MERCHANT SHIPPING ACT, 1894. MERSEY CHANNELS ACT, 1897.

NOTICE is hereby given that, after the expiration of forty days from the date hereof, it is proposed to submit to His Majesty in Council, in pursuance of the above-mentioned Acts, the draft of an Order in Council revoking the Order in Council of the 17th September, 1900, and making new Rules concerning lights and signals to be carried, and the steps for avoiding collisions to be taken by vessels navigating the River Mersey and the sea channels or approaches thereto within certain specified limits.

EXPLOSIVES ACT, 1875.

The Right Honourable Reginald McKenna, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in virtue of the powers conferred on him by section 53 of the Explosives Act, 1875, has appointed Sergeant Edward Sweeney, No. 56,073, of the Royal Irish Constabulary, to be an Inspector for Ireland under the said Act.
