sion Act, 1850), of Saint Silas, Ardwick, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester, which is bounded upon the east partly by the parish of Saint Aidan, Man-chester, and partly by the parish of Christ Church, Bradford, both in the said county and diocese, upon the north by the last-named parish, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the west and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of the Ardwick Branch Line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway where the boundaries of the said parish of Christ Church, Bradford, the parish of Saint Mary, Beswick, in the said county and diocese, and the said parish of Saint Silas, Ardwick, all meet, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Ancoats Junction Line of the Midland Railway, and extending thence first southward and then south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned line of railway for a distance of sixteen chains and a half or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such line of railway across Ashton Old Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Ashton Old Road for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to the point at or near its junction with Eldon Street where the boundaries of the said parish of Saint Silas, Ardwick, the parish of Saint Barnabas, Openshaw, in the said county and diocese, and the said parish of Saint Aidan, Manchester, all meet."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the parish out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the

second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventh day of November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Wesham, in the parish of Kirkham, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church, situate at Wesham as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Kirkham, which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the civil parish of Medlar with Wesham, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church called Christ Church, situate at Wesham, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Wesham.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church called Christ Church, situate at Wesham, as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet."
