BY THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.
A PROCLAMATION.

Isle-of Man
To Wit.

WHEREAS, by section 6 of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the

Governor, from time to time, by and with the advice and consent of any two members of the Council, to prohibit the importation or introduction into this Isle of hay, straw, fodder, dung, offal, litter, manure, or other articles in their opinion likely to propagate or introduce infection:

And whereas the infectious disease commonly called the Foot-and-Mouth Disease prevails amongst animals in certain places beyond this Isle, and it is deemed advisable to prohibit the importation of peat-moss litter, or any other substance used in substitution for straw for bedding animals, with a view to preventing the introduction of the said disease amongst animals in this Isle.

Now I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two members of the Council, and in exercise of all the powers in that behalf given by the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, do hereby Order as follows:—

1. From and after the date hereof, no Peat-Moss Litter, or any other substance used in substitution of Straw for bedding animals, shall be imported or introduced into this Island.

2. The expression "animals" means horses, asses, and mules; cattle, sheep, goats, and all other ruminating animals; and swine.

3. This Order may be cited as "The Peat-Moss Litter (Landing) Order of 1912."

And it is hereby notified also that no proceedings have been had in the respective matters, causes or suits mentioned or in respect thereto, nor has any application for the payment of these balances of Chancery deposits been made for the period of twenty years or upwards. Consequently, if no claim be made, or right to all or several the sums specified in the Schedule be substantiated to the satisfaction of the Court of Chancery of Jamaica within two years from the date of the first publication of this notice in Great Britain, the sums of money aforesaid will become the absolute property of the public of this island.
