TRADE BOARDS ACT, 1909.

Order of the Board of Trade under Section 5 (2).

Whereas by section 4 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, it is, amongst other things, provided as follows:—

(1) Trade Boards shall, subject to the provisions of this section, fix minimum rates of

wages for timework for their trades (in this Act referred to as minimum time-rates), and may also fix general minimum rates of wages for piecework for their trades (in this Act referred to as general minimum piece-rates), and those rates of wages (whether time or piece-rates) may be fixed so as to apply universally to the trade, or so as to apply to any special process in the work of the trade, or to any special class of workers in the trade, or to any special area.

If a Trade Board report to the Board of Trade that it is impracticable in any case to fix a minimum time-rate in accordance with this section, the Board of Trade may, so far as respects that case, relieve the Trade Board of their duty.

(2) Before fixing any minimum time-rate or general minimum piece-rate, the Trade Board shall give notice of the rate which they propose to fix, and consider any objections to the rate which may be lodged with them within three months.

(3) The Trade Board shall give notice of any minimum time-rate or general minimum piece-rate fixed by them.

And whereas by section 5 of the said Act it is, amongst other things, provided:—

(1) Until a minimum time-rate or general minimum piece-rate fixed by a Trade Board has been made obligatory by order of the Board of Trade under this section, the operation of the rate shall be limited as in this Act provided.

(2) Upon the expiration of six months from the date on which a Trade Board have given notice of any minimum time-rate or general minimum piece-rate fixed by them, the Board of Trade shall make an order (in this Act referred to as an obligatory order) making that minimum rate obligatory in cases in which it is applicable on all persons employing labour and on all persons employed, unless they are of opinion that the circumstances are such as to make it premature or otherwise undesirable to make an obligatory order, and in that case they shall make an order suspending the obligatory operation of the rate (in this Act referred to as an order of suspension).

And whereas the Trade Board established under the said Act by Regulations made by the Board of Trade, and dated 27th April, 1910, for that branch of the Box trade in Great Britain which is engaged in making Boxes or parts thereof made wholly or partially of Paper, Cardboard, Chip or similar material, was duly constituted by the Board of Trade on 29th July, 1910.

And whereas the said Trade Board gave notice on 1st September, 1911, that they proposed to fix minimum time-rates of wages for female workers in the said trade.

And whereas, after considering the objections lodged with them within three months from 1st September, 1911, the said Trade Board gave notice on 11th March, 1912, that they had fixed minimum time-rates of wages for female workers in the said trade, and the rates fixed are set out in the Schedule hereto.

And whereas the said rates have been in limited operation since the 11th day of March, 1912.

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade, in pursuance of the powers in them vested as before

recited, do, by this order, make the said minimum time-rates, fixed by the said Trade Board, and set out in the said Schedule hereto, obligatory in cases in which they are applicable on all persons employing labour, and on all persons employed in the said trade.

SCHEDULE.

TRADE BOARDS ACT, 1909.

Minimum Rates Fixed for the Trade of Making Boxes or parts thereof, made wholly or partially of Paper, Cardboard, Chip or similar material. To come into force on 11th March, 1912.

In accordance with Regulations made, under section 18 of the above Act, by the Board of Trade, and dated 27th April, 1910, the Trade Board established under the above Act for that branch of the Box trade in Great Britain which is engaged in the making of Boxes or parts thereof made wholly or partially of Paper, Cardboard, Chip or similar material, hereby give notice as required by section 4 (3)

of the above Act, that they have fixed the following minimum (or lowest) rates of wages:—

MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

(1) The Minimum (or lowest) time-rates of Wages for female workers in the trade of making boxes or parts thereof made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip or similar material, shall (subject to the provisions of this notice as to learners) be as follows, clear of all deductions, that is to say:—

- (a) For female workers in a factory or workshop not being a domestic workshop ... 3d. an hour
- (b) For female homeworkers including workers in a domestic workshop ... 3d. ,,

(2) The above rates shall apply to all female workers in the respective classes as specified above (excepting all female learners as hereinafter defined) who are during the whole or part of their time employed in the making of boxes or parts thereof as aforesaid or in any branch or process thereof, but shall not apply to any female workers who are merely employed in work incidental or ancillary thereto.

(3) (a) In lieu of the above rates, female learners, as hereinafter defined, and no other persons, shall receive the following minimum (or lowest) time-rates of wages, that is to say:—

(b) The minimum (or lowest) time-rate for Learners under 14 years of age shall be 4s. a week, and on reaching the age of 14 they shall be entitled to the amounts shewn in column I. above as if they had commenced at 14.

(c) The above rates are weekly rates based on a week of 52 hours, but they shall be subject to a proportionate deduction or increase according as the number of hours actually spent in any week by the learner in the factory or workshop is less or more than 52.

(d) A learner shall cease to be a learner and be entitled to the full minimum time-rate for a worker, applicable to her under section (1) upon the fulfilment of the following conditions:—

Age of entering upon employment.	Conditions.
Under 15 years of age.	the completion of not less than 4 years' employment and the attainment of the age of 18 years.
15 and under 17 years of age.	the completion of 3 years' employment.
17 and under 20 years of age.	the completion of 2 years' employment.
20 years of age and over.	the completion of one year's employment.

A learner returning to the trade after absence shall not serve a longer period as a learner than would be required if she were entering the trade for the first time.

(e) Any female who has been previously employed in any branch of the trade as described in section (1) and has not held a certificate or certified copy certificate and is subsequently taken on as a learner shall be entitled to count the whole period of such previous employment for the purpose of claiming the time-rate at which she is to be paid, and shall have such period of employment entered upon her certificate or certified copy.

(4) A female learner is a worker who is employed as described in section (2) hereof, subject also to the following conditions:—

(a) Has not become entitled to the full minimum rate under section (1),

(b) Is employed in a factory or workshop not being a room used for dwelling purposes,

(c) Is employed by an employer who provides such learner with reasonable facilities for practically and efficiently learning the branch or branches of the trade (as carried on by the employer subject to the provisions of this section) in which the learner is for the time being employed,

(d) Has received a certificate or certified copy certificate issued in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board and held subject to compliance

with the conditions *a*, *b* and *c*, above specified, or has made an application therefor, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. The Trade Board may, if any of the conditions specified in *a*, *b* or *c* are not in fact complied with, cancel the original certificate, whereupon any copy thereof shall become cancelled. Notice of such cancellation shall forthwith be given to the learner and her employer.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment without a certificate for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

(5) In totalling up any reckonings, in the aggregate arrived at when paying the rates fixed hereunder, every fraction of a farthing shall count as a farthing.

(6) The expressions factory and workshop used herein shall have the meanings given to them by the Factory and Workshop Acts, 1901 and 1907.

NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE.

THE NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE (WALES) (SANATORIUM BENEFIT, &C.) ORDER, 1912, dated August 28, 1912, made under section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (1 &

2 Geo. 5, c. 55), by the Welsh Insurance Commissioners constituted under that Act with reference to the administration of Sanatorium Benefit during the first three months after the commencement of the Act in the case of persons who are not members of Approved Societies, with reference to the provision of funds for Sanatorium Benefit during the period ending 12th January, 1913, and prescribing as respects the year 1913 the date which for certain purposes is to be deemed to be the commencement of the year.

Whereas by section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called "the Act"), it is amongst other things enacted that if any difficulty arises with respect to bringing into operation Part I. of the Act, the Insurance Commissioners with the consent of the Treasury may by Order do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing that Part of the Act into operation, and that any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or expedient for carrying the Order into effect:

And whereas by section 82 of the Act it is enacted amongst other things that Commissioners for Wales (called the Welsh Insurance Commissioners) shall be constituted for the purpose of carrying Part I. of the Act into effect in Wales, and such Commissioners have been so constituted:

And whereas by virtue of section 42 of the Act and the Regulations made thereunder, a person in respect of whom contributions under the Act have been paid, does not, notwithstanding that he is not a member of an Approved Society, become a deposit contributor before the expiration of the three months from the commencement of the Act:

And whereas provision is made by the Act that all sums available for Sanatorium Benefit shall be paid or credited to Insurance Committees at the commencement of the year, but doubts have arisen as to the amounts to be so paid or credited to Insurance Committees in respect of the period before the commencement of the year 1913 and as to the time at which those amounts are to be paid or credited:

And whereas persons in respect of whom contributions under the Act have been paid in accordance with the provisions of the Act may become entitled to Sanatorium Benefit at any date after the commencement of the Act:

And whereas as respects the year 1913 it is expedient that for the purposes of sections 42 (e) and 61 of the Act the 13th day of January should be deemed to be the commencement of the year:

Now therefore the Welsh Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by section 78 of the Act, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

1. All persons, not being members of Approved Societies, in respect of whom contributions under the Act are paid in accordance with the provisions of the Act at any time not later than the 12th day of January, 1913, shall

for the purpose of the provisions of the Act relating to the administration of sanatorium benefit be deemed, if they subsequently join an Approved Society at any date within the time prescribed for the purpose by the National Health Insurance (Time for Joining an Approved Society) Regulations, 1912, not being a date later than the 12th day of January, 1913, to have been members of an Approved Society as from the date of their entry into insurance, and shall for that purpose in any other case be deemed to have been deposit contributors as from that date.

2.—(1.) For the purpose of defraying the expenses of sanatorium benefit during the period between the 15th day of July, 1912, and the 12th day of January, 1913, both inclusive, there shall be deducted, at such times and in such manner as the Commissioners may direct, from the several amounts from time to time standing to the credit of persons who are deposit contributors and from the respective amounts standing to the credit of Approved Societies such sums as may be determined by the Commissioners to be necessary for the purpose of meeting the expenditure incurred in connection with the provision of sanatorium benefit during the said period, not exceeding in the case of a deposit contributor 1d. for every four contributions paid in respect of him during the said period, and not exceeding in the case of an Approved Society $\frac{1}{4}$ d. for every contribution credited to the Society in respect of the said period, and all sums so deducted shall be transferred to the proper Insurance Committees:

Provided that no deductions shall be made under the foregoing provisions from the amounts standing to the credit of any deposit contributor being a person not entitled to sanatorium benefit, and contributions paid by any person not entitled to sanatorium benefit shall not be taken into account in calculating the amount to be deducted from the amount standing to the credit of an Approved Society.

(2.) In the application of this paragraph to aliens, three shall be substituted for four and $\frac{1}{4}$ d. shall be substituted for $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

(3.) For the purposes of this paragraph—

The expression "deposit contributor" includes a person who by virtue of the preceding paragraph of this Order is deemed to be a deposit contributor;

The expression "person not entitled to sanatorium benefit" means an insured person whom the Insurance Committee have no power to recommend for sanatorium benefit;

The expression "alien" means a person of the age of 17 years or upwards who is not a British subject and to whom section 45 of the Act applies.

(4.) For the purpose of calculating the sums to be deducted from the amounts standing to the credit of deposit contributors any three or less number of contributions in excess of any multiple of four contributions shall be deemed to be four contributions.

3. As respects the year 1913 the commencement of the year shall for the purposes of section 42 (e) and section 61 of the Act be taken to be the 13th day of January.

4. This Order may be cited as the National

Health Insurance (Wales) (Sanatorium Benefit, etc.) Order, 1912.

ALTERING GENERAL CONSOLIDATED ORDER: Daily Visitation of Sick and Lying-in Wards of Workhouse: Transferring certain Duties from Master and Matron to Superintendent Nurse.

NEWARK UNION.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Newark Union;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by a General Order dated the 24th day of July, 1847, the Poor Law Commissioners made certain Rules and Regulations with regard to the government of the Workhouses of certain Unions, including the Newark Union, and the duties of persons appointed to certain offices in the said Workhouses, including the offices of Master and Matron of the Workhouse;

And whereas by Articles 208 and 210 of the said Order the Master and Matron of the Workhouse are respectively required to visit the wards of the male and female paupers every morning and night, and to see that the regulations prescribed in the said Articles are duly and properly carried out;

And whereas it is expedient that other provision should be made as regards the visitation of the sick and lying-in wards of the Workhouse of the said Union:

NOW THEREFORE, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order that the following Regulations shall be in force in the Newark Union as regards the visitation of the sick and lying-in wards of the Workhouse of the Union:—

ARTICLE I.—It shall be the duty of the Superintendent Nurse to visit each of the sick and lying-in wards of the Workhouse daily, and to see that the said wards have been duly cleansed and are properly warmed and ventilated, and also that all such arrangements are made as may be necessary for the proper care of and attendance upon the inmates both by day and during the night.

ARTICLE II.—The duty of making morning and nightly visits to the sick and lying-in wards of the Workhouse shall cease to be part of the duties of the Master or Matron of the Workhouse, as the case may be; but, except to this extent, nothing in this Order shall affect the duties of the Master or Matron so far as those duties relate to the general control of the Workhouse.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 14TH SEPTEMBER 1912.)

DURHAM AND NORTHUMBERLAND
(FOOT - AND - MOUTH DISEASE)
ORDER OF 1912 (No. 17).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Withdrawal of Existing Orders.

1. The provisions of the Durham and Northumberland (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (Nos. 9-16) shall cease to operate, and instead of those provisions the following provisions shall take effect in certain parts of the areas to which those Orders applied.

Regulation of Movement of Animals out of, into or within Area.

2.—(1.) No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved out of the Area described in the Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "the Area").

(2.) No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved into, or be moved along, over or across a highway or thoroughfare within the Area, unless they are accompanied by a Movement Licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority.

(3.) No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare in the Area.

Regulation of Movement of Animals out of Zone.

3. No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved out of the Zone described in the Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as the Zone) except—

(a) into the Area under and in accordance with the provisions of the preceding Article; or

(b) to a slaughterhouse, in which case the animals must be accompanied by a Movement Licence authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises from which the animals are to be moved are situate, and must, before the movement is commenced, be marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ about six inches long on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow ↑ on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre,

one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

4.—(1.) Every Licence under this Order shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorized to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.

(2.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.

(3.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority, or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.

(4.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue.

(5.) Animals while being moved with a Licence under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughterhouse they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

(6.) Movement of animals with a Licence under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

(7.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

(8.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

Regulation of Markets &c., in Area and Zone.

5. No market, fair, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in the Area or the Zone.

Movement of Animals through Zone or Area by Railway.

6. An animal shall not be deemed to be moved out of the Zone or the Area where it is moved through such Zone or Area by railway from a place outside such Zone or Area to another place outside such Zone or Area without unnecessary delay and without the animal being untrucked within such Zone or Area.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

7.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

8. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

9. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

10. This Order shall come into operation on the eighteenth day of September, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, &c.

11. This Order may be cited as the DURHAM AND NORTHUMBERLAND (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 17).

Area Referred to in this Order.

An Area comprising the parishes of Hallington, Ryal, and Bingfield, such part of the parish of Chollerton as lies to the east of the Roman Road and the road leading from Hexham to Rothbury, and such part of the

parish of Little Bavington as lies to the south of the road from Chollerton to Capheaton (via Steel Rigg and Cocklaw Walls), in the administrative county of Northumberland.

Zone Referred to in this Order.

A Zone in the administrative county of Northumberland comprising the parish of Kearsley, and such parts of the parishes of Great Bavington, Little Bavington, Thockrington, Chollerton, Cocklaw, Great Whittington, West Matfen, Ingoe, Kirkheaton, and Capheaton, as lie within the following boundary (but excluding any roads and footpaths forming parts of such boundary, and also excluding such parts of the parishes of Little Bavington and Chollerton as are comprised within the Prohibited Area No. 1a):—

Commencing at the north-western extremity of the parish of Little Bavington at Bab Crag, and proceeding thence in a south-westerly direction following the public roads and footpaths (via Great Bavington, New Onstead, and Thockrington) to the guide-post at the junction of the roads leading westward and northward from Thockrington and Little Swinburn respectively, proceeding thence in a northerly direction along the latter road to the eastern bank of Colt Crag Reservoir, proceeding thence in a southerly direction along that bank, the eastern banks of Dry Burn and Little Swinburn Reservoir to Woodford Bridge, and thence by Watling-street to the occupation road to Wheathill, thence in a westerly direction following that road and the fence in continuation thereof, to its junction with the fence running southerly to Coal Burn, thence in a southerly direction following that fence to its junction with the fence running north-easterly from Wood Hall, thence following the last-mentioned fence and the occupation road (via Wood Hall) to the public road from Barrasford to Rothbury, thence south-westerly along the last-mentioned road to the guide-post opposite the occupation road to Middle Farm, thence in an easterly direction along the last-mentioned road and the footpath in continuation thereof to the Beck which flows southward into Erring Burn near Keepwick Mill, thence in a southerly direction following the course of that Beck, Erring Burn, and the footpath leading southward from Keepwick Mill to the public road from Cocklaw to Bingfield, thence in an easterly direction following that road to the bridle road leading southward from Errington, thence in a southerly direction along the last-mentioned road to the northern boundary fence of Errington Hill Head, thence in an easterly and southerly direction following that fence, the eastern boundary fence of the same property, the fence running parallel with Redhouse Crag, the fence running northwards from Grottington, and the bridle-road running eastward therefrom to Watling-street at a point near Bewclay, thence in a southerly direction following Watling-street to the northern boundary of the parish of Little Whittington, thence in an easterly direction following that boundary, Bowbridge Burn to Bow Bridge, and the main public road through Great Whittington and Matfen to the public road leading to Low Hall and Fenwick, thence in a northerly and easterly direction following that road to the eastern boundary of the parish of West Matfen, thence in a northerly direction

following that boundary and the northern boundary of the same parish to the bridle-road running northward to Muckleridge, thence in a northerly direction following the last-mentioned road and its continuation (*via Low Hall*) to the public road between Ryal and Ingoe, thence continuing in a northerly direction across the last-mentioned road to and along the main road from Ingoe to Kirkharle (*via Tongues Plantation, the footbridge and ford over the river Blyth, Sandybraes, and the footbridge and ford over Swilder Burn*) to the southern boundary of the parish of Kirkharle, thence in a westerly direction following that boundary and the northern boundary of the parish of Little Bavington to the point of commencement.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 14TH SEPTEMBER 1912.)

ANIMALS (LANDING FROM IRELAND) AMENDMENT ORDER OF 1912 (No. 9).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Landing for Immediate Slaughter.

1.—(1.) Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 22 of the Foreign Animals Order of 1910, and the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Order of 1912, cattle, sheep, and swine brought from Ireland and put on board at a port specified in the First Schedule to this Order may be landed at a landing stage specified in the Second Schedule to this Order, subject to the following conditions, namely:—

(i.) The landing of the animals must be authorised by the Superintendent of the Foreign Animals Wharf within the limits of which the landing stage is situate or by the person in charge of the Wharf.

(ii.) The animals on landing shall be moved to a reception lair in the Wharf, specially approved by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries and set apart for the purpose, and shall be slaughtered therein, or in a slaughterhouse in the Wharf approved by a Veterinary Inspector of the Board for the purpose, within forty-eight hours from the time of their landing.

(iii.) While this Order remains in operation, no cattle, sheep, or swine, other than

such as are landed under this Order, shall be landed at the landing stage used for landing of animals under this Order, except with the authority of a Veterinary Inspector of the Board, or be moved to a lair or slaughterhouse specially approved for such animals.

(iv.) The animals when landed shall be subject to the provisions of the Foreign Animals Order of 1910 which relate to animals landed at a foreign animals wharf, except so far as they are varied by this Order.

(2.) An animal shall not be landed under this Order if it is brought from Ireland in the same vessel with any cattle, sheep, goats, or swine not authorised to be landed under this Order.

Offences.

2. If any animal is landed or moved in contravention of this Order, or is not slaughtered as hereby required, any person causing or permitting the landing or movement, and the owner and person in charge of the animal which is not so slaughtered, as the case may be, shall in respect of his own acts and defaults be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the nineteenth day of September, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as the ANIMALS (LANDING FROM IRELAND) AMENDMENT ORDER OF 1912 (No. 9).

LANCASHIRE (FOOT - AND - MOUTH
DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 4).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Modification of Orders.

1. The Lancashire (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1912 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") and the Lancashire (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1912 (Nos. 2 and 3), hereinafter referred to as Order (No. 2) and Order (No. 3) respectively, are modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Movement into and within Zone II; Contraction of Limits of Scheduled District.

2.—(1.) The provisions of Order (No. 3) applicable to the Zone described in the First Schedule thereto shall cease to apply to that Zone, and shall apply to the Zone II described in the Schedule hereto.

(2.) The provisions of Order (No. 2) shall cease to operate with respect to the county boroughs of Bury, Bolton, and Wigan, and the boroughs of Accrington, Haslingden, Leigh, and Rawtenstall.

(3.) The prohibition of movement of animals contained in the principal Order shall apply only to the Zone I and the Zone II described in the Schedule hereto, which together shall be the Scheduled District for the purposes of the above mentioned Orders instead of the Scheduled District therein referred to.

Continued Prohibition of Movement in Zone I.

3. The prohibition of movement of animals contained in the principal Order shall apply without modification to the Zone I described in the Schedule hereto.

Movement of Animals through Zones by Railway.

4. For the purposes of this Order an animal shall not be deemed to be moved into or out of a Zone where it is moved through such Zone by railway from a place outside such Zone to another place outside such Zone without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such Zone.

Provisions as to Farms on borders of Zones.

5. If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without a Zone, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Zone, and where the farm extends to two Zones the whole shall be deemed to be in the inner Zone.

Commencement.

6. This Order shall come into operation on the seventeenth day of September, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Short Title, &c.

7. This Order may be cited as the LANCASHIRE (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1912 (No. 4), and shall be read with the principal Order and Order (No. 2) and Order (No. 3).
