, geographically, the very heart of the historic county of Glamorgan, and is the chief centre of the coal-mining industry in Wales.

The Petty Sessional Division of Miskin Lower, which in point of population is by far the largest in Wales, comprises the important urban district of Pontypridd, the whole of the two populous Valleys of the Rhondda, the parish of Llantrisant, with its ancient but now dissolved borough, and the parishes of Llantwit Vardre and Pentyrch.

Its native inhabitants represent, with rare purity of blood, the brave and freedom-loving Silures of the Roman period, from whom they have inherited their warm-hearted impulsiveness, their love of music, their attachment to principle, their susceptibility to religion.

When the rest of Glamorgan was conquered by the Normans the men of Miskin and Glyn Rhondda, in common with those of Senghenydd, retained their lands and independence under their native chieftains, but when later they became subjects of the English Crown, they gave many a signal proof of their devotion and loyalty to the Royal House of England, which, through the accession of Henry Tudor, became also the Royal House of Wales.

Your Majesties' ancestor King Edward II., affectionately known in Wales as Edward of Carnarvon, found succour in his distress, at the Abbey of Penrhys in the Rhondda, and his grandson, the "Black Prince," had under his command at Cressy and Agincourt none more brave or loyal than the men of Llantrisant, and the tradition of that honourable service is still cherished with pride in the division.

In more modern times, during the reigns of your august predecessors, Her Majesty Queen Victoria and His Majesty King Edward VII. (whose spontaneous sympathy with the sufferers in mining accidents endeared them in a very special manner to every heart in the Welsh coalfield), it fell to the lot of the Rhondda Valley to render another and even more enduring service to your Majesties' Empire by supplying that noted Rhondda steam coal, which has been, and still is, so important a factor in the pre-eminence of the merchant shipping of Great Britain and in the supremacy of Your Majesty's Navy for the defence of your Kingdom.

Your Majesties' practical interest in the condition of the workers and keen solicitude for their welfare, make you ever deeply conscious of the fact that the service rendered to the community by coal-winning is both toilsome and perilous, not infrequently involving loss of life and injury to the miners, and the heroism shown in rescue work, has at all times received a most generous recognition at the hands of Your Majesties, and of your illustrious predecessors, especially the late King Edward VII., who, in October, 1907, was graciously pleased to institute the Edward Medal by way of recognition of "heroic acts performed by miners and quarrymen." We are, therefore, gratefully proud of the fact that Your Majesties have included a visit to the rescue station at Dinas in Your tour through the Rhondda Valley.

We also desire to express our own gratification, and to record the general satisfaction at the unceasing efforts of Your Majesties' Government to secure to all who are engaged in coal-mining the utmost measure of safety practicable in the pursuit of their occupation, as well as a higher standard of life in so far as that can be realised by means of better conditions of labour, improved housing and sanitation, and by such other means as may enable them to use their leisure, to the best advantage, in social and intellectual recreation, and in the discharge of their duties as citizens.

We recall with pleasure the encouragement given by Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise in the matter of providing recreational institutions in this district, when, in July, 1909, Her Royal Highness visited the Rhondda Valley on the occasion of the opening of such an institute, namely, "The Judges Hall," at Trealaw, provided by one of our number, Mr. Rhys Williams, of Miskin Manor, whose father was the first Stipendiary Magistrate for this Petty Sessional Division.

Certain others of our number have for many years been privileged to render special services for the furtherance and preservation of a cordial relationship between employer and employed, and we are glad to think that since 1903, most of the differences that have arisen as to the rates of wages payable in the coalfield have been settled through the instrumentality of a Conciliation Board for South Wales, on which both coal owners and workmen are represented, two members of our own body—Mr. Frederick Lewis Davis and the Right Honourable William Abraham, M.P.—being the Presidents of the owners' and workmen's representatives respectively on that Board.

We fervently hope that even still greater benefits will accrue from the deliberations of the Joint District Board recently established for South Wales under the Coal Mines (Minimum Wage) Act of this year, and that in every industry effective means may be found for harmonising the interests of all who contribute, whether in capital, in labour, or in superintendence, to the work of production and distribution.

We humbly conceive that it is by these and similar pacific methods, and by united effort at social amelioration, that the prosperity and contentment of this district, in common with the country generally, will in the future be maintained.

We rejoice to be able to assure Your Majesties that apart from such regrettable friction as recently arose from a conflict of industrial interests, Your Majesties' subjects in this division share to the full the high character of the Welsh nation at large as a peaceful and law-abiding people.

Regardful as we are of the high trust reposed in us in the matter of administering justice, and of maintaining "the King's peace" in these parts of Your Majesties' Kingdom, we beg leave humbly to assure Your Majesties, in the solemn words of our oath of office, that we will ever continue to "do right to all manner of people after the laws and usages of this realm, without fear or favour, affection or ill-will."

We beg humbly to offer to Your Majesties our warmest thanks for the most generous interest which Your Majesties have ever manifested in all matters that appertain to the Principality of Wales, not only as regards its material prosperity, but also its national institutions—the Eisteddfod, the University of Wales, the National Library, and the National Museum, in all of which the inhabitants of this division take a lively interest.

We beg Your Majesties to accept these humble expressions of our loyalty to Your Majesties' Throne and Persons, and we earnestly pray that it may please Almighty God to make your reign long and happy and rich in all manner of blessings to your devoted subjects.

And we further beg that Your Majesties may be graciously pleased to convey to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales a message assuring him of our loyal affection for, and dutiful devotion to, his Person, and expressing our respectful hope that His Royal Highness may soon re-visit his Principality of Wales, and that on such occasion, the inhabitants of this division may be granted the supreme honour of welcoming their Prince to the historic district of Miskin and Glyn Rhondda.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following gracious Answer:—

On behalf of the Queen and Myself I thank you for your loyal and dutiful Address and for your kindly reference to Our dear Son, the Prince of Wales. His enthusiastic reception by the people of the Principality on the occasion of his Investiture is one of the happiest recollections of the year of Our Coronation.

It gives Us great pleasure to visit for the first time the division of Miskin Lower. You are justly proud of the great and heroic part which in the past its men have played in the history of this country, and I hope that the fame and honour which by their valour they won for themselves and their native land may ever remain a cherished tradition. The lives of their descendants are not without the same noble virtues, though they may be exercised in humbler and less romantic ways.

The safety and welfare of those engaged in coal mining will always be a matter of great solicitude to Me, and all researches and measures directed to diminishing the dangers of the miner's life have My hearty sympathy. I

have entire confidence in the good sense and business aptitude of all classes interested in the getting of coal; and I look forward to the time when conflicts of industrial interests will be resolved by the co-operation and goodwill of all concerned.

I am sensible of the gravity of the duties imposed upon you in connection with the administration of justice and the maintenance of law and order, and I highly appreciate the efficient manner in which you have discharged without fear or favour and often in circumstances of great difficulty the trust imposed upon you. I am confident that you will continue successfully to fulfil the obligations which attach to your high office.

MERCHANT VENTURERS OF BRISTOL.

To Their Most Gracious Majesties King George V and Queen Mary.

We, the Master Wardens and Commonalty of Merchant Venturers of the City of Bristol, humbly desire to present to Your Majesties an Address of Welcome on the auspicious occasion of Your Majesties' visit to this city made to inaugurate the New Wing added to the Royal Infirmary in commemoration of our late beloved Sovereign Your Majesty's Royal Father King Edward VII.

We might venture to ask Your Majesties to accept our Address on the ground that Your Royal Father on more than one occasion showed us this act of favour, or we might plead the fact that His Royal Highness Prince Albert, Your Majesties' Grandfather, and other members of Your Royal House, have deigned to accept the Freedom of our Society, or we might enumerate with pride and gratitude the chartered privileges granted to us by Your Majesty's Royal predecessors on the Throne of England, by King Edward the VI, Queen Elizabeth, King Charles I, and King Charles II. To another Monarch these are

reasons that might be presented with respectful propriety, but to Your Majesty, as to one who has heard the call of the sea and is a seaman bred, we humbly prefer our claim as an Ancient Guild originally engaged in the regulation and conduct of the seaborne trade of this port in those early days of maritime adventure and voyages of discovery which saw the foundations laid of the world-wide commerce and naval supremacy of our country. These are the memories to which we would appeal in the sure hope that they will meet with a gracious response in the heart of a Monarch whom his island subjects love to greet as their Sailor King.

The history of our Guild from the remote and obscure past when it first emerged as a trading department of the borough administration to those later times when it reached maturity and obtained incorporation and privileges under Royal Charters were long to tell, but it may be noted that under the regulation of the Merchant Venturers for the promotion of commerce and shipping, and by their spirit of enterprise, the City of Bristol so prospered as to become the second Port of the Kingdom.

In the exercise of their privileges and in the performance of their duties the members of our Guild won also the confidence of the first citizens of their times, who committed to them as a body distinguished no less for integrity of character than for capacity in the management of affairs the trusteeship of private charities and public benefactions.

So it was that in the eighteenth century the eminent philanthropist Edward Colston handed over to our care the hospital founded by him in 1708 for the maintenance and education of 100 poor boys, a trust which has up to the present day been faithfully discharged by members of our Guild.

Again in the nineteenth century our Guild recognising the need of practical education for the artisans of this country to meet the rising tide of foreign competition, built and equipped the institution known as the Merchant Venturers' Technical College, which brings within the reach of the working classes of this city the opportunity of obtaining technical education in the widest sense and from the lowest to the highest stage.

Coming to our own times and the twentieth century we may perhaps be permitted to say that by undertaking the maintenance of the Faculty of Engineering in the University of Bristol, the present members of our Guild have already given proof of their desire to emulate the efforts and transmit the traditions of their predecessors.

Such in outline is the history of the Guild which ventures to address Your Majesties with words of welcome and of loyalty on the occasion of Your Majesties' visit to Bristol, an event happy indeed and welcome at all times, but doubly happy now as arising from Your Majesties' own desire to show on the first occasion possible by Your gracious presence here to-day that anxious care for the alleviation of pain and sickness among the poorer of your subjects which has long been characteristic of Your Royal House.

That Your Majesties may live long in health and happiness, and that under Your Majesties' wise and beneficent rule the blessings of Peace and Prosperity may long be secured to the British people and British Empire is the earnest prayer of Your Majesties' devoted subjects The Merchant Venturers of Bristol.

The following Address was presented on the occasion of the opening of the King Edward VII Memorial Infirmary:—

To His Most Excellent Majesty King George V.

May it please Your Majesty—

We, the President and Committee, on behalf of the 3,500 Governors and Subscribers of the Bristol Royal Infirmary, desire humbly to approach Your Majesty with respectful and loyal attachment and with grateful acknowledgment of the honour conferred by Your gracious presence on this auspicious day, rendered more memorable in that Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen accompanies Your Majesty, and thus once more shows her very real sympathy with every work whose object is the amelioration of the sufferings of the poor.

The Bristol Royal Infirmary, founded in the year 1735, is one of the oldest hospitals in Your Kingdom and the largest medical charity in the West of England. During its long history it has dealt with no less than 2,470,000 patients, while last year over 61,000 patients were treated.

The present Infirmary provides 270 beds, but increasing demands made considerable extension imperative, and the New Infirmary, dedicated as a Memorial to His late Majesty King Edward VII, will accommodate 181 additional patients. It is intended to devote this building to surgical, casualty and special departments.

The King Edward VII Memorial Infirmary has cost between £70,000 and £80,000, but, although in itself a complete Infirmary, it is only the first instalment of a scheme designed for a transfer of the whole establishment to the new site already acquired, which will involve a total outlay of over £200,000.

In order to supplement the present work, the Nurses' Home has also been extended so as to accommodate the staff of 188 Sisters and Nurses, whilst the addition of about two acres of garden will be a boon to the patients and nurses.

Under the scheme of Your Majesty's Secretary of State for War, it is necessary to provide in certain eventualities a Base Hospital in Bristol with 520 beds. By the opening of the King Edward VII Memorial Infirmary and the extension of the Nurses' Home, a total of upwards of 600 beds could be provided, and, having formulated a scheme for dealing with the civil patients in such an eventuality, the Governors resolved to comply with the request of the British Red Cross Society to place the whole Bristol Royal Infirmary and its equipment at the disposition of the War Office in case of need. This offer has been gratefully accepted by the County Territorial Association. We sincerely trust that the necessity may never arise, but it is a satisfaction to know that arrangements have been made which will enable a complete hospital to be instantly at the service of Your Majesty's forces.

Your Majesty's gracious consent, as also that of Her Majesty the Queen, to become the patrons of the institution and the privilege of using the Royal Arms which was accorded last year has been a great encouragement to the

Governors, whilst the opening of the King Edward VII Memorial Infirmary by Your Majesty this day will, we believe, prove only the beginning of still further extension.

The dedication of the New Infirmary by the Governors as a Memorial to Your Majesty's late beloved Father is one of the means by which Bristol secures a daily reminder of the absorbing interest shown by King Edward VII in the healing of the sick, whilst we thankfully recognize that Your Majesty is present here to-day, not only as our Sovereign, but also as the Head of all hospital work in your kingdom in regard to which Your Majesty has displayed so much thoughtful care and practical interest.

We pray that the Divine blessing may attend Your Majesties in your daily lives and charitable works, and that the years to come may bring every happiness to Your Majesties and the members of Your Royal House.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the First Class to John Mitchell and James Green under the following circumstances:—

On the 23rd December, 1911, water in large quantities broke into the Bamfurlong Mine, near Wigan, and by a heavy fall of earth a party of 13 were cut off from safety. Mitchell explored the roads in order to find a way of reaching these men, though his life was exposed to constant danger in consequence of the continued rise of the water. Finally he succeeded in boring a passage through the fall, thereby rescuing all the men who had been cut off. In another part of the workings Green, who had heard of the inundation, went down the dip to warn the men under his charge, although he met the water already rushing down the roads. In doing so, he acted at grave risk to his life, and it was two hours before he was out of danger. He extricated all his men.

James Green has since died, and the Medal will be given to his widow.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to James A. Wright, a timberman at the Rand Clip Mine, Bocksburg, under the following circumstances:—

On the 25th of April, 1911, a baling tank was accidentally lowered too far down a shaft, and broke the slings carrying a sinking pump, which fell into the water at the bottom of the shaft, pinning two natives under water. Wright made repeated efforts to extricate them by diving. The water, though only 4½ feet deep, was rising, and there was great danger that the pump and other wreckage would be shifted by Wright's attempts to pull out the natives, and would pin him down under water. He was unsuccessful in his attempted rescue, but the action showed a high degree of courage.

His Majesty The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to George Edwards, under the following circumstances:—

On the 22nd of July, 1911, a road was being driven at the Bryncethin Colliery, near Bridgend, in order to release an accumulation of gas, which, in a sudden outburst, rushed through a borehole in the roof, and the manager and three men were overcome by the fumes. Edwards was summoned from his home, and

with a rope tied round his legs tried to reach the three men, who had not been rescued. He was overpowered by gas, and had to be dragged out. On recovering he made further attempts and succeeded in attaching a rope to the bodies of two of the men, who were drawn up, but too late to save their lives. Edwards undoubtedly ran considerable risk, and, though his efforts to save life were unfortunately unsuccessful, his gallant action appears to deserve recognition.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to Robert Greenlees, of the British South Africa Explosives Works, Modderfontein, South Africa, under the following circumstances:—

On the 27th February, 1911, Greenlees was engaged along with a fellow-workman named Greig, in destroying bags of Collodion Cotton when one of the bags ignited and both men were severely burned. Greig's clothes had caught fire and he was helpless from the shock. Greenlees, in spite of the fact that he was suffering from severe pain, went to Greig's assistance and extinguished the flames in time to save his life for the moment, though he subsequently succumbed.

Whereas Regulations were made by the Board of Trade on the 6th May, 1912, in pursuance of section 91 of the National Insurance Act, 1911, and whereas in Regulation 36 of these Regulations it is enacted as follows:—

“Where any workmen employed in an insured trade are employed in or for the purposes of the business of any person (in this Regulation referred to as the substantial employer) by some other person who himself works wholly or mainly by way of manual labour in that business (in this Regulation referred to as the immediate employer), the substantial employer shall, unless the Board direct to the contrary, be treated for the purposes of Part II of the Act as the employer of those workmen instead of the immediate employer, and shall be liable accordingly to perform the duties and pay the contributions required under the Act or these Regulations to be performed and paid by the employer of a workman in an insured trade:

Provided that—

(a) the substantial employer may deduct from any payments due from him to the immediate employer any sums paid by him as contributions on behalf of the workmen, and the immediate employer may deduct from the workmen's wages or from any other payments due from him to the workmen any sums deducted from payments due to him by the substantial employer; and

(b) any direction given by the Board under this Regulation shall not come into force until the expiration of seven days from the date thereof or such later date as may be specified in the direction.”

And whereas it is expedient that directions should be given by the Board of Trade in accordance with the above-mentioned Regulation.

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade hereby direct that in the case of workmen employed in building and construction of works, where the substantial employer has not an exclusive right

to the services of the immediate employer, the substantial employer shall not be treated as the employer for the purposes of Part II of the Act, but the immediate employer shall be treated as the employer for the purposes of Part II of the Act.

This direction shall come into force on the 15th July, 1912.

LANCASHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT- AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 4).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:

Movement into, out of, or within Scheduled District.

1. No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be landed in, or moved into or out of, the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along, over or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such district by railway from a place outside such district to another place outside such district without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such district.

Provision as to Foreign Animals Wharf.

2. Nothing in this Order shall affect the landing of foreign animals at a Foreign Animals Wharf, or the movement of animals within any such wharf.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

3. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

4.—(1) If an animal is landed in contravention of this Order the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which it is

landed, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the landing, and the person landing the same, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been landed in contravention as aforesaid shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Revocation.

5.—The Lancashire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 3) is hereby revoked.

6.—This Order may be cited as the LANCA-SHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 4).

LANCASHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 5).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Movement of Animals into or within certain Boroughs for Immediate Slaughter.

1.—(1.) Notwithstanding anything in the Lancashire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (No. 2), an animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved without a licence from premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease to a railway station situate within any borough mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order, and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station to any slaughter-house or bacon factory situate within the same borough if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the borough.

(2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, also be moved from any premises situate within any borough mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order to any slaughter-house or bacon factory situate within the same borough if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the borough.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

2.—(1.) The movement of an animal with a Movement Licence under this Order shall be subject to the following conditions:—

(i.) The animal shall be moved to the slaughter-house or bacon factory specified

in the licence by the route therein described, and not elsewhere, and shall be there detained, and shall be slaughtered within four days of its arrival thereat.

(ii.) The animal during the movement to the slaughter-house or bacon factory shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals not being moved with a licence under this Order.

(iii.) After completion of the movement the licence shall forthwith be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest police station in the same district by the person in charge of the animal at the time of completing such movement.

(2.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall be in the form set forth in the Third Schedule hereto or to the like effect.

Exception of Certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement.

3. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising—

(i.) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by regulation of a Local Authority or by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board; or

(ii.) movement of an animal out of a Scheduled District; or

(iii.) movement of an animal the movement of which is subject to any Order of the Board relating to any disease other than Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

Special Provision as to County Borough of Liverpool.

4. Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising movement of an animal along, over or across a highway or thoroughfare in either of the Areas in the county borough of Liverpool, described in the Second Schedule to this Order.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

5.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Commencement.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the fourth day of July, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title.

7. This Order may be cited as the LAN-CASHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 5).

Local Authority to enforce Order.

3. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

4.—(1.) If an animal is landed in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which it is landed, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permit-

ting the landing, and the person landing the same, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been landed in contravention as aforesaid shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Short Title.

5. This Order may be cited as the NORTH-UMBERLAND (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912.
