

roadway for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of the stream called The Ching, and extending thence generally northward along the middle of such stream for a distance of fifty-nine chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, Walthamstow, from the said parish of Chingford."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Saint Albans.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments,

and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and, if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, made a Report, dated the 20th day of January, 1912, to His Majesty in Council, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"The undersigned Cosmo Gordon by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of the Province of York doth in pursuance of the 26th Section of the Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the First and Second years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria Chapter One hundred and Six hereby report to Your Majesty in Council

"That there is in the County and Diocese of York the Rectory of Ryther the Parish whereof comprises the Hamlet and Township of Lead, the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That there is also in the same County and Diocese the Perpetual Curacy of Saxton with Towton which adjoins the said Hamlet and Township of Lead.

"That by the nearest road the Hamlet and Township of Lead is situate at a distance of Seven and a half miles from the Parish Church of Ryther aforesaid and by the nearest road only a distance of one mile from the Parish Church of Saxton with Towton aforesaid.

"That there is sufficient accommodation in the Parish Church of Saxton with Towton for the Inhabitants of that Parish and also for the Inhabitants of the said Hamlet and Township of Lead.

"That according to the last Census the population of the said Parish of Ryther exclusive of the Hamlet and Township of Lead was Two hundred and Fifty-five persons and that of the said Hamlet and Township of Lead was Forty-three persons and that of the said Parish of Saxton with Towton was Four hundred and Two persons.

"That the net annual value of the said Rectory of Ryther is Three hundred and ninety pounds and that of the said Perpetual Curacy of Saxton with Towton is Two hundred and eighty-eight pounds.

"That the Patronage of the said Rectory of Ryther is vested in the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain and the Reverend William Charles Carter M.A. is the present Rector thereof.

"That the Patronage of the said Perpetual Curacy of Saxton with Towton is vested in Frederick Richard Thomas Trench Gascoigne a Lieutenant Colonel in Your Majesty's Army and the Reverend Cyril Alfred Drummond
